A Word from Our Pastor | 3



Continuing our consideration of the Vatican II document *Sacrosanctum Concilium* (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy) and the history leading up to its issue in December 1963, we should come to appreciate that the changes of the Mass did not "come from nowhere." They were, in fact, the fruit of much research and study. The trend in liturgical theology, itself a relatively new discipline by the early 20th century, sought to restore greater intentionality to ritual worship as well as lay involvement.

PART 2 IN A SERIES into the historical origins of the Mass continued. This was especially true in Germany, Austria, Belgium and France. Liturgical journals were started, institutes and courses of study were founded, international conferences were held. Two lengthy works that offered

detailed historical accounts of the Eucharist were published: the Austrian Jesuit Josef Jungmann's *The Mass of the Roman Rite*, and the Anglican Benedictine Gregory Dix's *The Shape of the Liturgy*. They confirmed what many serious students of Christian worship were finding: that the Mass was not always said in Latin, that it did not always have the form firmly fixed after the Council of Trent, that regional variation of the liturgy had been the rule in earlier days, that in the beginning bishops had used spontaneous prayers rather than written ones, and that lay people in the early Church had an active role in Eucharistic worship.

At the same time there was a growing concern on the part of some bishops and pastors to make Sunday liturgy more intelligible and meaningful for ordinary Catholics. The Congregation for Rites in Rome largely guarded against innovative trends, but gradual acceptance was coming thanks to the decades of liturgical scholarship. In 1947 Pope Pius XII issued his encyclical *Mediator Dei*. In it the pope attempted to steer a middle course between proponents of change and those who rejected them. He warned against priests tampering with official ritual but approved of efforts to make the Mass more relevant to the laity. Soon after, permission was granted for modern languages to be used in some of the sacramental rituals, like at weddings. During the 1950's other modest changes followed, such as the allowance for the celebration of evening Masses on Sundays and holy days. The rituals of Holy Week and particularly the Triduum became more distinct from the other days of Lent. And long hours of compulsory fasting before receiving Holy Communion were shortened to three and then to one hour.

Here in the Archdiocese of St. Louis, the most prominent figure in the liturgical reform movement was Monsignor Martin Hellriegel (1891-1981). A native of Germany, he served as chaplain at the Motherhouse of the Sisters of the Precious Blood in O'Fallon. Their chapel became an incubator for cultivating liturgical experiments like the "dialogue Mass" (in which the people recited aloud in Latin the parts of the Mass usually only the server said at the altar) and the offertory procession. Hellriegel received the unexpected but tempered support of Archbishop John Glennon. As far back as 1926, he wrote to him: "Your work is not an innovation. It is a restoration. And especially am I pleased to see your endeavor to more closely associate, indeed, incorporate the Catholic laity in the liturgy." In 1940 Fr. Hellriegel moved on to Holy Cross parish in the Baden neighborhood of north St. Louis where he further honed his liturgical reputation and attracted the attention of liturgists from around the world. He was a founder of the national Liturgical Conference, and his commentaries on the Mass were followed by readers everywhere. What Fr. Hellriegel and many other liturgical reformers envisioned for a more meaningful and participatory celebration of the Eucharist soon came to be vindicated in the constitution adopted by the Council Fathers at Vatican II.

St. Peter's longtime pastor, Fr. Alphonse Westhoff, was a protege of Msgr. Hellriegel. In building a new church for the parish, he had the opportunity to apply some of the elements of the liturgical reform movement. Ordinarily in Catholic churches, the altar would be fixed against a wall since the priest celebrated the Mass with his back to the people. At St. Peter, the altar was intentionally free-standing in the middle of the sanctuary, allowing the possibility of the presider to face the congregation. Contemporary church artists were commissioned, like Francis Deck who designed the windows to illustrate the theology of the successive parts of the Mass. Fr. Westoff anticipated many of the reforms of Vatican II a full decade before the Council. The picture to the right was taken on April 26, 1953, when Archbishop Joseph E. Ritter came to consecrate the new St. Peter Church. Msgr. Martin Hellriegel (on the far right) delivered the sermon at the Mass. Fr. Westoff is second from the right.






