

A WORD FROM FR. LEVI

Grace and peace to you in Christ Jesus our risen Lord! He is risen! He is risen, indeed! Today, we celebrate the 3rd Sunday of Easter! Throughout the Easter Season three main themes are happening.

First, the risen Christ appears to the apostles and disciples and gives them faith in the resurrection. Second, the risen Christ pours out the Holy Spirit on his Apostles. Third, the apostles, go from a fearful and confused group without their leader, to a group filled with fire and zeal to spread the Gospel across the face of the earth!

In the Gospel today, the disciples are reminded of their first encounter with Christ. They are fishing just as they had been before the Lord called them. The day Peter, Andrew, James, and John were called they had fished all night and caught nothing. At the Lord's invitation, they cast out their nets again and brought in a huge catch. This time the risen Lord calls to them from the shore and asks them to cast their nets again. Upon doing so they bring in a huge catch. Immediately St. John says to Peter, "It is the Lord," for he remembered the first encounter with Christ!

Isn't it wonderful how the Lord works? St. Ignatius says that it is important for us to go back to the powerful encounters that we have had with Christ our Lord, not so that we can long for what we had, but so that we can draw fresh grace for today! Try to remember times in your life that you had a clear encounter with Christ, our Lord. Times of great love, joy, peace, patience, recue, etc. Times when you knew the Lord was with you. When you think back on those times and call to mind how awesome God is and how powerful His love is for you, you can enter into a new experience of encounter and love in the present moment! Think about the joy and love that comes to you every time you share with others the beautiful experiences that you have had with Jesus. I know that when I share about my experiences with God, I am drawn right back into His presence and my soul is refreshed!

If you cannot recall ever really having a profound encounter with God, then I would encourage you to sign up for the Life in the Spirit seminar that we are currently holding on Thursday evenings at 7pm. Now is the time for us to encounter the risen Christ and be filled with the Holy Spirit, so that after Pentecost we can be sent out to share the Gospel with everyone we encounter!

ON FIRE FOR CHRIST



How to "Be on Fire for Christ"

I was asked this past week what I mean when I say; "Be on Fire for Christ!" and how can someone "Be on Fire for Christ"? This week's Gospel provides the best answer to both those questions.

Jesus asked Peter three times, "Do you love me?" Jesus used this opportunity to encourage Peter about his upcoming responsibilities and even to prophesy the way Peter will die. By asking Peter, "Do you love me?" three times, Jesus was emphasizing the importance of Peter's love and unwavering obedience to his Lord as will be necessary for his future ministry.

Jesus begins by questioning Peter about His love for Him, and each time Peter answers in the affirmative, Jesus follows up with the command for Peter to feed His sheep. His meaning is that, if Peter truly loves his Master, he is to shepherd and care for those who belong to Christ. His words reveal Peter's role as the leader of the new Church, the Body of Christ, and that he will be responsible

for spreading the Gospel after Jesus' ascension into heaven. Also, it is possible that by His repeated questioning Jesus is subtly reminding Peter of his three denials.

There is also an interesting contrast when you look at the Greek words for "love". When Jesus asked Peter, "Do you love me?", He used the Greek word *agape*, which refers to *unconditional love*. Each time, Peter responded with "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you," using the Greek word *phileo*, which refers more to a *brotherly/friendship type of love*. It appears that Jesus was trying to get Peter to understand that he must love Jesus unconditionally to be the leader God is calling him to be. The point in the different Greek words for "love" seems to be that Jesus was stretching Peter to move him from *phileo* love to *agape* love.

With the three-fold "do you love me?" questioning, Jesus was impressing on Peter how important his new role of tending the flock of Christ's followers would be. When someone repeats instructions to us, we quickly understand that it's extremely important for us to listen to them. Jesus wanted to make sure Peter understood this vital charge He was tasking him with and the ultimate reason, to follow Him and glorify God.

This is "Being on Fire for Christ!" It is answering Jesus' call for us using Agape, an unconditional love, for Him. Jesus tells us we can't be lukewarm. We must be all in! Our YES must be one that we carry in our heart with a strong desire to be Christ, bring Christ and see Christ in others. We must be willing to bring His Good News to all we encountered along our journey. We do this by attending the Sacrament of Reconciliation to receive God's grace in our repentance, by attending Mass and receiving the real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist to strengthen our resolve and by answering with a resounding AMEN when receiving Him! We must be willing to serve and protect others, especially the most vulnerable (the unborn, handicapped, the aged) and needy (the homeless, poor, hungry, etc.). We must love Christ enough to follow Him and "be" Him to others. That is being on Fire for Christ! Are you willing to Be on Fire for Him? If you are, start by forming a radical unconditional love relationship with Him and then go out and spread His Good News to all you encounter! May God bless you as you journey with Him!

