


A Message from Bishop Matt—Our Regional Bishop Peace and All Good!

All Saints Day: An Historical Background

- Back when the Roman Empire persecuted Christians, a lot of martyrs died for their faith.
- A Greek Christian festival in the early fourth century was dedicated to honoring martyrs. It is believed to have ushered in All Saints' Day.
- In 609 A.D., under Pope Boniface IV, the first All Saints' Day was celebrated on May 13. He dedicated the Pantheon to the Virgin Mary and the Martyrs.
- In 837 A.D., Pope Gregory III made All Saints' Day a holiday celebrated on November 1, but it officially became a holy day of obligation under King Louis the Pious.
- People held vigils on the evening of October 31 to prepare for All Saints' Day.
- The Church in Ireland celebrated it on April 20 so that it would not coincide with Samhain, a pagan festival.
- After the Protestant Reformation, Protestants stopped praying for the dead on All Saints' Day. Instead, they commemorate the dead and those who have led holy lives on Earth.
- Methodists celebrate the day as a form of thanksgiving to God for the saints.
- Shakespeare coined the term "Hallowmas".
- White is the liturgical color of All Saints' Day.
- Common symbols associated with All Saints' Day are images or sculptures of saints, Manus Dei (the hand of God), the crown, and a sheaf of wheat.

Having celebrated the feast of all the members of the church who are believed to be in heaven, the church on earth turns, on the next day, to commemorate those souls believed to be suffering in purgatory.

Masses? Liturgies? Services? What's the Difference???

Liturgy and Mass are related concepts, but they are not the same thing. Liturgy refers to a set of prescribed religious rituals, prayers, and ceremonies used in a particular faith tradition. Mass, on the other hand, is the central act of worship in the Roman Catholic Church. It is a specific form of liturgy which includes the celebration of the Eucharist, which is the ritual re-enactment of the Last Supper. So, while Mass is a type of liturgy, not all liturgies are a Mass. Liturgy means official public worship. It comes from a Greek word meaning 'public work' or 'public service'. When some churches refer to their Sunday Services - 'service' in this context is a translation of 'liturgy'. The Eucharist, called by some Catholics the Mass, is the Sunday Liturgy, and the most important and universal Christian liturgy. So, the Mass is a liturgy, but not all liturgies are the Mass. Also included as liturgy are the

Liturgy of the Hours (e.g., Vespers/Evensong, Morning Prayer, etc), the Sacraments, funerals, etc. Liturgy is distinct from devotions, or private prayer. It is meant as the one time of the day or week that the entire community comes together to pray together as church, while the rest of the week can be filled with your own style of prayer and devotional practice.

All Souls Day? The "Feast of All the Faithful Departed" or 'All Souls' Day, in Roman Catholicism, is a day for commemorating all the faithful departed; those baptized Christians who are believed to be in purgatory because they died with the guilt of lesser sins on their souls. It is observed on November 2. Roman Catholic doctrine holds the prayers of the faithful on earth help cleanse these souls in order to make them worthy of the vision of God in heaven. All Souls Day is dedicated to prayer and remembrance. Requiem masses are commonly held, and many people visit and sometimes decorate the graves of loved ones. From antiquity certain days were devoted to intercession for particular groups of the dead. The institution of a day for a general intercession on November 2 is due to Odilo, abbot of Cluny (died 1048). The date, which became practically universal before the end of the 13th century, was chosen to follow All Saints' Day.

November 4-5 | Keeping children safe in sports Every adult has the responsibility to make sports a safe and enjoyable experience for children. Playing sports helps children work on sportsmanship, goal setting, personal responsibility, and emotional control. But sports also include some risks — the potential for physical injury, bullying, hazing, and even abuse. Because sports happen outside of "normal" school hours, there may be less safety checks than there are in school. Parents need to be vigilant in confirming that coaches and volunteers are vetted, and that their children are playing in safe environments.
