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What are you looking for?
There are many times in the course of my life I have been asked that

very question under various circumstances. Certainly by my mother when I've pilfered through her purse looking for some loose change; by a retail clerk as I'm looking for the perfect gift for someone; a concierge when I enter a hotel; a librarian when I'm looking for reference material; a good soul anytime I look lost in a place with which I'm not familiar.

In looking back on my 62+ years, I wish I had a nickel for every time I was sure my happiness would come from some other person only to be disappointed and less happy. Or, when I was seeking a sense of wholeness thinking that I would find it from a course or seminar that promised change. In times of trouble and a sense of deep profound loss, how often did I look for every artificial means for comfort that offered no comfort at all. When I wanted to relieve my conscience after choices that led to my sinfulness, how long and hard I sought justification for my actions instead of seeking forgiveness. Or, how about the times when people have treated me unjustly and I held tight to my injury while seeking sympathy from others rather than doing the hard work of forgiveness myself.

What am I looking for? This is such a profound question that Jesus asks all of us.

In John's gospel, John the Baptist and two of his followers watched as Jesus walked by them. John the Baptist, recognizing that Jesus was the Messiah said, "Behold the Lamb of God". The two disciples hearing what John had said began following Jesus.

Jesus turned and saw them following him and said to them, "What are you looking for?"

They addressed him as 'teacher' and inquired where he was staying. Jesus then invited them to come. One of the disciples named Andrew went to get his brother Simon to join them and told him they had found the Messiah and then brought him to Jesus.