LITURGY PREPARATION

Third Sunday of Easter


Beginning last weekend with the 2nd Sunday of Easter, and running all the way through the 7th Sunday of Easter, we will hear from the book of Revelation during the second reading. Last weekend, Revelation began with chapter 1, and throughout the coming weeks, we'll make our way forward through the end of chapter 22, to the last words in the bible. We won't hear the book of Revelation in its entirety, but each weekend we skip forward hearing sections from the beginning to the end of the book.

Not much is known about the author of Revelation, who was simply known as John of Patmos. Some believe that the John who authored Revelation was the apostle John, while others argue that it was a different John. The writing style and genre of the Gospel of John and the book of Revelation are vastly different, which adds credence to the argument that it was two separate Johns. What we do know is that no matter the author, the books of the bible were divinely inspired and speak to us just the same, even if we don't know exactly who wrote them.

Revelation begins with John explaining that he had been exiled to Patmos, which was a small, rocky island in Greece. He writes that he's there "because I proclaimed God's word and gave testimony to Jesus." (Rev. 1:9) While there, John received many visions and messages of which he recorded and shared with seven first-century churches. Looking at the map below, you can see the names of each church, and that they're spread out to create a circuit along a Roman road. Within Revelation there are seven letters, each addressed to a church, but the whole of Revelation is really meant to be one long letter for all of them. The number seven features prominently in Revelation as a symbolic number that stands for wholeness; so even though there are sections addressed to each of the seven churches, the fact that there are seven messages indicates oneness and wholeness of the entire message.

Today's passage of Revelation comes from chapter 5, and in it we hear how John was given a vision of the heavenly hosts worshipping God. In heaven there is eternal worship, but while on earth we can only get a foretaste of that by going to Mass. At Mass we are raised toward heaven as God condescends to us. It is the place where heaven and earth meet. While at Mass, our eyes are veiled to see the heavenly side of worship, but John was allowed the grace to see it. Since he was exiled, he could not participate in tangible Christian community and eucharistic worship, but he experienced a more profound reality beyond human limitations, which we'll too experience in person one day.

The communion hymn echoes the message from Revelation today. "Worthy is the Lamb that was slain to receive power and riches, wisdom and strength, honor and glory and blessing." (Rev. 5:12) Jesus is the worthy lamb that was slain for us, and He is now deeply honored for that sacrifice. The beautiful description of worship detailed by John gives us all hope of the kingdom to come when we'll see with our own eyes the glory and majesty of God.





When the captain and the court officers had brought the apostles in and made them stand before the Sanhedrin, the high priest questioned them, "We gave you strict orders, did we not, to stop teaching in that name? Yet you have filled Jerusalem with your teaching and want to bring this man's blood upon us." But Peter and the apostles said in reply, "We must obey God rather than men. The God of our ancestors raised Jesus, though you had him killed by hanging him on a tree. God exalted him at his right hand as leader and savior to grant Israel repentance and forgiveness of

sins. We are witnesses of these things, as is the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him."

The Sanhedrin ordered the apostles to stop speaking in the name of Jesus, and dismissed them. So they left the presence of the Sanhedrin, rejoicing that they had been found worthy to suffer dishonor for the sake of the name.

At that time, Jesus revealed himself again to his disciples at the Sea of Tiberias. He revealed himself in this way. Together were Simon Peter, Thomas called Didymus, Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, Zebedee's sons, and two others of his disciples. Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We also will come with you." So they went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing. When it was already dawn, Jesus was standing on the shore; but the disciples did not realize that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, "Children, have you caught anything to eat?" They answered him, "No." So he said to them, "Cast the net over the right side of the boat and you will find something." So they cast it, and were not able to pull it in because of the number of fish. So the disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord." When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he tucked in his garment, for he was lightly clad, and jumped into the sea. The other disciples came in the boat, for they were not far from shore, only about a hundred yards, dragging the net with the fish. When they climbed out on shore, they saw a charcoal fire with fish on it and bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring

some of the fish you just caught." So Simon Peter went over and dragged the net ashore full of one hundred fifty-three large fish. Even though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, "Come, have breakfast." And none of the disciples dared to ask him, "Who are you?" because they realized it was the Lord. Jesus came over and took the bread and gave it to them, and in like manner the fish. This was now the third time Jesus was revealed to his disciples after being raised from the dead.

