





Questions Catholics Ask

What is Heaven?



When our loved ones die, faith prompts us to speak of them as being in a better place. This pinnacle of betterment is theologically described as perfect union with God. What could be better, truly, than to be finally and completely overtaken by the love that made us in the first place? We also speak of heaven as being God's home as well as our ultimate destination. Those whom we love and lose are therefore not lost at all in death. They've simply "gone home."

However, Christian salvation is even more comprehensive than we sometimes imagine. The world God created is not made in vain, but is even now groaning for its own version of rescue in a new heaven and new earth identified as the "new creation." Just as our beloved and beautiful world was never destined for the scrap heap, so our mortal bodies aren't intended to end as

"ashes to ashes, and dust to dust." All is to be renewed, restored, revitalized in a "world without end" confirmed in our every doxology. Cosmically speaking, in eternity the material world matters—pun very much intended.

So the kingdom of heaven Jesus repeatedly teaches in Matthew's gospel isn't a spiritual land elsewhere. It's an immediate reality that has ramifications both now and forever. This makes it imperative that we do our "inner work," since our internal condition (traditionally called our state of grace) is represented in that now-and-everlasting realm. We also have to be mindful stewards of our social relationships, as well as the direction history is taking as a whole. I like Jesuit Paul Crowley's phrase here: "Heaven is

thus not a radical interruption of these dimensions of human personhood; rather, the entirety of human personhood is taken up into God in the glory of risen life which bears the name heaven." Simply put, heaven isn't "where" we meet God face to face. It's "when." And it's not an interruption of all we presently know and love. It's a glorification of it all. How wonderful is that?

Another Jesuit, theologian Karl Rahner, has something else to say about heaven that's equally fascinating. He suggests that Jesus didn't return to a pre-existing place called heaven at his Ascension. Rather, Jesus established the possibility of heaven—that is, perfect and eternal union with God—by entering into his glory. Heaven is possible for those prepared to be overwhelmed by love.







Anyone in this particular situation may request to receive the materials needed for child protection training in an alternate way. These requests are made through the Safe Environment Office. All requests for alternate child protection training for victims of child sexual abuse are kept confidential.







WE SHARE BECAUSE WE CARE

During Holy Week we commemorate the 3 most Sacred Days... the Paschal Triduum

Holy Thursday ... The Lord's Supper

The last day of *Lent* and the first day of the *Paschal Triduum*, we commemorate the Lord's Supper (Last Supper, Passover into the fullness of life) and reenact the washing of the feet. As Lord and Teacher, Jesus' profound message of self–sacrificing love is proclaimed by His actions of washing the disciples' feet and pouring forth His own body and blood. A model of humble loving service, ("*Do you know what I have done for you*,") a new commandment was given to the disciples "*love one another as I have loved you*." God's glory is manifested, made visible, and love becomes personified through Jesus' paschal service.

"Will you let me be your servant, let me be as Christ to you; pray that I may have the grace to let you be my servant too" Hymn text: Richard Gilliard

For *Holy Thursday*, the sanctuary will be decorated in celebration of the Last Supper. In the baptistery niche, bread, grapes, and a goblet of wine will be arranged on a bed of draped white fabric. In front of the altar, a white flower arrangement and a small table draped with white fabric will display the holy oils. Chairs will wrap around the altar for the washing of the feet. Upon completion of the mass, the altar will be stripped to signify the Church dying with Christ. Father Denis will process with the Blessed Sacrament to the OLR Chapel which will be decorated to depict the Garden of Gethsemane. The congregation is invited to the chapel to spend time in prayer and reflection just as Jesus and His disciples did that *Holy* night.

Good Friday... The Passion of the Lord

For *Good Friday* we will commemorate the ultimate mystery of faith, Jesus' passion and death. Handling over His spirit after He knew everything was finished, the passion of our Lord is more than a step to resurrection and the establishment of His everlasting reign (kingship); it is a day on which we celebrate Jesus' obedience, fidelity, and impassioned love, ... "Christ became obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross."

For *Good Friday*, the sanctuary will remain stripped of all decorations, a crown of thorns, and spikes and the Sorrowful Mother (Pieta) will be on display in the baptistery niche. Venerating the cross will occur during the mass.

