Commentary on the Sunday Mass Readings for the Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle C:

First Reading-Wisdom 18: 06-09

The Lord feeds Elijah, strengthening him for his journey to Horeb.

Second Reading - Paul's Letter to the Hebrews (11:1-2, 8-19)

This reading speaks of the virtue of faith,. It also provides an example of true faith as it can be seen to be active in Abraham and Sarah.

Gospel Reading: Luke 12: 32-48 or Luke 12: 35-40

In a few vivid and expressive similes, our Lord tells the disciples (and through them all his followers) how they are to conduct their lives on earth so they will always be found in God's friendship when their call to judgment comes. In answer to a question put to him by Peter, our Lord says more will be expected of those who have received greater gifts from God than of those who received lesser gifts. The reading also implies there will be a penalties for those of us who do not prepare for Jesus. It also leaves the impression,

none of us will be "fully prepared." Ponder these lines this week:

"Much will be required of the person entrusted with much, and still more will be demanded of the person entrusted with more."




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The 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time—August 10, 2025



The Gospel reading is from John 6:41-51. The main point of doctrine in this part of our Lord's discourse, as given by the Gospel writer John, is the necessity for belief in Christ who has come down from heaven. It is only in the last verse of today's text Christ explicitly states he is about to give his own very body as their spiritual food to those who believe in him. The description of himself as "bread from heaven" and the vital difference between the effect of this bread and the manna given to their fathers in the desert, are **a definite preparation for the announcement of the doctrine of the Eucharist**. Before accepting this teaching on the

Eucharist His listeners had first to accept Christ as divine, as the Son of God. This was not easy for Jews, for whom strict monotheism was the center of their faith. To admit Christ was God would at first sight seem like admitting two gods. Secondly, even though Christ had worked extraordinary miracles, to all He still appeared to be a mere man—and the prophets of old had worked miracles. True, Christ was evidently claiming to be more than a prophet; he claimed he alone had seen the Father, and he had come from the Father. This claim of equality with God would be sheer blasphemy if it were not true; could God give the power of miracles to such a great sinner? Perhaps some of them argued along these lines and accepted his claim later on. Others were stiff-necked and stubborn. They could perceived him as a native of Nazareth, a humble Galilean like themselves, but one who had developed strange ideas about who and what he was. This was the beginning of a long line of unbelievers, who have stretched down through the centuries to our own day. The reasons for the unbelief are the same today as they were in the year 29 A.D. Man is proud of his intelligence; which he did not give to himself. Whatever he cannot grasp within the limited confines of that intellect, he treats as non-existent as far as he is concerned. If a God exists, a doubtful possibility to these great thinkers, we mortals can know nothing about him; he is beyond our comprehension.

Extraordinary Ministers of Communion (EMC)

In every celebration of the Eucharist, there should be a sufficient number of ministers of Holy Communion so that it may be distributed in a reverent and orderly manner. Bishops, priests and deacons distribute Holy Communion in virtue of their office as ordinary ministers of the Body and Blood of the Lord. (1) When the

size of the congregation or the incapacity of the bishop, priest, or deacon requires it, the celebrant may be assisted by other bishops, priests, or deacons. If such ordinary ministers of Holy Communion are not present, "the priest may call upon extraordinary ministers to assist him, i.e., duly instituted acolytes or even other faithful who have been deputed for this purpose. In case of necessity, the priest may also depute suitable faithful for this single occasion (GIRM 162). "Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion should receive sufficient spiritual, theological, and practical preparation to fulfill their role with knowledge and reverence. In all matters they should follow the guidance of the diocesan bishop (Norms for the Distribution and Reception of Holy Communion Under Both Kinds for the Dioceses of the United States of America, NDRHC, no. 28). When recourse is had to Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion, especially in the distribution of Holy Communion under both kinds, their number should not be increased beyond what is required for the orderly and reverent distribution of the Body and Blood of the Lord. In all matters such Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion should follow the guidance of the diocesan bishop (IBID). United States Council of Catholic Bishops



St Maximilian Kolbe, Priest and Martyr-August 14

Father Max was a Polish Conventual Franciscan friar, priest, missionary, and martyr. He volunteered to die in place of a man named Franciszek Gajowniczek in the German Death Camp of Auschwitz, located in German-occupied Poland during World War II. He had been active in promoting the veneration of the Immaculate Virgin Mary, founding and supervising the monastery of Niepokalanów near Warsaw,

operating an amateur-radio station (SP3RN), and founding or running several other organizations and publications. Due to Kolbe's efforts to promote consecration and entrustment to Mary, he is known as an "apostle of consecration to Mary".

The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary August 15 (HDO)

Catholics and other Christians celebrate the feast of the "Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary." This feast day recalls the spiritual and physical departure of the mother of Jesus Christ from the earth, when both her soul and her body

were taken into the presence of God. Venerable Pope Pius XII confirmed this belief as a perennial teaching of the Church when he defined it as a dogma of Catholic faith in 1950, invoking papal infallibility to proclaim, "the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever-Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory." His Apostolic Constitution "Munificentissimus Deus" (Most Bountiful God), which defined the dogma, contained the Pontiff's accounts of many longstanding traditions by which the Church has celebrated the Assumption throughout its history. The constitution also cited testimonies from the early Church fathers on the subject, and described the history of theological reflection on many Biblical passages which are seen as indicating Mary was assumed into heaven following her death. Although the bodily assumption of Mary is not explicitly recorded in Scripture, Catholic tradition identifies her with the "woman clothed with the sun" who is described in the 12th chapter of the Book of Revelation. The passage calls the woman's appearance "a great sign" which "appeared in heaven," indicating she is the mother of the Jewish Messiah and has "the moon under her feet, and on her head a crown of twelve stars."



St Clare, Virgin - August 11

Clare Offreduccio, born to a noble family in the Italian town of Assisi, was the eldest of three daughters. Raised in luxury, the girls led lives of prayer and were nurtured in their faith by their devout Catholic parents. When Clare was twelve, she persuaded her parents to postpone arranging a marriage for her to a wealthy nobleman. Around 1211 or 1212, when Clare was nearing her eighteenth birthday, she attended a Lenten mission at the church of San Giorgio in Assisi, preached by Brother

Francis. The mission resonated deeply with Clare, and she felt God calling her to join Francis and his brothers by forming a women's branch of their new order. Aware that her family would not approve of her decision, Clare spoke to Brother Francis in secret. With the local bishop's approval, Francis agreed to welcome her on Palm Sunday evening at the small chapel of the Portiuncula where his order was staying. That night, Clare arrived at the chapel, dressed as a bride ready to wed her spouse. She was accompanied by her aunt and a friend. Clare surrendered her noble attire for a coarse habit, allowed Brother Francis to cut her long hair, and covered her head with a veil. Francis then arranged for her to stay at a nearby Benedictine convent. Despite her reluctance to assume any form of authority or title, Clare was made the abbess of the community in the following years. She was humble and shy, and found giving orders challenging. She often took up the most menial and unwanted chores.
