





Confirmation (9th)



Ignite (Grades 9-12th)





SPECIAL ADVENT ADORATION WITH EXPOSITION



Adoration with Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament will be held in the Reservation Chapel located behind the main altar each Thursday during Advent, beginning <u>December 7</u> and continuing through <u>December 21</u>. The hours of Exposition will begin at <u>9:30 AM</u> and continue non-stop <u>until 9 PM</u>. Out of respect for the exposed Blessed Sacrament, we need at least two Guardians of the Eucharist for each hour of adoration, who will guarantee to be there during the hour(s) for which they commit.

This is a great day to make or set out your Mary Candle. You'll need a large white pillar candle. Decorate it with symbols of Christ, such as a chi rho (the first two letters of Christ's name in Greek; it looks like a


large letter P with an X across the bottom part of the stem). Place it in your family oratory and cover it with white cloth or lace for the remainder of Advent. The candle represents Christ, and the white cloth represents Mary. At Christmas, remove the cloth to reveal Christ, and light the candle all through the Christmas season.



Season of Advent-Pam Shields

As we begin the Season of Advent, we are reminded to prepare for the second coming of Jesus Christ, as we will celebrate and commemorate His first coming, Christmas. At Christmas, we celebrate a gift: the birth of a Savior and King, God choosing to dwell among us. During Advent, we prepare our hearts for the glorious return of the Son of Man (Great Advent of God) when the extravagant love of God will be poured out upon the cosmos and all humanity, transforming it into the new heaven and new earth.

Latin for the "coming" of Christ, Advent calls us to a deeper discernment of our lives and to "watch and prepare." An attitude of mindfulness increases our expectations as we open ourselves up to recognize the presence of Christ ("the salvation of God") and to "be vigilant at all times ... you do not know when the time (Lord) will come." We his faithful disciples, consciously seek to identify Christ (Divine Guest) present within and among us. We prepare our lives for the one who dwells in our hearts and to be his Presence in the world so that we may draw ever closer to the kingdom (union with Christ), and advance toward Christ's definitive coming in glory.

For the Season of Advent, the sanctuary will be decorated beginning on the altar with the Advent Wreath. The wreath itself is a symbolic circle of evergreen representing everlasting life. The seedpods, nuts and cones used to decorate the wreath are symbolic of resurrection and the fruits represent the nourishing fruitfulness of the Christian

life. Displayed within the wreath are four candles (three purple - penance, one pink - rejoice) representing the four Sundays in Advent and the increasing illumination of our tidings of joy. During each of the Advent Mass celebrations, a candle (s) will be lit symbolizing hope, peace, joy, love, and Christ the Light of the world. Draped purple fabric, symbolizing penitence, royalty, and expectation, will be added to the Risen Christ niche and the altar. For the Third week of Advent (Gaudete/Rejoice Sunday) rose color fabric will be added representing our rejoicing and joyful expectation. On the brick columns above the altar, four banners will depict each of the four weeks theme: "watch, prepare, rejoice, hope." Father Denis, Father Anish, and the Deacons will don purple vestments for weeks 1,2 & 4 and rose colored in week 3. As we progress closer to the glorious arrival, candles will be added to the windows, a Christmas tree will be on display in the gathering space for the parish to decorate, wreaths will be added to the balcony columns in the sanctuary and displayed at the entrance of the church,, the Nativity scenes will be in place at the entrance to the church and on the East wall of the sanctuary, and in the baptismal niche Mary and Joseph journey to Bethlehem... as we prepare our hearts and wait in joyful hope for a wondrous gift: heaven's perfect lamb, love's pure light.

(For the December 8th feast of the Immaculate Conception, Mary will reside in the Baptistery niche..." Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you.")

Gospel Meditation

December 3, 2023-1st Sunday of Advent

Lately I've been listening to a science-based podcast on healthy daily living. The host frequently discusses the wide range of health benefits of sleep. So, each night I'm trying to get more, and better, slumber, and it's helping me feel energized. So, why in the world should we follow Christ's advice this week? "Watch therefore, for you do not know when the master of the house will come ... lest he find you asleep." Isn't sleep, especially at midnight and cockcrow, a good thing? Of course, it is. But the wakefulness the Lord calls us to is a deep, personal orientation to Him. A nightly vigil is therefore a metaphor for this, but it's not just that. We should give up real sleep in order to pray, too. This difficult practice is a time-tested way to foster wakefulness of heart. When we give up sleep to pray, it focuses us. We learn that life is not an endless series of days. You and I belong to the Lord — awake or asleep, in life and in death. Sooner or later, even our need for our physical sleep will pass away. And our attentiveness to God — that is, whether we are awaiting Him to meet us — will be all that matters. May I challenge us this week and this Advent to intentionally give up at least one hour of sleep each week for prayer? Stay up later, wake up in the middle of the night, or an hour earlier, and pray. Will we be a bit more tired the next day? Yes. But we'll be amazed at the spiritual wakefulness that results, too.

Memento Mori-By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman

Just this week, my husband and I signed our wills, and the lawyer was careful to couch our transaction in gentle, abstract language: "When we lose you" she kept saying, instead of "When you die."

It's very uncomfortable to dwell on our death. But the Christian life does not just encourage us to do so: it demands that we do. I once came upon a prayer consecrating the last two hours of life to the Blessed Mother. I have since found variations of the prayer online with different phrasing, but the sentiment of them all is the same: let me not be caught sleeping. Let me be ready.

"You can't do all your homework at the end," a deacon who ministers to the dying once told me. "Good Friday is waiting in the wings for all of us."

I think of that a lot when I don't particularly feel like praying, when I think I'm too busy to go to confession or when feelings of resentment fester inside me on Sunday mornings as I pack my family off to church. All our good deeds are like polluted rags, says the prophet. We have all withered like leaves.

You can't do all your homework at the end. God is faithful. Are we?

EUCHARISTIC MIRACLE OF WEITEN-RAXENDORF, AUSTRIA-1411

"In the parish church of Weiten, a thief broke into the sacristy and got hold of a consecrated Host that he slipped into one of his gloves. According to reports from the village of Weiten, the theft occurred in 1411. The thief then mounted his horse intending to make for the nearby village of Spitz. Instead of taking the main road, he chose a side road that passes through the valley of Mühldorf and is known as "Am Schuß." When he arrived at the spot (that today is marked by a chapel in honor of the miracle) his horse halted and would not move, no matter how much the man beat him. Some laborers working in the surrounding fields came to help. But there was no way to make the horse move; it stood still as a statue. Then without warning, the animal leaped to a gallop, and the Sacred Host hidden in the rider's glove dropped to the ground without anyone noticing. A few days later, a Mrs. Scheck from Mannersdorf passed by the spot and saw the Host encircled in a strong light. In great wonder, she picked up the Holy Eucharist and noticed that the consecrated Host was broken in two Parts but remained joined together by threads of Bleeding Flesh. Greatly moved and at her own expense, in thanksgiving, she built a small chapel on the spot. As news of the miracle spread, many pilgrims came to the place. Later, it was necessary to build a bigger church to honor the precious reliquary in order to contain the great crowds that came every year on pilgrimage"

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






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
