The Holy Family December 27, 2020

The lovely gospels that we revel in during these days of Christmastime hold up for us the image of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, the Holy Family of Nazareth. And so we celebrate the Holy Family on the Sunday after Christmas Day. It's easy to gaze on the images in the Christmas crib and recognize the holiness of the newborn Jesus, his mother and his guardian, Joseph. It may be harder to look at your own children or parents or brothers or sisters and see reflections of that same holiness in them. After all, living together, you see each other's bad sides as well as the good, the warts as well as the dimples.

But if we truly believe in what we are celebrating, the incarnation of God in the flesh, and the fact that Jesus saved us by his death and resurrection into which we are baptized, then we must cultivate the ability to see a reflection of the baby Jesus' holiness in each child in our own families, to see the holiness of Mary and of Joseph reflected in ourselves as parents, and in our own parents.

Maybe it will help to remember not just the gurgling baby Jesus in the crib, but also the toddler Jesus at age two – in his own version of the "terrible twos." Or to meditate on Mary and Joseph changing diapers and picking up the ancient Palestinian version of Cheerios from the kitchen floor - and the living room floor and... The Gospels are silent about Jesus' childhood, but truly human as well as truly God, Jesus no doubt had nosebleeds and skinned knees, tried dangerous stunts, didn't get enough sleep sometimes and so was cranky. Maybe there were even battles over homework. (Jesus would have studied Hebrew and the Scriptures.)

And think of Jesus as a teenager. We get glimpses of him in the gospel of Matthew at age twelve, wandering off in Jerusalem, causing Mary and Joseph to panic. Of course he didn't have the opportunity to take driver's ed or ask for the car keys, but there were a myriad of other but similar parent -teen encounters, to be sure.

Some may find such speculation to be sacrilegious. "Jesus is perfect," they'll object. "Jesus is God!" How very true. And Jesus was a baby, a teenager, a young adult, too. True God, true man. And maybe, just maybe one of the delights of this Christmas season is that some of the small quirky things about us as human beings – the terrible twos, the teenage struggle for independence, parents' angst about their child – maybe all of these are holy and part of what it means to grow toward perfection.

Glory in heaven and peace on earth now and forever!

Prayer of the Eyes...

An icon – a holy picture – can help you pray. The Greek word *icon* means "image," a sacred image of Jesus, Mary, or saint that is painted in two dimensions on wood panels, usually with egg tempera paints. Here's how you can use an icon or other sacred image to focus your prayer.

You want to be in a comfortable position and you want to be able to look into the image's eyes. If you don't hang the image on a wall, you might find an easel or a hinged wooden stand used to display plates to hold the image on a table.

Praying before an icon or a sacred image is a matter of looking deeply. Think of how deeply you look at the face of one you love. You never tire of that face and you notice every detail: the way light and shadow fall across the nose and cheek, how the brow moves, the subtle changes of expression. Look at the sacred image this way, too. Such intense looking will center you in prayer, in the presence of the holy person depicted. You may want to light candles or incense before the sacred image, too.

A Blessing for Christmas time...by Andrew Greeley in his book: *Irish American Blessings and Prayers*...

May your eyes be alert for the sight of his face and your ears ready for the sound of his voice.

May your feet catch fire to run in his race. The song on your lips tell all the world "rejoice."

And may you clap and leap and shout and dance knowing that the Lord has come to set you free.

And run down the road, a person entranced after the one who said come follow me.

May God bless you the Father who made you free. The Son who freed you once again.

And the Spirit who keeps you forever free. Amen

May God Bless you and your families today and keep you in the hollow of His hands. And...I'll see you "next year" in church or livestream!




KIRK CARE





Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Tragedy and disappointment are inevitable. What sees you through this? There will be challenges, changes, unexpected circumstances, interrupted plans, hurts, and injustices experienced by every human being at some point in their lives. We will be asked to adjust our plans, change course, and even encounter suffering and death. Where do we learn all of the lessons we need to live life well? Some of them we learn along the way but much of what we bring to life, positive and negative, comes from our early beginnings, our families. This is our early world and provides the blueprint for how we see the bigger, more inclusive world, which unfolds before us.

Our families of origin can be sources of grace, heartache or a combination of both. Families are intended to be pivotal in providing us with proper social structure and understanding, a support system, lessons about relationships and communication, and the unconditional acceptance and love we so desperately crave. They can also determine whether we have an accessible and healthy relationship with God. Many of life's challenges can literally bring us to our knees and require that we possess a strength of character that resides well beyond the superficialities of our world. At some point we will all need three coping gifts that can be given to us only by God: faith, hope, and love. Our families help us learn that we are not the ones responsible for their creation, but God!

Our experience of early family life colors all of our relationships and what we expect to achieve from life in general. Resolving conflicts, dealing with difficulty and suffering, celebrating accomplishments, prioritizing our needs, listening to God's call, understanding relationships, understanding disappointment, learning about the virtues and living a centered focused life are all lessons our families either succeed in teaching or do not. To succeed, as God has designed and ordered our world, is to discover his presence and then trust that Presence. The Holy Family can teach even the most dysfunctional family how to best use God's gifts of faith, hope, and love to find him and do his will. Their simple humble example is always before us, showing us the way. Jesus, Mary and Joseph, pray for us!

The volunteers for the meals program at St. Peter and Paul in Soulard served around 100 hungry diners on November 3. The new "Covid Safe" meals program requires the volunteers to help fill containers with a nutritious meal prepared by the cook then the food is delivered to diners by 2 staff people at curbside outside the parking lot for the dining hall. Since the new program began in September, it has grown monthly from a few diners to nearly the number who were coming to eat inside "pre Covid" which was from 85-150 monthly.



MEMBERS OF THE CHURCH LEADERSHIP

ROSARIES AS DECORATIONS

Question: I've seen people hang rosaries over the rear-view mirrors in their cars and a few of them wear them around their necks. Is it OK to do that?

Answer:

The practice of hanging a rosary or a religious medal off of the rearview mirror of one's car is a fairly popular custom across many cultures. While there is no particular rule approving or condemning this practice, we should also be mindful of the respect and reverence due to religious objects and devotional items (i.e. sacramentals).

An important point to consider would be the reason why one chooses to place a rosary or religious medal in our cars. Is it a reminder of the protection and intercession of Mary and the saints? Does it encourage us to be mindful of God's presence, even in such a mundane task as driving? Is it an outward expression of our more private devotions?

One advantage of having a rosary or religious medal in our cars is that it can also serve as a reminder to pray when we travel, asking for protection for ourselves and for other motorists or commuters. Certainly, invoking the protection and prayers of the saints is a wonderful practice for families, helping to reinforce our belief in the communion of saints and the care and concern we owe to one another.
