#### From Your Pastor,

This is a good time to draw attention to how God reveals His power and presence in creation, in scripture, in the hymns and prayers of the liturgical seasons, in the Church and her sacraments and the daily lives of her people. How loudly God speaks through the changing of the season. Now that we have fallen back off of Day-Light-Saving Time, it will be an adjustment. But try to make your efforts into a prayer.

The next four Sundays give us Matthew's chapters 23 and 25. This is the last sermon/teaching given by the Lord to us. He knows He is about to be arrested, crucified, and buried. These are very important words in His mind and heart. Let us show reverence for this gift from Him. In Matthew Chapter 24, He tells us that because of increased evil, the love of most will grow cold. The man who holds out to the end will see salvation. The weather will be cold outside, but our hearts can be warmed up by fueling them with the Word of God, in Flesh and Blood, and Holy Scripture.

#### DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN BASILICA

Feast Day is November 9th

The feast of the Dedication of the Basilica of St. John Lateran marks the dedication of the cathedral church of Rome by Pope Sylvester I in 324. This church is the chair of the bishop of Rome, who is the Pope. The basilica was originally named the Archbasilica of the Most Holy Savior. However, it is called St. John Lateran because it was built on property donated to the Church by the Laterani family, and because the monks from the monastery of St. John the Baptist and St. John the Divine served it.
