CLERGY

A WORD FROM FR. LEVI

Grace and peace to you in Christ Jesus our Lord! This week the Sacred Scriptures speak to us about the need to be persistent in sharing the Gospel, teaching, and praying. St. Paul tells us we must be persistent in proclaiming the Gospel whether it is convenient or inconvenient. In the Gospel, Jesus says that we must be persistent in prayer and in our faith!

I met someone today who said that she was a part of several different protestant churches. Some of them rejected her. Some of them closed up. She said that through it all the Lord walked with her and led her into great freedom from some challenges she was working through. Her perseverance was inspiring!

As we spoke, I told her that she is always welcome to come to our church and check it out. I was blessed to hear how she walked with Jesus through so many challenges, but I was also keenly aware that without a church family, she would not be able to sustain and grow her relationship with Jesus.

If this young lady comes to one of our churches, will she find people greeting her with love and warmth? Some people asked at the listening session, "will people from the other towns welcome us?" While this is a question no one should need to have in their mind, I understand why it is being asked. As recently as a few weeks ago, a young family came from one of our churches to another one and a person there told them that the pew they sat in was reserved but they would let them sit in it this week. The young people who travel to the church they were not used to going to said, "we will never go there again." This is a sad situation and it is completely unacceptable. We must be welcoming to one another!

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ, the Christian life is about living as a revelation of the Love of God! Love is always about "the other;" it is not self-seeking or rude. Whatever the new Mass schedule ends up being, some people will be looking for a new Mass time, and if we are the people who keep our Mass time or a very similar one, we must keep in mind the challenges that others are going through. Will we ask our brothers and sisters to give up more than us and then refuse to share with them what we are privilege to have?

To those who will not have your current Mass time, I beg you to persevere in the faith and in St. Andrew the Apostle Parish. Also, if a church does not have as many Masses as another church, that does not make it less significant or essential in my eyes. I understand that every former parish has been through merger situations in the past while managing decline, but I see us reaching out beyond ourselves, become an extremely welcoming parish and moving from managing decline to transforming this Valley with the Love of Christ! If we are able to do that, then we will not only survive, but thrive!

Next week, I will have the new Mass schedule in the Bulletin. Please pray for the pastoral staff, pastoral council, and clergy, as we review everyone's input and work out the new schedule. Pray that we might be filled with the inspiration of the Holy Spirit and lead the whole parish into the perfect will of God! Have a blessed and peace-filled week!

LITURGY PREPARATION

Twenty Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Liturgy of the Eucharist: Preparation of the Altar, the Collection, Presentation of the Gifts

As we transition from the Liturgy of the Word to the Liturgy of the Eucharist, the focus moves from the ambo to the altar where Jesus makes present his sacrifice on the cross at each mass. The GIRM (General Instruction of the Roman Missal) states that, "When the Universal Prayer is over, all sit, and the Offertory Chant begins. An acolyte or other lay minister places the corporal, the purificator, the chalice, the pall, and the Missal on the altar." GIRM #139 Those five items are taken to the altar and are arranged to prepare for the gifts of bread and wine that will be brought to the altar by members of the assembly.

The corporal (from the Latin *corpus* meaning *body*), is the cloth laid beneath the Blessed Sacrament when it is exposed or being consecrated. The corporal is meant to catch any small fragments that may fall. The pall is a stiff covering

over the chalice so that no flies or debris fall into the Precious Blood. The purificator, which is like a liturgical napkin, is meant to wipe the chalice after the priest consumes the Precious Blood. Purificators are also used to wipe the cups from which the assembly drinks during their reception of the Precious Blood. The chalice, placed on the corporal, is the vessel that will hold the wine to be consecrated into the Precious Blood. Chalices are made from precious metals that are non-absorbent and they can range in design from something simple to very ornate. Lastly, the Missal is "the liturgical book containing the prayers, chants and instructions for

celebrating Mass." (Mass Explained, Dan Gonzalez, pg. 268)

As the altar is being prepared with those items, the collection is taken up and the Preparation Hymn is sung. The collection is a financial gift from the assembly to support the maintenance of the church and its various ministries. Sometimes there is a special second collection meant to help a particular program or ministry.

