The 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, drive out demons. Without cost you have received; without cost you are to give." This calling continues today. Jesus calls us (just as he called the twelve) to continue His loving ministry in the world. Each of us is a unique creation of God vested with a very special combination of "Gifts" (talents and abilities)



At baptism, we receive the water of God's love and the oil of service, completed in confirmation (as well as in marriage and ordination.) The needs of God's people are as great today as then. In a world of addiction, suicide, confusion, poverty, and injustice, Jesus still sees people 'like sheep without a shepherd'. He calls each of us, male and female, young and old into His service. If we combine the first reading: : "You will be my chosen people, and you will serve me as priests", with the last: "The harvest is great but the laborer's are few."

In Europe and North America ordained priests are few, many parishes are "priestless", and seminaries are half-empty. Is there is message here from God? We all share the priesthood of the faithful that is ours through baptism: we are given there the role of serving the Christian community in any way we can. Even where fewer priests are being ordained, the church is thriving in some places where the Christian community is reduced to basics. Each of us is a unique creation, with a special combination of Talents, Time and Treasure. Discern first your gifts, ask God for guidance and direction and then answer the call.

What is Juneteenth? Juneteenth commemorates June 19, 1865, the day enslaved African Americans in Galveston, TX, learned they were free. President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863, but it only applied to Confederate states. In Texas, a Confederate state, where there was no large Union Army presence, slavery continued — even after the 13th



Amendment was passed. Many in the state were unaware of the news. Finally, in June of 1865, Major General Gordon Granger and Union troops landed in Galveston, Texas to tell the enslaved African-Americans living there, the Civil War had ended and they were now free. According to the Texas State Historical Association, Granger stayed in Texas for six weeks, following the announcement, to encourage newly emancipated Texans to sign labor agreements with former plantation owners while waiting on support from the Freedmen's Bureau. The year after emancipation, in 1866, formerly enslaved Black Texans began celebrating the event with annual "Jubilee Day" festivities. This commemoration is now known as **Juneteenth**.

The Women Behind Father's Day

The first known Father's Day service occurred in Fairmont, West Virginia, on July 5, 1908, after hundreds of men died in the worst mining accident in U.S. history. Grace Golden Clayton, the daughter of a dedicated minister, proposed a service to honor all fathers, especially those who had died. It did not become an annual event, as few people of the local area knew about it. In 1909, Sonora Smart Dodd of Spokane, Washington, was inspired by Anna Jarvis and the idea of Mother's Day. Her father, William Jackson Smart, was also a single parent who raised Sonora and her five brothers by himself, after his wife Ellen died giving birth to their youngest child in 1898. While attending a



Mother's Day church service in 1909, Sonora, then 27 years old, came up with the idea. Within a few months, Sonora had convinced the Spokane Ministerial Association and the YMCA to set aside a Sunday in June to celebrate fathers. She proposed June 5, her father's birthday, but the ministers chose the third Sunday in June so that they would have more time after Mother's Day (the second Sunday in May) to prepare their sermons. On June 19, 1910, the first Father's Day events commenced: Sonora delivered presents to handicapped fathers, boys from the YMCA decorated their lapels with fresh-cut roses (red for living fathers, white for the deceased), and the city's ministers devoted their homilies to fatherhood. The widely publicized events in Spokane struck a chord that reached all the way to Washington, D.C., and Sonora's celebration put the idea on the path to becoming a national holiday. However, the holiday did not catch on right away, perhaps due to the perceived parallels with Mother's Day. The first bill was introduced in Congress in 1913, but in spite of encouragement from President Woodrow Wilson, it did not pass. Eight years later, President Calvin Coolidge signed a resolution in favor of Father's Day "to establish more intimate relations between fathers and their children and to impress upon fathers the full measure of their obligations." In 1966, President Lyndon Johnson signed an executive order that the holiday be celebrated on the third Sunday in June. Under President Richard Nixon, in 1972, Congress passed an act officially making Father's Day a national holiday. (Six years later, Sonora died at age 96.)
