Commentaries on the Sunday Mass Readings Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Cycle C:



The 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time—August 17, 2025 Luke 12:49-53. We who appreciate what God has done for us, striving hard against our natural

weaknesses, to profit by His salvific work, can do something to console Him for the desertion of so many He still loves dearly. God's desire is that no human be lost eternally. He detests sin, but still loves the sinner and is always ready to for-

give every sin we commit, if we have the humility to say "mea culpa." Those of us, who have remained faithful, must never let a day pass without praying for the "prodigal sons" of God. May they acquire the humility to return to their father's home and ask for his pardon. Please also ask God's peace will soon be restored. Christ foresaw our relationships would be broken, because of His "gospel of peace". First and foremost we must pray for, and do everything we can to help bring about, a reunion amongst all Christians who are followers of Christ by their baptism. Thanks to the late Saint Pope John XXIII, steps are now being taken to restore the unity, which Christ intended, to exist among his followers. We may not solve the theological problems which are preventing unity. However, each of us can do much to make personal contacts between the members of what were once opposing Churches. Let us put aside past prejudices and opinions. Neither we, nor our separated brethren, are responsible for the sins and failings of our ancestors. We are only responsible for our actions today. We fail Christ if we do not take a sincere and active interest in the Christian work of ecumenism. This does not mean we forget the children of Abraham whom, in our Mass, we call "our fathers in faith." They are still dear to God. We are now the Chosen People of the New Covenant. This New Covenant, is also for them . There is neither Jew nor Gentile, Greek nor Barbarian in the Church of Christ. It is for all of us, as St. Paul tells us. While respecting the beliefs of Jews and Muslims, which correspond with some of those we ourselves hold, let us pray fervently God will give them the grace to recognize Jesus as the Person he was, the Son of God in human nature, who came on earth to make us fit for heaven.



Sacristans: What they are? What they do? Primary Function: The Parish Sacristan's duties vary greatly. Their basic jobs are: Preparing the Holy Eucharist for the celebration of Mass. This includes readying the wine, water and bread and putting them in place for the start of Mass.

While the **Minimum Qualifications** vary from Parish to Parish, here are some "**General Ideas of what they do and the training required": 1)** Be an "Active member of the Catholic Church" particularly in the parish to which

they are assigned. **2)** *Possess a strong knowledge of the Order of the Catholic Mass. **3)** Be familiar with the liturgical calendar and liturgical celebrations. **4)** Possess A working knowledge of and the ability to apply the information found in the ORDO is a plus. **Primary Duties and Responsibilities may include:**

• Preparing the altar and sanctuary for Mass • Preparing the Church for Mass.
• Assisting the Mass Presider; especially if they are a visiting (supply) priest. • Serve as Sacristan for weddings and funerals as needed, • Ensure "the various Liturgical items" are available for Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals such as oils, incense, towels, a funeral pall, etc. • Prepare any specific items needed for special Rites as directed • Clean and refill Holy Water Fonts in chapel and at entry doors of the Church • Investigate the costs, availability, and orders flowers and plants throughout the year • Organizes the sacristy and supply rooms on a regular basis, Prepares specific items needed for any special rite i.e. St. Blasé candles, Ash Wednesday ashes, etc. In many parishes the Sacristan is responsible for "Marking the Readings" in the Lectionary, or the appropriate Mass sections in the sacramentary.



The Queenship of the Blessed Virgin Mary—August 22

Pope Pius XII established this feast in 1954. The Blessed Virgin Mary's queenship also has roots in Scripture. At the Annunciation, Gabriel announced that Mary's Son would receive the throne of David and rule forever. At the Visitation, Elizabeth calls Mary "mother of my Lord." As in all the mysteries of Mary's life, she is closely associated with Jesus: Her queenship is a share in Jesus' kingship. We can also recall that in the Old Testament the mother of the king has

great influence in court. In the fourth century Saint Ephrem called Mary "Lady" and "Queen." Later Church fathers and doctors continued to use these titles. Hymns of the 11th to 13th centuries address Mary as queen: "Hail, Holy Queen," "Hail, Queen of Heaven," "Queen of Heaven." The Dominican rosary and the Franciscan crown as well as numerous invocations in Mary's litany celebrate her queenship.



St John Eudes, Priest - August 19

John Eudes was born at Ri, Normandy, France, on November 14, 1601, the son of a farmer. He went to the Jesuit college at Caen when he was 14, and despite his parents' wish that he marry, joined the Congregation of the Oratory of France in 1623. He studied at Paris and at Aubervilliers, was ordained in 1625, and worked as a volunteer, caring for the victims of the plagues, which struck Normandy in 1625 and 1631, and spent the next decade

giving Missions, building a reputation as an outstanding preacher and confessor and for his opposition to Jansenism. He became interested in helping fallen women, and in 1641, with Madeleine Lamy, founded a refuge for them in Caen, under the direction of the Visitandines. He resigned from the Oratorians in 1643 and founded the Congregation of Jesus and Mary (the Eudists) at Caen, composed of secular priests not bound by vows, dedicated to upgrading the clergy by establishing effective seminaries and preaching missions. His foundation was opposed by the Oratorians and the Jansenists, and he was unable to obtain Papal approval for it. In 1650, the Bishop of Coutances invited him to establish a seminary in his diocese. The same year the sisters at his refuge in Caen left the Visitandines and were recognized by the Bishop of Bayeux as a new congregation under the name of Sisters of Our Lady of Charity of the Refuge. John founded seminaries at Lisieux in 1653 and Rouen in 1659, but was unsuccessful in another attempt to secure Papal approval of his congregation. In 1666 the Refuge sisters received Pope Alexander III's approval as an institute to reclaim and care for penitent "wayward women."



St Pius X, Pope - August 21

Pope Pius X (Italian: Pio X; born Giuseppe Melchiorre Sarto; (2 June 1835 – 20 August 1914) was head of the Catholic Church from 4 August 1903 until his death in August 1914. Pius X is known for vigorously opposing modernist interpretations of Catholic doctrine, and for promoting liturgical reforms and Thomist scholastic theology. He initiated the preparation of the 1917 Code of Canon Law, the first comprehensive and systemic work of its kind, which was ultimately promulgated by his successor. He is venerated as a saint in the Catholic Church. Pius X was devoted to the Blessed

Virgin Mary under the title of Our Lady of Confidence; while his encyclical "Ad diem illum" took on a sense of renewal which was reflected in the motto of his pontificate. He advanced the Liturgical Movement by formulating the principle of "participatio actuosa" (active participation of the faithful) in his motu proprio, Tra le sollecitudini (1903). He encouraged the frequent reception of Holy Communion, and he lowered the age for First Communion, which would become a lasting innovation of his papacy. After his death, a strong cult of devotion followed his reputation for piety and holiness. He was beatified in 1951 and canonized in 1954 by Pope Pius XII. A statue bearing his name stands within Saint Peter's Basilica, and his birth town was renamed Riese Pio X after his death.