In the early church, after the Creed the assembly would line up to present their offerings to the Church. The offerings were usually in the form of goods such as food, clothing, or products made from one's trade. These offerings would then be divided: the bread and wine taken




to the altar, and the rest of the items would be given to the poor or the priest for his maintenance. Over time, the offering of goods slowly transferred to the offering of money, but the end result is the same: the assembly benevolently supports the salvific work of the Church and its ministries and outreach.

As the gifts of bread and wine are brought to the altar, we don't just offer our money, we also offer all that we have to God. "The lives of the faithful, their praise, sufferings, prayer, and work, are united with those of Christ and with his total offering and so acquire a new value. Christ's sacrifice present on the altar makes it possible for all generations of Christians to be united with his offering." Catechism of the Catholic Church #1368 The gifts brought forth, usually by two members of the assembly, are meant to represent the whole community bringing their entire offering of self to the altar. This act of assembly participation visibly shows the gracious exchange we experience during Mass, whereby we offer all that we have, God receives and transforms our offering, and then He gives us back his very self as we receive Him during communion. The beauty of the Mass is unsurpassed!

GROWING CLOSER TO CHRIST

The Goodness of The Father

This isn't the typical way one would start an article, but for the past couple of days, I have personally been struggling to believe that the Lord actually cares about me and that His will for me is good. Lately however, I have been listening to a Christian song called, "The Goodness of God." This song has not only reminded me of the Lord's faithfulness and goodness but has also helped me to recall who *God the Father* is. A lot of times in our life, we tend to create a false image of God based on the experiences we have been through or why things have happened in our life the way they did. But I truly just want to cry out from the depths of my heart this simple but yet profound truth to each of you (and to myself): The Father is good. And because the Father is good; you can trust Him. He is worthy of all of your love and all of your trust. If do not trust or doubt in the Father's goodness, whether it be because of your wounds, pain or experiences, just look at a crucifix. There, you will see the perfect love of the Father revealed to us in Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

In the Gospel reading, we read about a wicked judge who has no respect for God or for any human being (Luke 18:2). While the judge from the parable does not fully represent the Lord, this story helps us to understand that even a wicked and unjust judge can even hear and answer the petitions of a widow. A lot of times we think of prayer as asking for good gifts from the Lord. And this is true! The Lord does want us to ask Him for good gifts and for blessings. But have we ever prayed and asked the Lord to help us become a living reflection of the face of Christ, so that others can experience the healing and saving power of the love of Jesus Christ through us? Even if we do not get what we want, when we want it or how we want it, what is preventing us from becoming saints and from asking the Lord to help us reflect the face of the Christ to others? The Lord says, "Will not God then secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night?" (Luke 18:7). What are the rights of his chosen ones but the grace of the Holy Spirit enabling us to become holy and to become the saints we were made to be? While the Lord does desire to give us good gifts, the goal is not getting good things from God as if God is some vending machine. The goal is relationship and union with God through Jesus Christ. And from this union with God, we are called to go out and to be the face of Christ to the widow, to the sick, to the poor and to every living creature.

And finally, Jesus says to His disciples (and also to each of us), "But when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?" Will Our Blessed Lord find us seeking Him, or only His gifts? And when things don't go our way and we don't get what we want, will we rebel against the Lord and do things our way, or will we humble ourselves before the living God and run into the arms of the Father who loves us? Unlike the cruel and unjust judge in the Gospel reading, we have a Father in heaven who loves us with "an everlasting love" (Jeremiah 31:3) and He will reveal Himself and His love to us when we seek Him with all of our hearts (Jeremiah 39:13). The Father only wants our good and what is best for us. For if the unjust judge can answer the widow's persistent request, how much more will the Just Judge deliver on His promises? Therefore, I pray for each of us that we may ask for the grace to persevere in faith, hope and charity until the end and to finish the race that is before us, knowing that, "God makes all things work together for good for those who love Him and who are called according to his purpose" (Romans 8:28).

TEMPORALITIES & STEWARDSHIP

Monongahela Facilities Update: Interior/Exterior Restoration Projects Timeline

Thanks to the generosity of our parish community, donations were received earlier this year to fund the refurbishment of our Monongahela church. These improvements were intended to refresh and preserve the sacred space where we gather in worship.

