

During Communion at the 10:30 am Mass over the next few weeks, you will also be hearing a new hymn for our Parish repertoire, "Laudate Dominum," by Christopher Walker. Scripture Reflection

Will You Take Up Your Cross and Follow the

readings this weekend speak of the redemptive value of the suffering of Christ. In our first reading from the book of the Prophet Isaiah, we hear a reference to Jesus Christ as the "Suffering Servant," through whose suffering many will be justified.

Then, in our second reading from the letter to the Hebrews, we hear the author proclaimed Our Lord as the Great High Priest who sympathizes with our weakness because He was tested in every way yet without sin.

Then in the Gospel Jesus taught His apostles not to ambition for power and glory but instead to follow His example of service and of giving up one's life as a ransom for many.

By His Passion and Death Jesus has saved us and has transformed and sanctified all human suffering, giving it its redemptive and infinite meaning and value. Jesus calls all those who want to follow Him to share in His work of redemption by embracing the Cross and uniting themselves to Him.

Many saints have responded to Jesus' call and showed us that suffering should not be avoided but accepted as an opportunity to be one with Jesus, crucified and forsaken.

St. Paul speaks of this power of salvific suffering when he wrote these words in his letter to the Colossians: I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh, I am filling up what is lacking in the afflictions of Christ on behalf of His body, which is the Church. (Colossians 1:24)

Padre Pio, John Paul II, and Mother Angelica are some of those who lived in our time and who showed us the redemptive power of human suffering. Padre Pio suffered many illnesses and bore the wounds of Christ's crucifixion, "the stigmata" until the day he died. He was also persecuted and silenced for years.

St. John Paul II made this comment about Padre Pio, "The life and mission of Padre Pio prove that difficulties and sorrows, if accepted out of love, are transformed into a privileged way

of holiness, which opens onto the horizons of a greater good, known only to the Lord."

John Paul II suffered many assassination attempts, one of which almost killed him. Toward the end of his life, he continued serving the Church amidst sickness, pain, and criticisms for not retiring from his post. When asked why he would not consider retiring, he responded that the shepherd of the church leads not only by words and action but also by suffering.

Mother Angelica saw sickness as a sure path to intimacy with Jesus. When she was healed of her back problem that has been


hurting her for years, she was sad. When asked by one of her sisters, why she was sad, she responded, "Now I do not have anything to offer to Jesus as a gift." Jesus must have heard her prayers. Thus, later after suffering from a stroke, she could not talk at all for 15 years until the day she died.

Raymond Arroyo, the EWTN host of the program, The World Over and the biographer of Mother Angelica, made the following comments about her inability to speak: "While she was unable to speak at length and sound off on the controversies and confusions of the day, what she did through prayer in her suffering was remarkable. It's certainly not our efforts

that have kept EWTN on the air and allowed it to reach people in amazing ways. I attribute it all to the suffering of that one woman (Mother Angelica) in Hanceville."

Mother Angelica considered it a blessing to suffer for Christ as she united her suffering with His Passion. She wrote, "suffering in itself does not make us holy. It is only when we unite it out of love to the suffering of Christ that it has meaning. Suffering without love is wasted pain."

May Christ and all the saints inspire us and strengthen us every day in our resolve to take up our crosses and follow the Lord especially during this time of global crisis, grief and suffering. -Fr. Robert

Escalating red flags in an adult's behavior

In most abuse cases, the victim knows the offender. Offenders go to great lengths to ensure that they are not strangers, often spending months or even years hiding in plain sight. Parents should be aware of a few red flags that range from obvious to subtle, and usually indicate a more sinister relationship at work between an offender and potential victims. Some obvious signs include telling children dirty jokes or showing them pornography.

More subtle signs could be an adult who wrestles or tickles often, wants to be alone with children, gives gifts frequently, or encourages children to keep secrets. For more red flags, request a copy of the VIRTUS article "The Rationale of Warning Signs" at lacatholics.org/did-you-know.

CONTINUALLY LEARNING FROM JESUS

Today's Old Testament selection, from Isaiah's "Fourth Song of the Suffering Servant of God," describes God's Servant as one who "gives his life as an offering for sin" (Isaiah 53:10) and celebrates the mighty power of that self-offering: "through his suffering, my servant shall justify many, and their guilt he shall bear" (53:11). As always during Ordinary Time, this Old Testament reading prepares us for today's longer form Gospel. Jesus incarnates the redemptive suffering that Isaiah foresaw in the offering of God's Servant, as well as the covenantal restoration that the Servant's sacrificed achieved. The reading from Hebrews confirms our finding peace in continually learning from Jesus, whatever our deepest flaws and trials: for Jesus, our "great high priest" (Hebrews 4:14) is not "unable to sympathize with our weaknesses," for Jesus was "tested in every way" that we are (4:15).

MISUNDERSTANDING JESUS

Throughout this part of Ordinary Time, Mark's Gospel tracks the disciples' progressive misunderstanding about Jesus' mission and the nature of discipleship. We heard Jesus make two predictions about his Passion on Sundays in September, and just before today's Gospel episode, Jesus informed the Twelve: "Behold, we are going up to Jerusalem, and the Son of Man will be handed over to the chief priests and the scribes, and they will condemn him to death and hand him over to the Gentiles who will mock him, spit upon him, scourge him, and put him to death, but after three days he will rise" (Mark 10:33–34). Despite Jesus' three predictions and his definition of "glory" and "power" as serving others in humility, James and John still imagine Jesus as bound for a glorious earthly messiahship. How moving that Jesus, rather than scolding James and John as he had previously rebuked Peter, instead begins teaching them patiently, "You do not know what you are asking" (10:38).

SELF-EXAMINATION

Knowing that Jesus' throne of glory is also a "throne of grace," from which Jesus bestows "mercy and grace for timely help" (Hebrews 4:16), today's Gospel suggests sincere self-examination: How do we approach Jesus and make our requests? What do we ask for: what Jesus wants us to do or, like James and John today, do we demand "whatever we want" from Jesus? Does the world in which we live and work focus our hearts on glory to the right and power on the left? Or does "the cup we drink," "the baptism" we've received inspire us to gladly become servants of all, like the Jesus who has made us his disciples? Do we also avoid imitating the "indignant ten" other Apostles who rebuked James and John? Or are we also quick to see the errors of others and rash in passing judgment on them? How do we live in response to Jesus who gave his life "as a ransom for many"? © J. S. Paluch Co., Inc.
