

Living the Church's Liturgical Year Through Christ

"When I was a child, I used to talk as a child, think as a child, reason as a child: when I became an [adult], I put aside childish things." 1Corinthians 13:11

Have you ever thought of how you have shaped yourself by the Christ story? I recall a video produced by National Geographic photographer DeWitt Jones called "Celebrating What's Right with the World. The film encourages us look at oneself and see the best the world has to offer. I find that as I prepare to enter the Advent season, I am a better person because of the great gift of our Church's liturgical year than I was last year.

The Paschal Mystery (Christs life, death, and Resurrection) and our participation in all of it, is so real, so rich, and so multi-faceted that "one look/one picture" of it will never suffice. Thus, during the year, we look at it, experience it, from many viewpoints and various angles. At the end of the year and reflecting over the last twelve months our understanding of what it means to "truly love one another" has changed.

The Second Vatican Council said:

Holy Mother Church is conscious that she must celebrate the saving work of her divine bridegroom by devoutly recalling it on certain days throughout the course of the year... Within the cycle of a year... the Church unfolds the whole mystery of Christ...from his incarnation and birth until his ascension... the day of Pentecost, and the expectation of a blessed hoped-for return of the Lord.

(Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, #102)

As we live and celebrate each liturgical year (and each year is different,) we are reminded:

- Life is far from ordinary, boring routine.
- Every moment of time is sacred.
- The whole of salvation history, celebrated in every Sunday Mass, is gradually unpacked, and pondered over in the year's seasons and feasts, keeping the paschal mystery at the heart of our lives.
- Celebrating these sacred events helps us to adopt Jesus' lifestyle here and now.

As we continue to grow in our understanding of becoming who God has called us to be, Advent is where we begin to celebrate and live the liturgical year through myriad feasts and seasons. How will your understanding of what it truly means to "love one another" have changed at the beginning of Advent 2021?

Normally, when you see Happy New Year, you probably think of January 1st. But the beginning of Advent is, The New Year of our Church! Our Church year is centered around Jesus. The Catholic new year is about waiting for Jesus. "Advent comes from the Latin word meaning "coming." Jesus is coming, and Advent is intended to be a season of preparation for His arrival. While we typically regard Advent as a joyous season, it is also intended to be a period of preparation, much like Lent. Prayer, penance and fasting are appropriate during this season.

Advent is not as strict as Lent, and there are no rules for fasting, but it is meant to be a period of self-preparation. The purple color associated with Advent is also the color of penance. The faithful should fast during the first two weeks and receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

The color of the Third Sunday of Advent is rose. This color symbolizes joy and represents the happiness we will experience when Jesus comes again. The Third Sunday is a day of anticipatory celebration. It is formerly called "Gaudete" Sunday; Gaudete means "rejoice" in Latin.

Finally, Sundays during Advent, just as during Lent, should not be given to fasting, but instead to celebration because we celebrate the resurrection of Our Lord every Sunday."
