17th Sunday in Ordinary Time - Matthew 13:44-52 "The kingdom of heaven is like a treasure buried in a field..."

The lesson of the two parables in today's reading, is as true for us, as it was for those to whom Christ spoke. We are called to imitate the two wise men, and surrender our earthly possessions, if necessary, in order to gain eternal life. Does this "giving all" mean we are expected to abandon the world and take on the religious vows of poverty, chastity and obedience? There are many who do just this. It is not the only way. Heaven is within the reach of all, who partake of this world's joys and pleasures within the framework of God's commandments. We should never lose sight of the goal. We need not take a vow of obedience, but we must obey all legitimate authority. We may possess the goods of this world, but only those we lawfully and justly acquire. Nor may we withhold from others in need. We need not take a vow of chastity, and yet we must use the gifts and the pleasure of sex only within the limits set down by God's laws. This is not easy, but we are not relying on human nature. We have the Church; all the spiritual and supernatural aid we need. We are so engrossed in chasing earthly comforts and pleasures



devoid of any spiritual outlook. Even those who believe in eternity after death, find it hard to allow their faith and convictions to govern and direct their daily actions. The evil example of others will never justify our wrong-doing. The commandments of God are still binding, even though they are openly and flagrantly violated by individuals and whole nations today.

What are Service, Peace and Justice Ministries?


We are called, as individuals and as a church to seek "peaceful solutions", create and support peace-related ministries. We are also called to learn about peaceful, just efforts around the world. Our Social Principles call us to love our enemies, seek justice, and serve as reconcilers of conflict. We insist the first moral duty of all nations is to work together to resolve, by peaceful means, every dispute which arises between or among them. The Church, with its historic commitment to peace and justice, can and should provide leadership for social transformation.

We recognize and renew our call for social transformation, for the quest to open the doors of opportunity for all, to distribute resources more equitably, and to provide better care for persons in need. We can witness this "social transformation" daily. It is alive and well at the window of our Christian Service Kitchen. We see it

in the faces of our "Get on the Bus" families, as they prepare to board buses to visit incarcerated loved ones. And, in the faces of seniors, who reside in care facilities, when they receive hand-knotted blankets from our Junior Daughters.

July 31: St Ignatius of Loyola July 31

Saint Ignatius of Loyola, was a Spanish Catholic priest and theologian, who, with six companions, founded the religious order of the Society of Jesus (The Jesuits), and became its first Superior General, in Paris in 1541. Ignatius envisioned the purpose of the Society of Jesus to be missionary work and teaching. In addition to the vows of chastity, obedience and poverty of other religious orders in the church, Loyola instituted a fourth vow for Jesuits of obedience to the Pope, to engage in projects ordained by the pontiff. Jesuits were instrumental in leading the Counter-Reformation. As a former soldier, Ignatius paid particular attention to the spiritual formation of his recruits and recorded his method in the Spiritual Exercises (1548). In time, the method has become known as Ignatian spirituality. He was beatified in 1609 and was canonized as a saint on 12 March 1622.

His feast day is celebrated on 31 July. He is the patron saint of the Basque provinces of Gipuzkoa and Biscay as well as of the Society of Jesus. He was declared patron saint of all spiritual retreats by Pope Pius XI in 1922. While recovering from surgery, Íñigo underwent a spiritual conversion and discerned a call to the religious life. In order to divert the wea-

ry hours of convalescence, he asked for the romances of chivalry, his favourite reading, but there were none in the castle, and instead his beloved sister-in-law, Magdalena de Araoz brought him the lives of Christ and of the saints. The religious work which most particularly struck him was the "De Vita Christi" by Ludolph of Saxony. This book would influence his whole life, inspiring him to devote himself to God and follow the example of Francis of Assisi and other great monks. In 1539, with Peter Faber and Francis Xavier, Ignatius formed the Society of Jesus, which was approved in 1540 by Pope Paul III. He was chosen as the first Superior General of the order and invested with the title of "Father General" by the Jesuits. Ignatius sent his companions on missions across Europe to create schools, colleges, and seminaries. Ignatius died in Rome on 31 July 1556, probably of the "Roman Fever", a severe variant of malaria which was endemic in Rome throughout medieval history.

What is the Difference Between the Ascension of Jesus and the Assumption of Mary???

The essential difference is: Jesus **ascends** of His own power and will because He is divine. On the other hand, Mary does not raise herself. God raises her; she is taken up (or "assumed into) heaven. The Assump-



tion of Mary and the Ascension of the Lord are two different events. At the same time, both of them indicate a way of elevation for us, human and spiritual, to which we are all called. The beauty of these callings is they invite interior growth, renovation and transformation in our lives. Furthermore, these celebrations of our Church remind us "death" is not the end of our human story. Death is just a transition to the true life with God; life eternal in the fullness of God's love. The Ascension is not a separation of Jesus from our reality here on earth. On the contrary, as Jesus ascends into heaven to be at the right hand of God the Father, He is



bringing together heaven and earth so the Glory of God may shower us more fully. Finally, the purpose of this closeness between heaven and earth is the commissioning of the Church, the Mystical Body of Christ, to continue the work of Jesus. The Church is called to be a missionary Church.

Originally the month of August had a special feast of the Virgin Mary which was in response to World War II and Fatima.

In the Catholic Church there grew over time specific "devotions" that were assigned to each month of the year. The month of June became associated with the Sacred

Heart of Jesus because the feast of the Sacred Heart always falls within that month. August became known as a month dedicated to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, but currently it is difficult to know why this is the case. There exists no particular feast and the main celebration in August is the Assumption of the Virgin Mary on August 15. The reason why August became associated with the Immaculate Heart of Mary is because of World War II and the devotion of Pope Pius XII to Our Lady of Fatima.