Holy Saturday... Easter Vigil

The pinnacle of the Easter Triduum, the vigil is a ceremony of light and darkness, representative of the faithful prayer-fully awaiting the resurrection (and new life) of Jesus Christ. The celebration begins with the blessing of new fire ("first vigil"- dispel the darkness) where the Paschal candle will be lit symbolizing the *light* of salvation and the *hope* (new creation) brought into the world. The Paschal candle will be carried into the church at the head of the procession where the light of Christ will pass to the congregation. Our baptism promises will be renewed and the newly baptized will be fully welcomed into the church (Christian initiation).

For *Holy Saturday*, the sanctuary will be decorated for Easter with white and gold fabric and flowers displayed in front of the altar symbolizing rebirth/new life in Christ. Father Denis, Father Anish, and the deacons will don gold and white vestments.

Today we celebrate... Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Crowds waving palm branches and praising God aloud, "blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord; hosanna in the highest," is the prelude for Jesus' triumphant entrance into Jerusalem... for this is **Palm Sunday**. Jesus, the promised Messiah and Servant King, during Passover, humbly rides a new colt into Jerusalem and receives exaltation and worship as He prepares for the painful contrast of the cross and His glory.

As we celebrate Palm Sunday, we carry palms in procession to journey with Jesus to the cross and proclaim the *passion narrative*... "Christ became obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross." Following His Father's will and placing Himself into His arms ("Father, into your hands I commend my spirit"), Jesus, with compassion and love, chose His ultimate gift of self-giving (Lamb of God), ushering in the new Passover, a new covenant, and our salvation.

Redeemed by God's Holy love, we His faithful followers embrace Jesus' saving mission by standing at the cross with Christ and giving ourselves over wholeheartedly. Baptized in the death and resurrection of Jesus (*Paschal Mystery*) and redeemed by God's holy love, we His passionate followers, lift God's name in glory ("hosanna in the highest") as we celebrate the promise of the fullness in the inheritance of life in Christ.

"Because of this, God greatly exalted him and bestowed on him the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, of those in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." Phil 2: 9-11

For *Palm Sunday*, the sanctuary will be decorated in the color red symbolizing the *Passion* theme. Our celebration will begin with a procession of palm branches and a song of praise "All glory, laud, and honor to you, Redeemer, King!" Father Denis, Father Anish and the Deacons will don red-colored vestments. Draped red-colored fabric and palms will be displayed at the base of the ambo and added to the desert theme, purple fabric in front of the altar, and in the baptistery niche. A red flower arrangement will also be displayed in front of the altar. A *Palm Sunday* portrait of Jesus riding the colt into Jerusalem will be displayed in the baptistery niche.

Two Stories of Betrayal

There were two typical little girls: a four-year-old and a six-year-old. These sisters idolized one another and had a strong bond of sisterhood and friendship, even at their young ages. They loved their parents and like most children, they brought joy to everyone around them. They mastered giggling like a couple of hyenas and, by all accounts, were happy and well-adjusted.

Innocent and oblivious to most adult-related things going on around them, they played and did what typical little children do. These little girls were completely unaware of the groundswell of danger that would threaten the happiness of their world.

One day, their mother collected their things, and along with the two girls, loaded them in the car. Without an explanation, this mother left their father, the house they knew as "home," and abruptly moved them into another man's house. The man was not a stranger to the little girls' mother because she had been having an affair with him for the past year. However, these little girls had no idea who he was or why they were no longer living with their daddy. There are two sides to every story, but the only innocent people in this scenario were these children.

Immediately, the aftermath of this betrayal took hold like a bad virus that permeated every cell of their life as a family. Two otherwise happy children were thrown into a very dark place where confusion, hurt, and anger dissolved their trust, happiness, and sense of security. Betrayal is a destructive force that rips at the heart of the innocent. Consenting adults with little regard for the rippling damage of their selfish actions made a mockery of their wedding covenant and the parental responsibility that God entrusted to them.

Before long, these young innocent children who could not verbalize the sting of their pain, began to react with anger and resentment toward those around them, clearly acting out the residual damage of their parents' sinful choices. Hurt people, hurt people and the cyclical nature of betrayal marches on.

