**The Man Born Blind** "If he is a sinner, I do not know. One thing I do know is that I was blind and now I see." ~ John 9:25

We live in a society which wants to know everything about everything. Our airwaves and print media are jammed with a great many opinions, but very little truth. The story of the man born blind is about three

groups who encounter truth in very different ways.

The Pharisees' stated purpose is to get to the bottom of this situation. They seem to want a factual accounting of what happened. But in point of fact their version of truth has already been predetermined. Anything which does not align with their world view must be wrong or untrue. There are many people today who, when information seems counter to their beliefs, they simply ignore or discard it.

The parents are noncommittal. They just don't take a stand and defer to their son. The man who was blind is a truth seeker. He shares the truths which he understands, and admits what he doesn't know or understand.

So who is truly blind in this story? The man who was born blind recognizes Jesus as being "from God." The Pharisees who were born sighted can not see (recognize) Jesus, the Son of God. They choose to be blinded by their beliefs.

As stewards of our faith we must come to realize our faith is not a destination, but a journey. Life is a series of encounters with truths and falsehoods. If we are biased we will only accept those things which support our world view. If we are noncommittal, life will simply wash over us. ## Laetare Sunday-The Fourth Sunday of Lent

Laetare Sunday is the fourth Sunday in the season of Lent, in the Western Christian liturgical calendar. Traditionally, this Sunday has been a day of celebration, within the austere period of Lent. It gets its name from the first few words of the traditional Latin entrance (Introit) for the Mass of the day. "Laetare Jerusalem" ("Rejoice, O Jerusalem") It is also known as Mothering Sunday, Refreshment Sunday, mid-Lent Sunday and Rose Sunday (either because the golden rose sent by Popes to Catholic sovereigns used to be blessed at this time, or because the use of rose-colored rather than violet vestments was permitted on this day). The station church at Rome for this day was Santa Croce in Gerusalemme, one of the seven chief basilicas;

the Golden Rose, sent by Popes to Catholic sovereigns, used to be blessed at this time and for this reason the day was sometimes called Dominica de Rosa. The Sunday is considered a day of relaxation from normal Lenten rigors; a day of hope with Easter at last within sight. Traditionally, weddings (otherwise banned during Lent) could be performed on this day, and servants were released from service for the day to visit their mother church, the place in which they received the sacrament of baptism (hence 'Mothering Sunday'). Laetare Sunday is the date on which the recipient of University of Notre Dame's Laetare Medal is announced.

## **Common Questions About Confirmation**

**Requirements:** Candidates for Confirmation must be baptized and have received Holy Communion. Candidates are normally between 11-16 years of age. There is a period of preparation to help parents and candidates understand the purpose of Confirmation.

What is the process of confirmation? Confirmation consists of a prayer to the Holy Spirit, the laying on of hands while the prayer is said, and the anointing of the candidate with the oil of Chrism. The Church teaches Confirmation confirms Baptism and is the second formal step in the process of becoming initiated into the Christian community. How do I know if my child is ready for Confirmation? If a baptized child of catechetical age is growing up in a home where the faith of the parents is



expressed in personal prayer, regular worship with a parish community, and in a life lived in accordance with Gospel values, then the child is ready. The purpose of the sacrament preparation program is to help children and parents prepare for these initiation events. A child's readiness for initiation is not a matter of religious instruction

What does the Church ask of parents in sacrament preparation?

The church views the role of parents in religious formation of children as both a privilege and an obligation. When you presented your child to the Church for Baptism, you were distinctly reminded that you have the responsibility to "bring [your child] up in the practice of the faith" (*Rite of Baptism* 56). This privilege and obligation extends to all sacrament preparation.


