#### **PURPOSE OF COMMITTEE**

How do I know when it's okay to withdraw medical treatment for a loved one? Why is "pulling the plug" not the same things as euthanasia -- or is it? What is a DNR, and why would I want one? These questions and others, including those surrounding assisted nutrition and hydration as well as advanced directives, will be addressed in the context of the tradition of Catholic teaching on the dignity of human life and the ethics of medical care at the end of life.
