


A WORD FROM FR. LEVI

Grace and peace to you in Christ! I pray you are well! We have recently confirmed our new Pastoral Council and it will be meeting for the first time August 12th! I am grateful to all who served previously on council. Your sacrifice and humility will always be a blessing to our community! With the new council established, we will be working to put together a pastoral vision and plan for the next 5 years. Before we can build out a new pastoral plan and vision, we need to ask ourselves, "Who are we? Where are we? Why are we here?"

Today I want to address in a very broad sense "why are we here?" In John 17, we hear Jesus praying His high priestly prayer. He says in verse 21 "May they all be one. As You, Father, are in Me and I in You, may they also be in Us, so that the world may "believe that You sent Me." What an awesome prayer! He is inviting us to receive a share in the Divine Life of God, himself! The passage continues, "The glory which You have given Me I also have given to them, so that they may be one, just as We are one; I in them and You in Me, that they may be perfected in unity, so that the world may know that You sent Me, and You loved them, just as You loved Me." To dwell in Communion with God is why we were created. We were made to share in His perfect love always and forever! In this life, we can begin to taste the goodness of dwelling in Communion of God, but the fullness of that reality is life in Heaven!

LITURGY PREPARATION

Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Entrance Procession (Part 2 of 2)

At Mass there is a very specific order of persons and items in the Entrance Procession: the thurifer (altar server that carries the incense), the crucifer (altar server that carries the processional cross), candle bearers, other priests and ministers, the Deacon or Lector with the Book of the Gospels, and finally the celebrant.

When we use incense at Mass, the thurifer leads the procession with the incense. As the smoke is produced from the burning incense it rises in the air, which symbolizes our prayer rising to God. Mass is the highest form of prayer, so it is right and fitting that we begin the procession by lifting up our prayer with incense. Psalm 141 says, "Let my prayer be incense before you; my uplifted hands an evening offering." The Roman Empire also used incense to show honor during celebrations of military victories, as well as to lead brides during their

wedding processional. In the Catholic liturgy we honor the cross as one of the most powerful symbols, which is why the crucifer, Latin for *crux ferre*, or "cross bearer," follows after the incense.

St. Augustine introduced the processional cross into the liturgy in the 6th century. It's likely that St. Augustine modeled the processional cross after the Roman standards, which were long poles used by the military that had insignias and symbols attached to them. Each item attached to the standard represented the history and accomplishments of each group, such as the founder of their military unit or a commander who had won a great battle. The standards also unified the men so that no matter each man's individual heritage, they were thought of as soldiers of Rome first. In the same way, the processional cross unifies us as one Christian people, reminding us that before our country of origin or our family name we first belong to Christ. The cross truly identifies us as Christians, but even more so than a flag that identifies a country, the cross is also a sign of our salvation.

In the Entrance Procession the cross is flanked by candle bearers, the light of which represents hope, joy, life and purity, and most importantly it represents Christ as the light of the world. From Moses' time onward candles have been used during worship when God commanded a lampstand be built to remind the people that He is with them. Candles were also traditionally burned at the tombs of the prophets and patriarchs, and since then Christians have carried on the use of candlelight to visibly show that Christ is present.

Following the candle bearers is the Book of the Gospels. Jesus' words (in the form of the Gospels) follows the cross, each of which symbolizes the two big sections of the Mass: the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Starting around the 7th or 8th centuries, we begin to see the creation of decorative Gospel books that are carried in the Entrance Procession. Before the creation of the printing press, monks would take great care to copy the Gospels by hand. They often "illuminated" their manuscripts by using gold and silver leaf to reflect light as the pages were turned. The covers of the Gospel books were also very beautiful, often made from gold or silver and then decorated with precious jewels. The process of creating such a work of beauty often took several years to complete, but ultimately these books portray a profound respect and elevation of the Word of God.

In processions, the last person holds the greatest honor, which is the priest. However, it's not Fr. Levi or Fr. Pierre that holds the honor, but rather who they represent: Jesus Christ. They are acting *in persona Christi*, or "in the person of Christ." While on earth we need someone to physically lead us in worship, and all priests represent Christ who truly leads us in worship. The Entrance Procession culminates at the altar where we get the chance to participate in the heavenly banquet, our ultimate form of worship.





GROWING CLOSER TO CHRIST

Be rich in what matters to God

Today's Gospel is a strong admonition against hoarding earthly treasures and a clear call to focus on building wealth in what matters to God.

Jesus is teaching the crowd when someone calls out, "Teacher, tell my brother to share the inheritance with me." Jesus replies, "Friend, who appointed me as your judge and arbitrator?" Then He turns to the crowd and warns them to be on guard against greed.

To drive the point home, Jesus tells a parable. A rich man has such an abundant harvest that he decides to tear down his barns and build bigger ones to store it all. He makes grand plans to sit back, relax, and enjoy the good life. But God says to him, "You fool, this night your life will be demanded of you; and the things you have prepared, to whom will they belong?" Jesus concludes, "So it will be for all who store up treasure for themselves but are not rich in what matters to God."


Let us come together as a community of faith to offer dignity, support, and Christ's love to those who thirst for healing.


Women of Wonder (W.O.W.) MEETING

FAITH FORMATION

In our families, we learn some of life's most important lessons like fairness, sharing, and looking out for one another. Think about this: What would happen if your family ordered a pizza, but some people took as many slices as they wanted while others only got a half slice? That wouldn't feel fair, would it?

Families work best when everyone gets a fair share and when decisions are made with the good of the whole family in mind. That's called working for the *common good*, and it's something Jesus asks us to do not just at home, but in the whole human family too.

We're all part of God's family, and we're called to share the world's resources fairly and with love. In this Sunday's Gospel (Luke 12:13-21), Jesus tells a story about a man who stores up all his riches just for himself. He isn't mean but he forgets about everyone else. Jesus calls this a mistake not because the man was rich, but because he was only thinking about himself. When we do that, it's called a *sin of omission* when we fail to do the good we could have done for others.


Don't let your possessions own you