When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" Simon Peter answered him, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my lambs." He then said to Simon Peter a second time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Simon Peter answered him, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Tend my sheep." Jesus said to him the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter was distressed that Jesus had said to him a third time, "Do you love me?" and he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. Amen, amen, I say to you,

when you were younger, you used to dress yourself and go where you wanted; but when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will dress you and lead you where you do not want to go." He said this signifying by what kind of death he would glorify God. And when he had said this, he said to him, "Follow me."



GROWING CLOSER TO CHRIST

Commentary on the Acts of the Apostles

Once again we can rightly proclaim, "Christ is risen!" Indeed! He is risen. May the joy and the living hope that is ours be the characteristic mark during this most splendid season.

After having consulted with Frs. Levi and Fr. Pierre. I have sensed the Holy Spirit nudging me to make comments on the readings from the Acts of the Apostles up until the weekend of Pentecost. And so I will. The Church's decision to have a portion of the Acts of the Apostles read at the Sunday liturgy is because the Church was birthed from the wounded side of our Savior Jesus and made missionary at Pentecost. The Resurrection of the Lord Jesus is the inauguration of the Messianic age and life in the Holy Spirit.

It was St. Paul VI who wrote in his apostolic letter on evangelization, "Acts bears witness to a privileged, and in a sense exemplary, moment of the Church's missionary effort which will . . leave its mark on the whole history of the Church." Acts is more than an account concerning the activities of the ancient church. It provides a pattern for the life and mission of the Church today. We are to draw lessons from the Acts for our missionary endeavors in the present.

In the reading from Acts this Sunday we find the apostles Peter and John before the council, that is, the religious leaders of Israel being called to account for their faithfully and courageously preaching the Gospel. They had been ordered not to teach about Jesus. The amazing response of the apostles was to very directly proclaim the Gospel message of the resurrection of Jesus and his exaltation at the right hand of God. They even boldly declared, "The God of our fathers raised Jesus whom you killed by hanging him on a tree."

The freedom and courage of the apostles is unmistakable. Just a few days earlier these same men were hiding in the upper room fearful for their lives. Something extremely dramatic and life changing happened to them. What was it? It was their witness of the risen Lord who appeared to them and during forty days and speaking of the kingdom of God. We want to lay hold of two truths that apply just as much to us today as to the apostles in their day.

The first is just as there was the external consolation and witness to the reality of the risen Christ to the apostles, so there is today an internal witness of the Holy Spirit that allows us to exclaim with confidence and freedom. Jesus is Lord! St. Paul teaches us so succinctly, "No one can say Jesus is Lord except by the Holy Spirit."

The second is that through the power of the Holy Spirit at work in us we can confidently proclaim the good news in the face of hostility in our social, financial or physical lives because "he who is in us is greater than he who is in the world." Obedience is first to God our highest authority. In perhaps little ways we may experience some rejection for our open belief in lesus Christ who is Lord and we too joyfully accept it. Our joyful obedience to Christ is what is asked of us too.





FAITH FORMATION

Today's Gospel describes what we can easily imagine as a picnic on the beach. Just as Jesus' miracle at the wedding feast at Cana blesses the love between man and woman celebrated in the sacrament of marriage, Jesus' attentiveness to food and mealtimes raises the possibility that our meal gatherings can be sacred times. In families, the domestic church, our meals together are everyday opportunities to gather and recall Jesus' presence with us. As in the Eucharist, we bring the gifts that God has given us, which have been prepared especially for our Mass, and at our family meals we share gifts that God has given to us and that we have worked together to prepare. This includes the food on the table and also the people who gather around the table. We ask God to bless these gifts and to be present among us in all of our interactions.

Consider a recent family meal: What food was served? Where did the food come Formation from? Who prepared the food? Who served the food? Was mealtime a happy time? Why or why not? Observe that today's Gospel tells about a meal that Jesus shared with his disciples after his Resurrection. Read aloud today's Gospel, John 21:1-14. Reflect on the Gospel reading using the questions above. Talk about ways in which this meal that Jesus shared with his disciples might remind us of the meal we share at the Eucharist. You might choose to plan a special meal together as a family, encouraging each person to participate in the meal preparation. Pray together that Jesus will make his loving presence known in your family life.



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
