"...am I not free to do as I wish with my own money? Are you envious because I am generous? Thus, the last will be first, and the first will be last." Matthew 20:16 Coveting lies at the heart of this parable, Jesus' teaching in this Gospel, and the overarch-


ing emphasis in Matthew on the Law and Jesus' representation of it in a way which transforms our thinking and doing. We covet what God chooses to give others. We are invited to see ourselves in the story, and then apply it to our own lives. The wages at stake (even at the moment of Jesus' first telling of the parable) are not actual daily wages for vineyard-laborers, but forgiveness, life, and salvation for believers. We need not "be laborers in a vineyard". We are all, however, co-workers in the kingdom of God. The point here is not others receiving blessings from God we do not. Or, receiving more or better or lovelier gifts from God. The problem is: they get the same as us; and they do not deserve it, do they? They are less worthy, or later arrivals, or just plain worse sinners. Not *nothing* maybe, but certainly not the same. We have a tendency, as the parable aptly illustrates, to covet and to be resentful of what others receive from God. The owner of the vineyard asks those who have worked longest, and (presumably) hardest, for him, "Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?" The point being: God's grace, mercy, and forgiveness are God's to give away as God sees fit.

Shout Out to the St Vincent De Paul Society! More than a "Thrift Store!"

The *St Vincent De Paul Society* is a Catholic charity serving the poor and homeless of <u>any religion</u> for free. The organization has over 2,500 volunteers in LA, Ventura and Santa Barbara Counties who meet with the disadvantaged in their homes, in an effort to provide food, clothing, furniture, appliances, rental and other forms of financial assistance. The organization



also operates food pantries and soup kitchens, and a homeless program for men on Skid Row in LA providing access to housing for over 100 men a year. St. Vincent de Paul/Los Angeles is an international, Catholic volunteer organization which serves the needy of any religious background free of charge. The Charity was founded in Paris, France in 1833 by a compassionate college student, Frederic Ozanam. For over 100 years Vincentian volunteers have served the suffering in Southern California.



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September 27: St Vincent de Paul (24 April 1581 – 27 September 1660)

Saint Vincent de Paul, was an Occitan French Catholic priest who dedicated himself to serving the poor. In 1622 Vincent was appointed a chaplain to the galleys. After working for some time in Paris among imprisoned galley slaves, he returned to be the superior of what, is now known as, the Congregation of the Mission, or the "Vincentians" (in France known as "Lazaristes"), which he co-founded. These Vincentian priests, with vows of poverty, chastity, obedience, and stability, were to devote themselves entirely to the people in smaller towns and villages. Vincent was zealous in conducting retreats for clergy at a time when the local clergy's morals were flagging. He was a pioneer in seminary education and also founded the Daughters of Charity of Saint Vincent

de Paul. He is the namesake of the Vincentian Family of organizations, which includes both of the religious communities he founded. He was renowned for his compassion, humility, and generosity. Vincent was canonized in 1737 and is venerated as a saint in both the Catholic Church and the Anglican Communion.

Did You Know? Sept 23/24 Why it's important not to dismiss a child's everyday emotions?

A key part of creating a safe environment is being a trusted adult to the children in your care. Children who have been abused are more likely to confide in a trusted



adult whom they know will listen to and believe them. For this reason, it is important to affirm a child's everyday emotions, including anger or fear. Far too often, adults tell children "you're fine," or "get over it," in response to what a child perceives as a true emotional problem, but an adult may see as an inconvenience or insignificant event. Affirming a child's feelings while still helping them work through their issue productively will help create a bond of trust.
