



Angels? What They Are. And, What They are Not!

Angels are not chubby, flying babies with wings. Angels are spirit beings created by God to serve Him. "Are not all angels ministering spirits sent to serve those who will inherit salvation?" (Hebrews 1:14). Angels are ministering spirits, sent by God to do His will. While many people believe in the existence of guardian angels, nowhere in the Bible are we told we have a guardian angel. The "Biblical" are Michael and Gabriel. Catholic tradition also includes Rafael; however, there is no record of him in the Bible. Therefore, the only two angels named in the Bible are Michael and Gabriel. Both

are seen as obeying God, serving God, and helping those to whom God sends them. As in the case of Daniel the prophet, God sent Gabriel to talk with him (Daniel 9:20-23). Gabriel is God's messenger to the people. We also see Gabriel fulfill this role when he appears to Mary (Luke 1:26-38). Michael is an archangel, and he fulfills his role to God of keeping humans safe at God's command. As in the case of the rapture of the church, it is Michael who will be carefully guiding believers to heaven with the Lord.

The Solemnity of The Nativity of St John the Baptist-June 24, 2023

Each year on June 24 the Catholic Church honors the birth of St John the Baptist by reflecting on his unique role as the precursor of Jesus. The solemnity held on June 24th praises John as a worthy example of what it means to be a follower of Christ. (A solemnity is the most significant feast the Church can establish.) While other saints are remembered with feast days to remember their deaths, St. John the Baptist, like the Virgin Mary's, is honored with solemnities to recall both his birth and his death. While never overshadowing the Father or the Son, the mysteries of John's birth and his prominent role in the life of Christ are given special significance by the Church.

Normally, when a saint's feast day or solemnity falls on a Sunday, it is superseded by the Sunday liturgy. The solemnity honoring John the Baptist's nativity is one of the exceptions. If it occurs on the Lord's Day, the prayers, readings and psalms associated with the solemnity of John are not replaced by a different Sunday liturgy.

John died a martyr, a witness to the one , true God. His martyrdom is celebrated by the Church with a memorial on Aug.

29. Yet even if John had not been a martyr, the Church would, no doubt, have still celebrated his life and ministry as the herald of Jesus Christ our Savior.

The solemnity of the Nativity of John the Baptist is one of the Church's oldest celebrations introduced into both the Eastern and Western liturgies. It was publicly observed as early as the fourth century. June 24 was eventually chosen as the date for the solemnity because Scripture tells us John was conceived six months before Jesus (see Lk 1:36). Presumably, then, John was born about six months before Christ, and Christ's nativity was celebrated on Christmas Eve, Dec. 24.

Open Wide Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love

The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops recently approved a new pastoral letter **Open Wide Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love** – examining the "persistent" history of racism in this nation. Fr. Simon Kim, Director of Intercultural Initiatives at the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley, served on the original drafting committee and offers the following summary:

As bishops of the Catholic Church in the United States, we want to address one particularly destructive and persistent form of evil. Despite many promising strides made in our country, racism still infects our nation (3).

The 2018 Pastoral Letter against Racism, Open Wide Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love, by the USCCB addresses a growing concern in our country based on a continuous history of discrimination and violence along with extreme nationalist ideologies (4). With a posture of humility, the words of the prophet Micah are highlighted in the letter as a way of acknowledging that history of racism as a call to overcome the sins of omission when it comes to combating racism and in working for racial reconciliation: "You have been told, O mortal, what is good, and what the Lord requires of you: Only to do justice and to love goodness, and to walk humbly with your God" (Mi 6:8)

"The persistence of the evil of racism is why we are writing this letter now. People are still being harmed, so action is needed (7)" say the Bishops. It is also fitting, they note, that this statement was released on the fiftieth anniversary of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. as the Bishops point to Dr. King's leadership which includes both ecumenical and interreligious collaboration as the way



to address the roots of racism embedded in this country's policies and institutions (28-29). Racism, then, not only resides within our hearts, but also in social structures of our culture and institutions (5). Therefore, justice is required where we must put our world into right relationships with God, one another, and creation.

June 29: The Feast Day of Sts. Peter & Paul. As early as the year 258, there is evidence of a lengthy tradition of celebrating the solemnities of Saints Peter and Paul on the same day. Together, the two saints are the founders of the See of Rome, through their preaching, ministry and martyrdom there. St Peter, who was named Simon, was a fisherman of Galilee and was introduced to the Lord Jesus by his brother Andrew, also a fisherman. Jesus gave him the name Cephas (Petrus in Latin), which means 'Rock,' because he was to become the rock upon which Christ would build His Church. St Peter was a bold follower of the Lord. He was the first to recognize that Jesus was "the Messiah, the Son of the living God," and eagerly pledged his fidelity until death. In his boldness, he also made many mistakes, however, such as losing faith when walking on water with Christ and betraying the Lord on the night of His passion. Despite his human weaknesses, Peter was chosen to shepherd God's flock. St. Paul was the Apostle of the Gen-

tiles. His letters are included in the writings of the New Testament, and through them we learn much about his life and the faith of the early Church. Before receiving the name Paul, he was Saul, a Jewish pharisee who zealously persecuted Christians in Jerusalem. Scripture records Saul was present at the martyrdom of St. Stephen. Saul's conversion took place as he was on his way to Damascus to persecute the Christian community there. As he was traveling along the road, he was suddenly surrounded by a great light from heaven.
