March 1st, 2020 First Sunday of Lent

Dear friends in Christ,

Prayer, fasting and almsgiving...

Under these three titles we find the spiritual exercises to which Jesus directs us. Having pointed out that there are two paths - the broad path to destruction and the narrow path to salvation – the Lord guides us along the narrow path with these spiritual counsels.

Years ago, I had a conversation with a Catholic from another parish who was in financial difficulties. He had called the parish where I was assigned as the assistant to complain that the pastor was not willing to give him a large amount of cash at the door of the rectory to solve his financial woes. (You can imagine the length of the line at the rectory door if we adopted a policy like that!)

The part of the conversation that got to me and that relates to our Lenten practices is that he complained that he had ALWAYS given to the collection plate over the years and now he felt entitled to get it back! Suddenly I felt like a bank teller. "This is not a bank," I told him.

Should we be insensitive to the needs of the poor? Shouldn't we take care of our own? These are legitimate questions, but how the parish pastor deals with the needs of the poor is not the subject of this column. What is the point?

When a Catholic gives alms, he gives it to the Lord to provide for the temporal needs of the kingdom. Almsgiving is not a financial investment from which we hope to reap some future financial benefit. Nor should the faithful regard their alms as a means of entitlement to certain services, i.e. special privileges for weddings, baptisms, funerals, or family events. Why?

We give alms because God has been so good to us! We give alms to fulfill the command of the Lord to make a return for the blessings that He has showered upon us. When we give alms, there should be no strings attached. If we are attached to the alms that we have given, then we are "lending" our alms to God! But God owes us nothing.

God also is not a banker. Jesus tells us "when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right is doing, so that your almsgiving may be secret. And your Father who sees in secret will repay you." (Mt 6:3-4) A bank gives you back what you deposited plus interest; the Lord, who has provided everything for us, still rewards us – but in heavenly currency. We have been paid back even before we have given. He pays us back with something infinitely more valuable than our alms. "But store up treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor decay destroys, nor thieves break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be." (Mt 6:20-21)




The Light is On for Confession Every Wednesday during Lent at St. Michael's 7-9pm.

Our discipline of Lent

Good Friday is an obligatory day of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The law of fast is binding on those from age 18 until age 59. The Fridays of Lent are days of obligatory abstinence from meat only. The law concerning abstinence from meat is binding from age 14 onwards. All of us are bound to the law of penance, especially during Lent, which means that we willingly carry the crosses of our daily duties and those that the Lord sends us for our conversion, in reparation for our sins and for the conversion of poor sinners.



Parish Penance Service March 30, 2020

We will have a penance service at St. Michael on Monday, March 30, the week before Holy Week in preparation for Easter. Visiting priests will be available to hear confessions from 6:30-8pm. The Penance service will begin with Scriptural readings, a homily and an

examination of conscience. Mark your calendars!
