From Your Pastor.

"Are You envious because I am generous? Thus, the last will be first and the first will be last."

This passage from **The Parable of the Workers in the Vineyard** is very troubling to many, Our Lord is really making His students think. The disciples are confused by the ways of God, so let us ponder the meaning of this mystery.

The Church Fathers felt that the same wage given to everyone is the gift of eternal life with God in the Kingdom. Certainly, those who treasured this gift more than the others were those who were hired last, they knew they did not deserve the gift, as it seemed unbelievable. All souls who enter judgement with God, and receive His mercy, should have the same attitude, "I don't deserve this, it is only by the mercy of God that I am given eternal life!" The first wave of workers did the work but failed to take on an appreciation of having the work to do, which brought them closer to the Master. They should have had the same joy and generosity as the Master, being glad that more workers could enjoy the goodness of the Lord.

If everyone who responds to the Lord's call to enter the vineyard gets the same blessings of eternal life, then why strive for sacrifice and growth in virtues and holiness? Because, by the grace we receive from good works and holy virtues, we grow in the ability to enjoy, appreciate and thrive in the gift God gives to everyone. Certainly, you have seen this in life; many will go on vacation, but not all will appreciate it and love it as those who have been prepared. Whether it is a Ball Game, the Theater, or a dinner out on the town, not all will have the same amount of joy, thankfulness and renewal from their experience.

In heaven, all will be filled up to the extent that they are capable, some the size of a small drop from an eye dropper, a thimble, a shot glass, a soup bowl, a bucket, a bathtub, a great lake or even the size of the oceans. All are filled up, but each a different amount of joy and glory in the Lord.

Next week, the first week of October, all the priests will be away at workshop. There will be no daily Mass that week, nor will we have our beloved 24 Hours of adoration. Pray for your priests and bishop.
