After my trip to the country of Jordan, I was curious about shepherds in the re-

gion, so I read an article about the qualities of a good shepherd and this is what it said, good shepherd loves his sheep and develops a close, intimate relationship with them so that they know his voice and trust him; Understands the needs of the sheep better than they do; Understands what threatens sheep and what makes them sick; Works tirelessly to provide protection and security; Leads them to fresh pastures and fresh water: Searches out sheep when they stray; Defends sheep against all their enemies; Provides protection while they sleep; Shears them and examines each one for injury or disease: Goes ahead of sheep and prepares the path; Disciplines and corrects them; Comforts sheep when they are hurt or fearful; Keeps sheep "on the move" so they don't get into a rut; Liberally anoints them with oil to prevent disease or to heal an injury; Keeps sheep from fighting and from hurting each other; Cares for, loves sheep, and sacrifices his life for them: Rejoices in the health. wellbeing, and prosperity of his flock; Will leave the flock to search for lost sheep: Experiences great joy in finding lost sheep; Carries the lambs close to his hear; Gently leads those with young; Gets deepest satisfaction from seeing that sheep are contented, well-fed, and safe".

More than anything in my life, I enjoyed my vocation as 'mother'. Then, six years ago I entered the new and amazing world of being a grandmother. Not only do my grandkids bring me happiness, but I also have the joy of watching my daughter and daughter-in-law experience the profound, unconditional love for their children. It's a gift to witness their hard work as they juggle schedules and the challenges of raising a family. There are days when I marvel that they do what they do with only two arms and two hands!

In gathering my thoughts for this reflection, it dawned on me that we're, not only celebrating

Good Shepherd Sunday, but we are also celebrating Mother's Day. As I re-read the qualities of a good shepherd those very same qualities rang true for good mothers.

In the gospel of John this week, Jesus refers to himself as a shepherd and says,

"My sheep hear my voice; I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish."
