HOW TO PUT OUR PARISH IN YOUR WILL

After providing for your families and loved ones, parishioners may want to include the Parish in your wills, thus helping to assure the long-term future of the Parish and the work that must continue in generations to come. Bequests are free of estate tax and can substantially reduce the amount of your assets claimed by the government. You can give needed support to either of our Parishes by simply including the following words in your will: "I give, devise and bequeath to Church of the Annunciation Parish Charitable Trust in Ludlow, Vermont... or... Holy Name of Mary Parish Charitable Trust in Proctorsville, Vermont (insert amount being given here) to be used to support the ministry of the Parish". A bequest can be a specific amount, a specific piece of property, a percentage of an estate, or all or part of the residue of an estate. You can also name the Parish as a contingency beneficiary in the event someone named in your will is no longer living. It is recommended that a lawyer help in drafting or amending a will.

From Father's Desk

Turning 30 was more traumatic than the Birthday looming before me now. Middle Age seemed to have caught me by surprise: receding hairline, proceeding waistline, and a few silver hairs along the temples. I still thought of myself as young, of course, and

indeed I was one of the younger Priests in the diocese then. But thirty just sounded *so mature*, *so sensible*, *so serious*.

And now I'm turning 70. I don't know how this happened; it seems I was just 44 a few years ago. My Dad had turned 70 just two weeks before my Ordination. He seemed so old to me then. His hair was pure white, like his father's, his gait had slowed, and he had difficulty breathing, suffering from emphysema, having smoked three packs a day through much of his adult life. He had retired at 65 and was not real happy in his retirement, looking for things to do, creating havoc for my Mother around the house. Mom bought a bumper sticker for her car which read: "Retirement: twice as much husband... half as much money."

Reaching the age of 70 makes me eligible for retirement, but I'm not planning to do so. I'd rather continue as long as my health is good and my mind is clear. (You'll let me know about the latter, won't you?) But just as the onset of Middle Age surprised me those many years ago, I find myself surprised a bit by becoming a septuagenarian. I thought I'd simply be a slower, grayer version of my youthful self, but was unprepared for the health issues that accompany those who reach this milestone. When I last spoke with my Doctor, he asked me what he should know. I said there's nothing outstanding, except that every day *something hurts*. I try my best, however, to avoid the pain meds and attempt, instead, to soldier on, maintaining a certain equilibrium that will allow for an honest smile when I greet people.

Life was certainly different back in 1953 when I was born. My recollections of growing up in the 50's and 60's call to mind a solid formation and education, as well as a sense of belonging in the family, the parochial school, the Church, and the neighborhood. My parents made many of the mistakes that parents make when raising children, but they got the faith across in a way that formed me in my eventual vocation to the priesthood, and led all my siblings to be devout, practicing Catholics these many tumultuous years later.

Looking forward, I don't know how many years lay ahead of me, perhaps fifteen, if my Father's genes dominate, or twenty or more, if I follow my Mother's life passage. I hope that these years will bring me wisdom, grace and some serenity, and allow me to focus on the Ministry to which Our Lord called me. And I hope I spend all these years here among you, so that we might grow together into the fullness of the personhood which God intended for us. Holiness can be ours, and I hope to lead us all in that direction.

Ad multos annos is what we Priests say to one another on occasions such as these, meaning "here's to many more years." Sounds good to me.
