Lord, if you had been here, my brother would

not have died." ~John 11:21

How often in our lives do we ask, "God, where
were you? Why weren't you here for me? Why
did you let this happen?" Mary's statement
contains this question, "Where were you; if
you had only been here this would not have

contains this question, "Where were you; if you had only been here this would not have happened?" Like it or not most of us think we can "manage" our lives. We convince ourselves everything will be OK provided we organize everything and control the outcome. Technology has provided us with a plethora of gadgets to help us along the way. We are wired in and electronically organized against



any and all possible scenarios. Somehow it all gives us a false sense of security. And yet, the unexpected, like death, still comes. As a hospice nurse once said to me, "only in America do we think death is an option." It is only when things go wrong that we turn to God and ask: Why? Or perhaps why me? As stewards of the 24 hours God gave us today we realize "time management" is an oxymoron. We can't manage time. We can only make decisions about what we will do with the time we are given. Regardless of how we choose to spend it, Jesus is always with us. After he is raised from the dead Lazarus is released from his "burial bands". We too are bound with the bands of worry, frustration and fear. Worry, frustration and fear from which our electronic calendars and organizers can't protect us. During this Lenten season we have the opportunity to die to ourselves and rise to Christ. In so doing, we too will be released from our bands of worry, frustration and fear. In this story of the resurrection of Lazarus Jesus, who himself suffers physical death shortly thereafter, seems to say, "Don't worry, I am always here, even when it seems I'm not; even in the face of death."

March 26th—The Fifth Sunday of Lent

'Out of the depths I call to you O Lord: Lord hear my cry. Listen attentively to the sound of my pleading!' (Ps 129:1-2). In this, the fifth Sunday of Lent, the Church invites us to turn our attention to the realities that are perhaps the most 'scandalous' in human experience, the death of a loved one. In this Gospel we see all those who are being supportive of Martha and Mary at the moment of their brother, Lazarus' death. Previously called "Passion Sunday," this **Fifth Sunday of Lent** marks the beginning of Passiontide, a deeper time of Lent. This is the third Sunday of the scrutinies for the preparation of adult converts, and the final Sunday of Lent before the beginning of Holy Week. The Liturgy of the Word of this day speaks of re-creation, resurrection, and new life. Today the option of covering of sacred images is practiced. The rubrics in *The Third Edition of the Roman Missal* states, In the Dioceses of the United States, the practice of covering crosses and images throughout the church from this Sunday may be observed. Crosses remain covered until the end of the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, but images remain cov-

Palm Sunday April 02, 2023

Palm Sunday is the final Sunday of Lent, the beginning of Holy Week, and commemorates the triumphant arrival of Christ in Jerusalem, days before he was crucified. Palm Sunday is known as such because the faithful will often receive palm fronds which they use to participate in the reenactment of Christ's arrival in Jerusalem.

In the Gospels, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a young donkey, and to the lavish praise of the townspeople who threw clothes, or possibly palms or small branches, in front of him as a sign of homage. This was a customary practice for people of great respect.

Palm branches are widely recognized symbol of peace and victory, hence their preferred use on Palm Sunday. The use of a donkey instead of a horse is highly symbolic, it represents the humble arrival of someone in peace, as opposed to arriving on a steed in war. A week later, Christ would rise from the dead on the first Easter.

During Palm Sunday Mass, palms are distributed to parishioners who carry them in a ritual procession into church. The palms are blessed and many people will fashion them into small crosses or other items of personal devotion. These may be returned to the church, or kept for the year.

How did the egg come to represent Easter? Throughout history, people across the world have given each other eggs at spring festivals to mark the seasons. Early Christians in Mesopotamia dyed eggs in the period after Easter. The practice was adopted by the Orthodox Churches, and from there it spread into Western Europe. Eggs represent new life and rebirth, so this ancient custom was absorbed into Easter celebrations. During Lent, when Christians fasted to mark Jesus' time in the wilderness, eggs were one of the foods people were not allowed to eat. So when Easter Sunday came around, eggs were a real treat.

Various traditions and superstitions sprang up around the egg at Easter. Eggs laid on Good Friday were said to turn into diamonds if they were kept for 100 years. Some thought eggs cooked on Good Friday and eaten on Easter would promote fertility and prevent sudden death, and it became the custom to have your eggs blessed before you ate them.
