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1st Sunday of Advent November 29th, 2020

Dear friends:

The Archdiocese has asked each of us to reflect on racism and its effects on our social fabric. As we take our traditional break this weekend to give thanks to God as a nation, it is important that we give thanks not only for our immediate family, but for every person created by God. Our loving Father has given us such a large, beautiful family!

In Baptism, by the action of the Holy Spirit, we are washed of original sin, and become adopted sons and daughters of God. This last point is key — Baptism effectively incorporates us into the body of Christ — we become one family of God united in the Holy Spirit. We are given the grace we need to take up our shared responsibility to protect the dignity of all people as created and loved by God.

As a body is one though it has many parts, and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body, so also Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons, and we were all given to drink of the one Spirit. (1 Cor 12:12-13)

Each member of the mystical body of Christ shares a common dignity and mission to bring Christ to the world. As Catholics, we must respect and protect all people – regardless of their race, ethnic background or culture – all are created in the image and likeness of God. Inspired with Baptismal grace we can use our gifts and talents to address assaults on human dignity. Our responsibility to protect the dignity of all human beings requires us to oppose all personal, familial and societal attacks on human dignity, especially threats to life itself. No anti-life attitudes can be justified. Racism is a sin that denies a person's equal dignity merely on account of their race. This can occur in our thoughts, words or actions regardless of our racial background.

Our Baptism makes us responsible to our brothers and sisters, therefore we fight for the eradication of the sin of racism. As sons and daughters of God, responsible for defending the dignity of all, we must work to be anti-racist and uncompromisingly pro-life.
