The Purpose of Salt Jesus used everyday items to communicate truths about God and his people, and his description of the disciples as "the salt of the earth" (Matt. 5:13) is one of the best-known examples. Flavoring: We are intended to spread

throughout the world and enhance it, adding flavor to life; drawing out the blessings of whatever is good, and providing contrast by being distinct... different. **Preserving:** Disciples of Jesus are sent into the world to save it from decay, preserving its goodness and preventing it from becoming corrupted, spoiled or ruined. Salt does not just savor. It saves. **Sacrificing:** Because it flavored food and prevented spoilage, salt was a necessary part of all of Israelite sacrifices and represented God's covenant with them. When we offer ourselves in obedient, self-sacrifice, we become the seasoning on a cosmic sacrifice making it pleasing to God. **Destroying:** there are more scriptural references to salt being used for judgment or destruction than any other purpose. The existence of the church; preaching and living out the gospel, proclaims judgment against the enemies of God and serves as what Paul calls "a clear sign to them of their destruction." **Fertilizing:** Disciples are fertilizers; meant to stimulate growth, to enrich the soil, kill weeds, protect against disease, and bring life to unexpected places.



Before Ash Wednesday catches you unawares, give some thought to how you want to spend this Lent. If you have no idea where to begin, here is a solid foundation to work from. There are three holy practices which Catholics are called to embrace in penitential seasons such as Lent and Advent. These three practices are **prayer**, **fasting**, and **almsgiving**. When you make your Lenten plan, choose something specific from each category. This will help assure you have a grace-filled journey toward Easter. Lent is the perfect time to build faith-filled habits. As Catholics, we should pray

every day. **Prayer** is conversation and communion with the God who made and loves us. No relationship flourishes if we fail to spend time in the presence of a loved one, conversing with them and offering them genuine attention. Priests and spiritual advisors suggest fifteen minutes per day is the absolute minimum. If you already do this, try adding a rosary. Fasting: On Lenten Fridays, Catholics are requested to abstain from meat. On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 are required to fast. We do this by having only one regular meal two smaller meals which, added together, do not amount to the full meal. In, and of itself, this is a moderate form of fasting. Fasting formerly meant taking no food. (Recommended reading <u>Eat, Fast, Feast</u> by Jay W. Richards). The Bible spells out specific spiritual benefits of fasting. It produces humility (Ps 69:10). It demonstrates sorrow for our sins (1 Sam 7:6). It clears a path to God (Dan 9:3). It is a means of discerning God's will (Ezr 8:21) and is a powerful method of prayer (8:23). It is a mark of true conversion (Jl 2:12). In all the excitement over fasting and giving things up, almsgiving is often forgotten. Yet almsgiving is a crucial work of charity in which we Christians are called to participate. Jesus praised the poor widow who gave "all she had" to the temple treasury (Luke 21:1-4). St. James reminded us faith must go handin-hand with good works, such as care for the poor. This isn't easy to say, but when we give alms, we are supposed to give, not merely from our "plenty," but enough to make it hurt—or at least pinch. For those who can not give money, we can seek to give our talent and or time. Pray about what alms you can give and to who. PRAY.FAST.GIVE and have a very meaningful LENT.

St Paul Miki was born into a wealthy Japanese family. He was educated by the Jesuits in Azuchi and Takatsuki. He joined the Society of Jesus and became a well known and successful preacher – gaining numerous converts to Catholicism. The Emperor of Japan, Toyotomi Hideyoshi, began persecuting Catholics for fear of the Jesuits' influence and intentions, and possibly European visitors. Miki was arrested and jailed

with a group of fellow Catholics, who were later forced to march 966 kilometers (600 miles) from Kyoto to Nagasaki; all the while singing the Te Deum. On 5 February 1597 he arrived in Nagasaki (which today has the largest Catholic population in Japan). Credible accounts indicate Miki's chest was pierced with a lance while tied to a cross . He preached his last sermon from this cross. The accounts also maintain he forgave his executioners. Crucified alongside him were Joan Soan (de Gotó) and Santiago Kisai, also of the Society of Jesus; as well as twenty-three other clergy and laity, **all of whom were canonized by Pope Pius IX in 1862.**

Where Does Lent Come From? Lent draws its inspiration from the 40 days Jesus spent in the desert. After his baptism, Jesus fasted in the desert and was tempted by the devil. The devil took him to the top of a high mountain, and showed him all the kingdoms of the world in their magnificence, and said to him, "All these I shall give to you, if you will prostrate yourself and worship me." At this, Jesus said

to him, "Get away, Satan! It is written: 'The Lord, your God, shall you worship and him alone shall you serve.'" The devil left him and, angels came and ministered to him. Matthew 4: 8-11. After successfully resisting these temptations, he left the desert and went to Galilee to begin his public ministry. During Lent we are called to *Pray*, *Fast and Face our Demons*, whatever they may be.


