Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you... When Jesus told us to love our ene-

When Jesus told us to love our enemies, He was creating a new standard. He told the crowds listening to His Sermon on the Mount, they knew they were to love their neighbor, because the command to love our neighbor was a law of God

(Leviticus 19:18). The Jews inferred, incorrectly, they were to hate their enemies. No Bible verse explicitly says "hate your enemy," but the Pharisees may have misapplied some of the Old Testament passages about hatred for God's enemies (Psalm 139:19-22; 140:9-11). Jesus replaces this idea with an even higher standard: "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be sons of your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:44-45). Jesus explains: loving those who love us is easy and even unbelievers can do that. Then He commands us to "be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:43-48). We should adhere to the real meaning of God's law by loving our enemies as well as our neighbors. After giving us the command to love our enemies, Jesus then challenges us to: "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48).



The first day of Lent is Ash Wednesday. During this day of reflection, Catholics wear a marking of the cross in ash on their foreheads. The ashes symbolize our mortality – "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return." The ash is created by burning palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday celebration. Ash Wednesday begins the 40 days of lent, a time when we remember Jesus spent 40 days in the desert fasting and resisting temptation. The day before Ash Wednesday, known by many as "Shrove" or "Fat Tuesday", is a chance to feast and indulge. Some cultures have special

celebrations, such as Mardi Gras. We do this to prepare for our own fasting, on Ash Wednesday and throughout Lent. As Jesus grew hungry from fasting in the desert, he was faced with three temptations. Satan appeared before him and told him to turn stones into bread so he would have something to eat. Jesus resisted, knowing he was being tempted to do something God did not want. He knew the word of God, was just as important as bread, to his survival. Then he was brought to the top of the Temple in Jerusalem and told, if he truly was the Son of God, he should jump from the building and angels would carry him to safety. Jesus again resisted, knowing not to challenge God. Finally, Jesus was brought to the top of a mountain and told, all the kingdoms he saw would be his if he knelt before Satan. Jesus again resisted again, proclaiming it is only right to give worship to God. We too are tempted to satiate our appetites, to pursue our "20 minutes of fame" in spectacular ways and to strive to be abundantly successful in life. Our salvation, however, does not come from pleasure, power and prestige, but by following Christ's example.

What is Lent?

Lent is the penitential period and liturgical season which leads to the celebration of the Easter Triduum. When did Lent start? The observance of Lent as a 40-day time period began after the Council of Nicea in 325 A.D. Who celebrates Lent? Lent has traditionally been associated with the Catholic Church, but some Protestants, Orthodox Christians, and others also observe some form of Lent. What is the purpose of Lent? What does it represent? Lent begins with a visible, outward sign of ashes but aims toward inner conversion, helping us repent, avoid distractions, and focus on living the Gospel. What should I give up for Lent? Sacrifice something meaningful to will help you draw closer to God. OR, focus on small acts which manifest the love God calls us to share? Why don't Catholics eat meat on Fridays during Lent? Abstaining from meat is a sacrifice and a small act of self-discipline which dates to the early Church. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday have additional rules for fasting and abstinence.



This is in stark contrast to the abundant feasts of Easter. What is the color of Lent? Violet (purple) is the color of Lent. On Laetare Sunday, priests will wear rose (pink) as a small break from the solemn purple and a reminder that Easter is drawing near. During Palm Sunday and Good Friday, priests wear red vestments. The color of Easter is white.

George Washington and Christianity Shortly after his inauguration as president, religious communities began writing to Washington. He told these groups, the only being to whom Americans owed an explanation of their religious beliefs was God. When the Virginia Baptists wrote about their qualms the new Constitution did not specifically guarantee freedom of religion. They went on to say they knew they were in good hands with Washington at the head of the government. The President advised them he would never have signed the Constitution if he thought it would endanger the religious rights of any group. There are some who



believe Washington was only speaking of religious freedom in regard to Christian denominations, but did not intend it to apply to other religions. His response? "It is now no more that toleration is spoken of, as if it was by the indulgence of one class of people, that another enjoyed the exercise of their inherent natural rights. For happily the Government of the United States, which gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance, requires only they who live under its protection should demean themselves as good citizens, in giving it on all occasions their effectual support."

Burning of Palms: Sunday, February 19 following 10:00 am Mass

Traditionally, the ashes for the Ash Wednesday service come from burning the palm fronds from the previous year's Palm Sunday celebration. Ashes are a biblical

symbol of mourning and penance when the custom was to fast, wear sackcloth, sit in dust and ashes and put dust and ashes on one's head. Blessed ashes have been used in God's rituals since the time of Moses. They also symbolize death and, therefore, remind us of our mortality. Thus when the minister uses their thumb to sign one of the faithful with the ashes, they may say, "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return."


