Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord - Matthew 17:01-09

"This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; ...listen to him."

What can we learn from the Transfiguration? **Authority:** Jesus is in the presence of Moses



and Elijah. Moses is the liberator of the Jews. He brought the law to the people. Elijah is one of the most powerful and dramatic prophets of the Old Testament – demonstrating God's power and authority time and again. Even at the end of his life, Elijah does not die. Rather, he is taken up. In the presence of these two individuals, Peter suggests the building of three tabernacles, but the voice of Heaven elevates Jesus above Moses and Elijah. There is room for only one tabernacle. Peter later recalls this event and reaffirms the authority placed upon Jesus in this event. Jesus' spiritual glory becomes visible to those with Him, and Mark even seems to struggle in describing this event. This visually reinforces Jesus' role as "God among us". God's glory is revealed in Jesus. John 14:7-10 records Jesus equating Himself with the Father, and He claims knowing Him is akin to knowing God the Father. In II Corinthians 4:6, Paul writes Jesus is the light of God's glory. His word, and our reflection of His glory should be growing every day. Jesus is elevated to a position of authority unattained by other Bible figures. Yet, He remains dedicated to the will of the Father. He demonstrates kindness and concern toward others, regardless of external factors. Our lives should reflect His determination and attitudes with the goal of attaining our "transformation" which will come on the last day.

Starting a New Ministry? Things to Consider.

Many of us, at one time or another, have thought about starting a new ministry, but never really get beyond that point. Usually it is because we have no idea where to start. Here are a few steps for you to consider to begin the process, 1) Build a Prayer Team.

Find people who love you and believe in you to pray for your new endeavor. 2) Align the Ministry to Your Calling. 3) Define Your Objective. 4) Find the Right People to assist and support you. 5) Identify "Your Gifts" (Time, Talent and Treasure) and what gifts will need to

be supplied by others. 6) Create a budget; consider sources of funding, and other necessary resources (like volunteers). Then Set Your Budget. 7) Establish a Timeline and make it flexible enough so adjustments can be made as needed.

August 04: St John Vianney-Patron Saint of Parish Priests

The patron saint of Parish Priests is St. Jean Marie Baptiste Vianney. In English: Saint John Vianney. He was born on May 8, 1786 in the village of Dardilly in France. After serving a time in the army during the Napoleonic period he entered seminary formation to become a priest. Unfortunately, he was a poor student and struggled with all his studies. He had a particularly difficult time with Latin. Many, including his formation directors and instructors in the seminary and his own bishop, had serious doubts regarding his suitability for the priesthood. John Vianney persevered however and was ordained a priest in 1815. His bishop, based upon his lack of abilities, sent him to the remotest backwater village of his diocese, the village of Ars. There Fr. John Vianney spent the rest of his life except for one brief period when he tried to flee the duties and pressures of parish life, to find a quiet place where he could pray in peace and solitude. It was not in God's plan for him and he soon returned to Ars. He was a man of great dedication to his call to be a priest and to serve his people. He preached in a



very simple manner, had a great love of the Blessed Sacrament and the Blessed Mother and had a special devotion to St. Philomena. Through his work as a confessor he brought about a spiritual renewal which touched, not only the people of his parish, but all of France. He regularly spent 14 to 18 hours a day in the confessional surviving on only a few hours of sleep and a diet of boiled potatoes. As the word spread of his extraordinary abilities as a confessor, thousands, including bishops and aristocracy, made the journey to Ars in order to receive his spiritual counsel. Thus a man who started his life as one who very few thought would ever amount to anything became, by the time of his death in 1859, the vehicle for thousands of conversions. He is, for us today, an example of how God works wonderfully through those who dedicate their lives to him and who seek to do his will. John Vianney, a humble parish priest, is regarded by the Church as one of its great figures simply because he was faithful. *John Vianney was canonized by Pope Pius XI in* 1925. He is the only diocesan priest ever to be canonized. He is the patron saint of clergy throughout the world.





Dormition ("Falling Asleep") of the Mother of God???

The "Dormition" of the Mother of God is a Feast which celebrates the "falling asleep" (death) of Mary the Theotokos (God-bearer), and her being "taken up" into heaven (bodily assumption). It is celebrated on 15 August as the "Feast of the Dormition of the Mother of God". In Western Churches the corresponding feast is known as the "Assumption of Mary." Christian canonical scriptures do not record the death or Dormition of Mary. Hippolytus of Thebes, a 7th- or 8th-century author, writes in his partially preserved chronology of the New Testament, Mary lived for 11 years after the death of Jesus, dying in AD 41. The use of the term "dormition" expresses the belief she died, without suffering, in a state of spiritual peace. This belief does not rest on any scriptural basis, but is affirmed by Orthodox sacred tradition. Some apocryphal writings testify to this opinion, though neither the Orthodox Church nor other Christians accord them scriptural authority. The Orthodox understanding of the Dormition is compatible with Roman Catholic teaching, and was the dominant belief within the Western

Church until late in the Middle Ages, when the slightly different belief in the bodily Assumption of Mary into heaven began to gain ground. Pope Pius XII declared the latter a dogma of the Catholic Church in 1950.



Have you ever wondered what an Altar Server Does???

Altar Servers carry the cross, the processional candles, hold the book for the priest celebrant when he is not at the altar, carry the incense and censer, present the bread, wine, and water to the priest during the preparation of the gifts or assist him when he receives the gifts from the people, wash the hands of the priest, assist the priest celebrant and deacon as necessary. Servers respond to the prayers and dia-

logues of the priest along with the congregation. They also join in singing the hymns and other chants of the liturgy. Servers should be seated in a place from which they can easily assist the priest celebrant and deacon. The place next to the priest is normally reserved for the deacon.
