What Is a Holy Day of Obligation?

Holy Days of Obligation are beautiful reminders of the important ways God has shown His love for us. These are important days in the liturgical year in which we recognize God's love for us. **They require us to attend Mass, just as we are obligated to attend Mass every Sunday.**

What Is All Saints' Day? November 01, 2024

All Saints' Day recognizes those known to God as saints—not only those canonized by the Catholic church. Therefore, All Saints' Day celebrates all faithful followers of Jesus throughout church history. It is a feast day remembering those

who have gone before us, honoring their lives and faithfulness. Believers come together to celebrate continued communion with saints through the ages, recognizing their continued participation in the body of Christ. In the Catholic Church, All Saints' Day is a holy day of obligation, meaning parishioners are required to attend Mass. If the holy day falls on a Saturday or a Monday, Mass attendance is not required. It's observed in various ways around the world, with many visiting the gravesides of loved ones.



All Souls Day and Why we Celebrate It? The History of All Souls Day!

The importance of All Souls Day was made clear by Pope Benedict XV (1914-22) when he granted all priests the privilege of celebrating three Masses on All Souls Day: one for the faithful departed; one for the priest's intentions; and one for the intentions of the Holy Father. On only a handful of other feast days are priests allowed to celebrate more than two Masses. While All Souls Day is now paired with All Saints Day (November 1), which celebrates all of the faithful who are in Heaven, it originally was celebrated in the Easter season, around Pentecost Sunday (and still is in the Eastern Catholic Churches). By the tenth century, the celebration had been moved to October. Sometime between 998 and 1030, St. Odilo of Cluny decreed it

should be celebrated on November 2 in all of the monasteries of his Benedictine congregation. Over the next two centuries, other Benedictines and the Carthusians began to celebrate it in their monasteries as well, and soon the commemoration of all the Holy Souls in Purgatory spread to the entire Church.

Offering Our Efforts on Behalf of the Holy Souls On All Souls Day, we remember the dead, AND we apply our efforts, through prayer, almsgiving, and the Mass, to their release from Purgatory. There are two plenary indulgences attached to All Souls Day, one for visiting a church and another for visiting a cemetery. (The plenary indulgence for visiting a cemetery can also be obtained every day from November 1-8, and, as a partial indulgence, on any day of the year.) While the actions are performed by the living, the merits of the indulgences are applicable only to the souls in Purgatory. Since a plenary indulgence removes all of the temporal punishment for sin, which is the reason why souls are in Purgatory in the first place, applying a plenary indulgence to one of the Holy Souls in Purgatory means the Holy Soul is released from Purgatory and enters Heaven. Praying for the dead is a Christian obligation. In the modern world, when many have come to doubt the Church's teaching on Purgatory, the need for such prayers has only increased. The Church devotes the month of November to prayer for the Holy Souls in Purgatory, and participation in the Mass of All Souls Day is a good way to begin the month.





Regularly Talk about Online Activity: It can be easy for adults and kids to become isolated in their online activity; it can easily become their own world If your kids are old enough to have their own accounts set some ground rules.



The buildup of weapons in outer space is a "genuine and grave" threat to international peace and security.

According to Archbishop Gabriele Caccia, the Permanent Observer of the Holy See to the United Nations, who was speaking on October 27 at the 80th session of the United Nations General Assembly. The Archbishop recalled the words of Pope Leo XIV during a video call with astronaut Buzz Aldrin on July 20, on the 56th anniversary of the Apollo 11 moon landing. The vastness of space, the Pope said at the time, evokes "the mystery of Creation, its greatness," but also its "fragility".





Did You Know? November 01/02, 2025 // Facts About Physical Grooming

The term "grooming" refers to the way in which a predator tries to mold and set up his victims and their families, in order to gain access to a child and cause harm, all while appearing innocent. The first of the three types of grooming is physical, and it involves touch. A predator starts with innocent touches

— back pats, appropriate hugs — and then moves on to tickling, wrestling, hugging, conditioning the child to increasing levels of physical contact. Over time, the predator conditions the child to accept all forms of touch, progressing to sexual contact.
