

## TWENTY-SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Sirach 3:17-18, 20, 28-29

#### A LITTLE ST. JOSEPH CHURCH HISTORY

Two weeks ago, I wrote that historians were not sure a log church existed in 1812. I found the following – Bishop of Philadelphia Reverend Patrick Kenrick posted in his dairy: May 1832 – I was met by Reverend John J. Curtin, pastor in charge of the church of St. Joseph at Milton. I confirmed 132 persons in the Church, and about the same number received Holy Communion. This Church – a frame structure – was built about 20 years ago. The title to the property and the house in which the pastor lives belong to the Jesuits – a parcel of about two acres, which a certain Catholic conveyed to them as a gift.

This large number was primarily the result of the construction of the West Branch Canal. The construction of canals brought large numbers of Irish to America. Their passage was paid by the contractors. They were held under indenture until they had worked out the amount of their passage. This did not happen until they had dug the canal through to Lock Haven.

"The Pennsylvania canal was constructed not by steam and electrical machinery but by picks, shovels, crowbars, wheelbarrows, and carts generally manned by laborers of Irish extraction."

From the tombstones in the old section of the parish cemetery, we know there was a high mortality rate of the poor, exploited, but religious people.



#### **CEMETERY IMPROVEMENT**

We continue to upright tombstones that have sunk or are leaning in the "old section" of our cemetery. Six more stones were reset this past month. We will identify ten more stones for 2023 repair. All repair expenses have been paid for through a generous donation.

We "cleaned" four rows in the original section of the cemetery. Those expenses were paid by Addy Murray's Confirmation project to raise money for the cemetery.

This is a slow process because of "people resources" – not financial resources. It's hard to find contractor availability.
