From Your Pastor.

I hope our children are being exposed to wonderful bible stories, and that they will be presented in a way that the young ones will be impressed and will remember for years to come.

In the story from Exodus, Moses held his hands up in prayer all during the battle, as Joshua engaged Amalek. As long as his arms were held up Joshua had the winning hand, if his hands dropped then the enemy had the upper hand. This story was taught to me when I was attending the Protestant Sunday School, when I was about six years old, before I was Baptized Catholic. The story was a reference point for me throughout my Navy Chaplaincy. It also helps us to see the importance of unity of all parts of the Body of Christ. Without those who pray there is no way we will be able to go forth to our workplaces and confront the Evil One.

St. Paul, who ordained Timothy, told him to always remember to avoid a cowardice spirit, a weak spirit, but rather to seek power, love and self-control. Paul charged Timothy to proclaim the word; be persistent whether it is convenient or inconvenient; convince, reprimand, encourage all through patience and teaching.

Our Lord adds another element for those who follow Him. Pray without becoming weary. We are told to be persistent and never give up. The promise is that if we remain faithful and persistent, in the end justice will come. It takes faith, let us pray for faith not to give up. As the Lord said, "But when the Son of Man comes, will He find faith on earth?"

WORLD MISSION SUNDAY

October 23, 2022

Next week, we join Catholics around the world for the celebration of World Mission Sunday. TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Exodus 17:8-13

Amalek and his people attacked the Israelites, so Moses instructed Joshua to lead some of the Israelites into battle the next day. While Moses kept his hands raised in prayer, the Israelites were winning. But when he put his hands down, they would begin to lose. So two others helped him keep his hands raised, and Joshua and the Israelites won the battle.

Second Reading: 2 Timothy 3:14-4:2

Paul tells Timothy that the Scriptures are inspired by God and are an excellent tool in teaching others about God's expectations of his people. Knowledge of the Scriptures, coupled with faith in Jesus, will lead many people to salvation. Paul urges Timothy to continue preaching the gospel, although this will sometimes be a difficult task.

Gospel: Luke 18:1-8

Jesus speaks about a corrupt judge who lacked respect for either God or man. A widow repeatedly asked him to settle a case in her favor. He finally settled the case, only because he grew weary of listening to her requests. Jesus points out that if even this corrupt judge eventually listened, then God, who is just, will certainly answer the pleas of his people.