Another Story of Betrayal:

The gospel of Matthew tells the story of the Passion of our Lord and begins with Jesus and His disciples entering into Jerusalem. Large crowds gathered spreading their cloaks on the ground and waving palms yelling, "Hosanna to the Son of David, hosanna in the highest." It didn't take long before the tide turned and nearly everyone around Jesus, friends and enemies alike, would betray Him in one way or another. As Jesus and His apostles were at table celebrating the Passover, Jesus said to them:

"Amen I say to you, one of you will betray me." Deeply distressed at this, they began to say to him one after another, "Surely it is not I, Lord?"

Most of us, on any given day, wouldn't plot ways to betray God or His people. As part of the effects of original sin, we are flawed and fall prey to temptation that lurks everywhere we turn. Many times, evil's bait is shiny and attractive and we pounce on it hook, line, and sinker. We want immediate gratification and satisfaction regardless of the cost. There isn't one of us living today who hasn't been hurt by sin or hasn't hurt others through our own sinfulness. Like the crowds who followed Jesus, waving their palm branches in praise of Him, then later cried, "Crucify Him," we too betray our Lord in the many ways we move away from Him. St. Andrew of Crete, one of the early Church Fathers, gives us sound advice in his Palm Sunday homily on how to move closer to Christ:

"In His humility, Christ entered the dark regions of our fallen world and He is glad that He became humble for our sake, glad that He came and lived among us and shared in our nature in order to raise us up again to Himself... So let us spread before His feet, not garments or soulless olive branches, which delight the eye for a few hours and then wither, but ourselves clothed in His grace, or clothed completely in Him. We who have been baptized into Christ, must ourselves be the garments that we spread before Him... Let our souls take the place of the welcoming branches as we join today in the children's holy song: Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord. Blessed is the King of Israel."

The process is an act of love. It can go beyond the burial too-ongoing prayer for the deceased, visiting the gravesite, and even disposing of their material things. If you're skilled with numbers and transactions then helping to sell a person's home and volunteering for the stressful task of settling their financeswhich can take months or years—can be a special kind of charity.

Practice extreme love

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. died this day in 1968. On the night before his assassination, King gave his famous "I Have Been to the Mountaintop" speech. But it's King's words in "Letter from Birmingham Jail" that provide a lens to the Lord's Passion this week. "Though I was initially disappointed at being categorized as an extremist," King wrote, "I gradually gained a measure of satisfaction from the label. On this day in 1968, the Catholic mayor of Chicago, Richard J. Daley, infamously authorized his police department to use lethal force in the riots following the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. the previous day. The event would lead to a national uproar and also to the founding two weeks later of the National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus, an organization that persists to the present day. The organization's leaders would play a pivotal role in what is now known as the "Black Catholic Movement," integrating black spirituality into

their liturgies and practice of the faith. As we remember the life and legacy of Dr. King and so many other freedom fighters, let us also make use of our faith in the holy struggle for justice and solidarity.

The Eucharist, instituted at the Last Supper, which we commemorate today, is called the "source and the summit of Christian life" (Lumen Gentium 11). The idea is that we become what we eat, that we take on the characteristics of Jesus by consuming his body. Because of the centrality of the Eucharist-and to uplift its unifying force-the U.S. bishops have organized a Eucharistic Revival that includes a Eucharistic Congress this July, to be followed by a "year of mission." As these sacred days unfold, allow the Eucharist to unite you to Christ and your sisters and brothers.

Words count

"It is finished" is among the final phrases of Jesus found in the four gospels, collectively known as the "Seven Last Words." The others are "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do." "Truly, I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise." "Woman, behold your son. [Beloved disciple], behold your mother." "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" "I thirst." "Father, into your hands I commend your Spirit." Taken together these words tell us everything about who Jesus was, why he lived and died, and what he calls his disciples to do. "Who will we be if we listen to the lessons of the Last Words of Jesus?" Alice Camille asks and answers in her brilliant little book Seven Last Words. "People of love and joy, ready to forgive, buoyed by hope." May we be such people.

Silent emptiness

Christ has died. The church is empty. The altar is bare. The tabernacle is vacant. The Real Presence feels like the Real Absence. Following an ancient tradition, the church does not celebrate the sacraments on this day. For that reason, Holy Saturday is a great time to visit your church and meditate on the emptiness and silence of the building. Our experience of God often seems empty and silent, with no outward sign of the divine help we always need. All we have is our faith, hope, and trust in God's abiding attendance in our lives.