However, before interior work could begin, an important issue was discovered: the church's exterior masonry walls were allowing water infiltration, which had already caused damage to the interior. To ensure the longevity of the planned repairs — and to honor the stewardship of donated funds — it was determined that exterior restoration must take precedence.

Between May and August of this year, five masonry contractors were contacted for project estimates. Of those, three submitted formal bids. Each proposal includes comprehensive restoration work:

- · 100% grind and repoint of all exterior masonry mortar joints
- · 100% repair of damaged brickwork discovered during repointing
- 100% cleaning of the exterior brick and stone façade following repointing
- 100% application of a chemical masonry sealer to the entire façade (spray method)

Before moving forward, Finance Council approval is required to proceed with contractor selection and scheduling. Once approved, work is expected to begin in spring 2026, ideally in March or April, depending on weather conditions. The exterior restoration is anticipated to take 2 to 4 months to complete.

Following the successful completion of the masonry work, the interior plaster and paint restoration will begin. These two phases cannot run concurrently, as the integrity of the interior work depends on resolving the exterior water intrusion first.

We would like to extend special appreciation to **Guy Flament**, Pastoral Council member, who has generously lent his expertise and time to help plan and coordinate these improvements. His dedication has been instrumental in guiding this process with care and foresight.

We are deeply grateful for your continued support and patience as we move forward with these essential improvements. Your contributions are helping preserve the beauty and safety of our parish home.

ON FIRE FOR CHRIST



Be persistent in prayer! Be on Fire for Christ!

In all our Readings today, persistence is the main theme throughout. In our first reading from Exodus, Moses must keep his hands raise so Israel would have the better of the fight Amalek. He had to be persistent and willing to sacrifice for the good of God's people. In our second reading from St. Paul to Timothy, he charges everyone to "proclaim the word". He goes on to say, be persistent whether it is convenient or inconvenient! In our Gospel from Luke, Jesus told a parable to His disciples about a widow who is persistent in her pursuit of the judge to render a decision against her adversary. He offers this parable to emphasize "the necessity for them to pray always without becoming weary."

Prayer serves to maintain a continuous conversation with God. It fosters watchfulness for His actions and aligns believers with His will. The core message is the necessity of persistent, faithful prayer to our loving and generous God who is exercising patience, awaiting the repentance of all people, and will bring about ultimate justice. The parable in our Gospel encourages believers to always pray and not lose heart, illustrating that just as an unjust human judge eventually grants a persistent widow justice, a just and loving God will provide for His people

who pray to Him. We should pray continuously and not give up, even when facing discouragement or feeling unheard. Unlike the unjust judge, our God is a just and generous Father who is not reluctant but willingly helps His children.

God desires for His people to have faith and trust in Him. Persistent prayer demonstrates this trust. He promises to grant justice to people who cry out to Him, and He will do so quickly when Jesus returns. God is patient, not wanting anyone to perish but everyone to come to repentance. This patience extends until Jesus' second coming.

So even when feeling tired or discouraged, return to God in humble, persistent prayer. Maintain a continuous, steadfast relationship with God, treating prayer as a continual conversation. Trust in God's goodness recognizing that God is not a reluctant judge but a good Father who desires to give good gifts to His children who ask, seek, and knock. Prayer helps believers stay watchful for God's calling and actions in the world, preparing them for the Lord's return

Our Readings, especially our Gospel, are once again a call to action. It is a call for all believers to express their thankfulness through continuous, persistent prayer so to form a radical love relationship with our awesome, forgiving, gracious and ever-loving God. Through prayer you will become on fire for Christ.

Keep remembering, if you can choose to be anything in life, choose to be on fire for Christ!

FAITH FORMATION

Kids often keep asking for things again and again because sometimes, it works! Like the judge in Jesus' story, parents can get worn down by their children's persistence. While nagging itself isn't a great habit, the *persistence* and *confidence* behind it can teach us something valuable about faith. When we keep asking God for help, it shows that we trust His goodness and want to stay close to Him.

Read Luke 18:1-8 together. Then, talk about healthy ways to share your needs and wants with each other and with God in prayer. Remember, God loves to hear from us and desires to answer our prayers. Finish your time together by lifting up your family's needs and hopes to God in prayer.
