

Prayer Intentions of the Holy Father for February 2022

We pray for religious sisters and consecrated women; thanking them for their mission and their courage; may they continue to find new responses to the challenges of our times.

From your pastor,

Ash Wednesday is late this year, but it will be here in less than two weeks. Let us pray for one another that we make a holy successful Lent, bearing good fruit for the sake of the Kingdom. What used to be called the Bishop's Lenten Appeal is now known as the Diocesan Annual Campaign. I prefer the original name, as it gave new meaning to the observance of Lent. It moved us beyond the idea of Lent as a time of giving up, to a time of building up the Kingdom of God. This past appeal 'DAC 2021' did bear much good fruit, many blessings for our souls, the good of our parish and community and the whole diocese.

Because of the 103 donors, our fellow parishioners, who gave the offering of \$108,400.00 to the DAC, our parish was able pay the \$29,837.00 assessment and received back \$78,663.00. If I had had to appeal to the ordinary offertory, and you had given this amount in the Sunday Collection, then that amount would have been used to increase our yearly assessment. That means about \$10,000.00 would have been added to this coming year's assessment. This year's '2022 DAC' assessment is \$31,595.00 rather than an additional \$10,000.00. The parish not only gave in faith and loving hearts but also smart thinking brains.

It was a win-win for everyone, especially your pastor. I thank you for your support. Last year, 2021, I celebrated my 45th Priesthood Ordination. I suggested that if you wanted to give me anything, to please give to the DAC, you did so, and we are all greatly blessed. I am very proud of the Priesthood that God has given to me to serve you. But God gives His sacraments through the bishop. If there was no bishop, no diocese, then there would be no priests, no Mass and no parish. It all comes together in God's gift of Charity. You have given that I might give to you the gift of God Himself in the Holy Eucharist.

SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: 1 Samuel 26:2, 7-9, 12-13, 22-23

Saul wanted to harm David and went into the desert to locate him. David and his companion Abishai visited Saul and his troops while they slept. Abishai wanted to kill Saul, but David would not allow it, as he refused to kill the Lord's anointed.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15:45-49

Paul portrays Adam as the first physical man and Jesus as the first man to give us our spirituality. One man was formed from dust, the other sent down from heaven. Just as we resemble the first being physically, we should model ourselves after Jesus spiritually.

Gospel: Luke 6:27-38

Jesus explains that loving only people who love us is no great achievement. He also reminds us that doing a favor for someone while expecting something in return is not what he asks of us. Instead, we should emulate God by being compassionate and non-judgmental, even towards individuals who hate and mistreat us.

Saint Bernadette

Bernadette's parents were very poor. They lived in Lourdes, France.

One day, in 1854, while Bernadette was gathering firewood, a beautiful Lady stood in a cave before her. She was dressed in blue and white, and there was a rose on each of her feet. She smiled at Bernadette and asked her to say the rosary with her.

Bernadette saw the Lady eighteen times. She asked Bernadette to tell the world that people must do penance for their sins and pray. She once told Bernadette: "I do not promise to make you happy in this world, but you will be in heaven."

Large crowds followed Bernadette to the grotto to say the rosary with her. They could not see the Lady. The Lady asked Bernadette to scrape the earth. The miraculous spring of Lourdes started to flow. Many sick people have been cured there.

When Bernadette asked the Lady her name, she looked up to heaven and said: "I am the Immaculate Conception." She asked that a chapel be built near the grotto.

Later, Bernadette became a nun, and she suffered very much. She died at the age of thirty-six.
