Feast of St. Benedict, July 11

Have you ever wanted to change the world? 5th century Europe was a dark place. The Roman Empire had fallen, and barbarian tribes were picking over the scraps of what remained. Faith hung on, but there was no consistent, coherent Christian culture in the world around. Young Benedict began his life with education and privilege but became disillusioned by a life pursuing material success. He withdrew to a monastery and

spent much time in solitude. He began attracting followers, whom he organized over time into 12 monasteries, with a 13th established to train young monks. He wrote a rule of life including basic principles for living as Christ. His monks took three vows: conversion to Christ, obedience to the local abbot, and stability to remain with the community. Benedictine monasteries became lights in the darkness, secure centers of Christian culture enlivening the faithful beyond their walls. When the world around us seems complicated and contrary to the Gospel, how will you be a light?

A Window into Our Stained Glass Windows

This week we look at a unique detail in the windows of St. Augustine that was brought to my attention by Ginny Garand. "Why do St. Augustine and the other doctors have marks on their hands? Did they all have stigmata?" She was referring to the four Doctors of the Church in the southern transept: St. Augustine, St. Ambrose, St. Jerome, and St. Gregory the great. Stigmata are the wounds of Christ that God gives to some mystics (Interestingly, about 80% of the verified cases are women).

I had wondered about this detail before but Ginny got me to research the meaning. What I found is that the windows portray not stigmata (none of these saints had them) but episcopal gloves (sometimes called pontifical gloves) and are a type of vestment worn only by bishops or prelates with a special privilege, such as an abbot. They are made of silk and have a monogram or symbol on the top of the glove where the wound of Christ would be. In the windows, Gregory has a circle, while the other three have diamonds. Episcopal gloves seem to have originated in France and became customary in Rome around the 10th Century. While this means that none of the Doctors in our windows would have worn episcopal gloves as they lived centuries before their use, it is an accepted artistic practice to depict saints with vestments that developed after their death.

Vestments are never just clothes but rich with symbolism. When putting on the gloves during the vesting rite, the celebrant prays: "Place upon my hands, Lord, the cleanliness of the new man, that came down from heaven; that, just as Jacob Thy beloved, covering his hands with the skins of goats, and offering to his father most pleasing food and drink, obtained his father's blessing, so also may the saving victim offered by our hands, merit the blessing of Thy grace. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, Thy Son, Who in the likeness of sinful flesh offered Himself for us."
