HOW TO PUT OUR PARISH IN YOUR WILL

After providing for your families and loved ones, parishioners may want to include the Parish in your wills, thus helping to assure the long-term future of the Parish and the work that must continue in generations to come. Bequests are free of estate tax and can substantially reduce the amount of your assets claimed by the government. You can give needed support to either of our Parishes by simply including the following words in your will: "I give, devise and bequeath to Church of the Annunciation Parish Charitable Trust in Ludlow, Vermont... or... Holy Name of Mary Parish Charitable Trust in Proctorsville, Vermont (insert amount being given here) to be used to support the ministry of the Parish". A bequest can be a specific amount, a specific piece of property, a percentage of an estate, or all or part of the residue of an estate. You can also name the Parish as a contingency beneficiary in the event someone named in your will is no longer living. It is recommended that a lawyer help in drafting or amending a will.



Following the Feast of the Lord's Baptism last Sunday, we began our foray into Ordinary Time. Today is named the Second Sunday of Ordinary Time because there is no First Sunday: the Feast of the Lord's Baptism does double-duty, bringing Christmastide to a close and then inaugurating Ordinary Time which will continue for the next seven weeks when we approach the beginning of Lent on Ash Wednesday. Ordinary Time is a recent invention, part of the development of the new Missal and Liturgical Calendar introduced in 1970. Before this we spoke not of Ordinary Time, but of multiple Sundays after Epiphany or Penterest

Time, itself, is a human construct; God, who is eternal, exists outside the strictures of time and space. So we might look backward or forward into time past and future, as we consider what life must be as we live it in the present moment. The other day, thoughts of some songs familiar to me concerning past, present and future came into mind. The first was Paul McCartney's song from 1965, "Yesterday." Lamenting a breakup, he longs to return to yesterday in the hope that he can change the events of the past. As he sang:

Yesterday, all my troubles seemed so far away. Now it looks as though they're here to stay, Oh, I believe in yesterday.

Dreaming of the future, Little Orphan Annie sings the song "Tomorrow" in the 1977 musical "Annie." She puts her hope into these words, among many:

Just thinking about Tomorrow Clears away the cobwebs and the sorrow. Tomorrow, tomorrow, I love you, tomorrow, you're always a day away.

Then, considering the past, looking to the future, Randy Sparks wrote the song "Today," which was a hit for The New Christy Minstrels in 1964. Gathering past and future, they sang of the present moment suspended in time with the words (edited here):

I can't be contented with yesterday's glory, I can't live on promises Winter to Spring. Today is my moment and now is my story, Who cares what the morrow may bring... ... A million tomorrows shall all pass away Ere I forget all the joy that is mine... today.

Our observance of the Liturgical Year reminds us that while we all have a "past," we all have a future. What is important, when we find ourselves in Ordinary Time or otherwise, is how we shall determine to live our faith in the present moment.
