CLERGY

A WORD FROM FR. LEVI

Grace and peace to you in Christ Jesus, our Lord! Today we begin a new liturgical year! As I mentioned last week, these first two weeks of advent focus on the second coming of the Lord and the four last things: death, judgement, heaven and hell. This week perhaps the most notable words of the Gospel are "stay awake." This week, let us ponder our own death, judgement, heaven and hell. Let us be honest with God and ourselves, and let us repent of all sin and let the Blood of Christ redeem us!

If you've ever been on a long road trip and driven through the night, then you know what it's like to try to stay awake when your body wants to sleep. The more tired you get the less you can pay attention. Slowly you lose your ability to focus and then your eyes begin to grow heavy and blink longer than they should. At this point, it is imperative that you open a window, have a soft drink, or do something else to bring yourself back to full focus on the road.

Life for us as Christians can be the same way. We may start off very excited about Jesus and fired up to live our lives for him, but as life goes on, it is easy to get drowsy and distracted by many things. So how do we snap out of it? What is the food and drink that wakes us up and keeps us alive to the presence and power of God in our lives? Is it not the eucharist?

We must not forget that every week we receive a share in The Body and Blood of Christ! We receive Communion with the Living God! What more do we need to wake us up and keep us alert on the journey?

That being said, I ran into a wonderful lady the other day who said that she grew up Catholic but never knew that Jesus died for her on the cross. She said she was never taught that. How sad to hear this. My beloved sons and daughters in Christ, Jesus Body and Blood was shed for each one of us. Not everyone else but you. Everyone including you! You are worth so much to the Lord that he has given everything for you!

May we receive the Body and Blood of our Savior poured out for us and accept the mercy we need to pay for our sins, so that we do not have to fear death and hell, but be overjoyed to meet our judge face to face and walk with him into the halls of heaven!

LITURGY PREPARATION

First Sunday of Advent

Happy new liturgical year! The 1st Sunday of Advent begins the new church year and we will now be using readings from Year A. You can see from the calendar wheel that Advent begins in the twelve o'clock position, and the rest of the liturgical year follows in a clockwise pattern.

Since Advent is a penitential season, we will use the color purple, signifying penance, preparation, and the royalty of Christ. The altar cloths, priest's vestments, and most of the candles on the advent wreath will be purple.

The advent wreath didn't start out as a Christian object but has instead been transformed into one. Historians aren't sure of exactly when lighted wreaths first started to be used, but they do know that the pre-Christian people of Germany would light wreaths during the winter as an expectation of spring, light, and warmth. Sometime during the Middle Ages the use of a lighted wreath began to be used by Christians during Advent to signify the

light of Christ coming into the world. The four candles not only marked a sort of countdown to Christmas (especially during a time that lacked modern calendars!), but it also represented how Christ was drawing ever nearer by the growing of the light each week.

If you have an advent wreath at home, please consider using the blessing below from the USCCB (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops). Each Sunday of Advent you can light another candle on the wreath and prepare for Jesus' coming at Christmas.


Make the Sign of the Cross.

Say, "Our help is in the name of the Lord, who made heaven and earth."

Then, read Scripture from the Book of Isaiah.

The USCCB points us toward Isaiah 9, Isaiah 63, or Isaiah 64.

"Lord our God, we praise you for your Son, Jesus Christ: He is Emmanuel, the hope of the peoples, He is the wisdom that teaches and guides us, He is the Savior of every nation. Lord God, let your blessing come upon us as we light the candles of this wreath. May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise to bring us salvation. May He come quickly and not delay. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen."



PROFESSION OF FAITH


I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

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GROWING CLOSER TO CHRIST

In today's culture, many people think of a king as an all-powerful and oppressive tyrant who forces his subjects to serve him. A king is seen by many people in world as a selfish leader who has the ability to do whatever he pleases. And while many kings in the past have done just that, there was a king who was much different than the rest. This king did not seek to be served, but to serve others. This king was born not in a palace, but in a stable. This king desired not acres of land nor the wealth gold, but the love and hearts of his people. This king did not take in selfishness but gave his life away in love. This is not just an ordinary king, but this man is the *King of kings*. Who is the King of kings? It is none other than Jesus Christ, the Son of the living God.

The last Sunday of the liturgical year (last Sunday the 23rd), we specifically come to understand the Kingship of Christ. The rulers at the time "sneered at Jesus and said, 'He saved others, let him save himself if he is the chosen one, the Christ of God'" (Luke 23:35). The rulers wanted to see Jesus come down from the cross in order to believe that Jesus was "the Christ of God" (Luke 23:35). One

might ask the question, "Did Our Blessed Lord have the power to save Himself?" Christ absolutely had the power to save Himself (Jeremiah 32:17), but yet He freely and willingly chose to allow Himself to be crucified for our sins so that we could have the opportunity to be saved. Why? Because our God did not want an eternity without us. So, in the Person of Jesus Christ, God *died* in our place. That's how much He loves us. Venerable Fulton J. Sheen once said, "The rain cannot save itself if it is to bud the greenery. A mother cannot save herself is she is to save her child, a soldier cannot save himself if he is to save his country. This is not the law of weakness! It's the law of sacrifice. Greater love than this no man hath, that he lay down his life for his friends." This act of sacrifice demonstrates the Kingship of Christ because "a true king serves his subjects" (King of Kings) and gives his life for his people.

And finally, as Christ is hanging on the cross, we come to discover that there were two criminals that were crucified on both sides where Christ was. One of the criminals "reviled Jesus, saying, Are you not the Christ? Save yourself and us" (Luke 23:39). What's ironic is that Christ was saving us on the cross! The mission of the Savior was not to save us from suffering, but to save us from sin and spiritual death by entering into our suffering and dying on the cross for our salvation. After good thief rebuked the bad thief for what he had said and defended Our Lord, we then hear those beautiful and heart-felt words that come from the lips of this good thief, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom" (Luke 23:42). And Jesus replied to him, "Amen I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise" (Luke 23:43). Because Christ is the King of the Universe, He gets to decide who enters into the kingdom of God. Our Lord is coming as the Just Judge and "will rule the earth with justice and the peoples with equity" (Psalm 98:8). We should all tremble at the sight of God's holiness and justice. But like the good thief, let us steal heaven (Praise Nation) by coming just as we are to the King of kings, acknowledging and weeping over our sins and asking the Good Jesus to remember us when He comes into His Kingdom and perhaps, we too will hear those comforting and immortal words spoken to each of us by Our Lord at the moment of our death, "Amen I say to you, today, you will be with me in Paradise" (Luke 23:43).

Why Centralization—and Why Now?

The decision to consolidate office operations into our Charleroi location, closing administrative functions in Monongahela and Donora, was not made lightly. It reflects months of thoughtful discernment, financial analysis, and open dialogue with our dedicated office staff. Rising utility costs, duplicate leased printer services, and the growing need for streamlined workflows all pointed to a clear truth: if we want to sustain and grow our mission, we must be willing to adapt.

Centralization allows us to:

- · Reduce overhead by eliminating duplicate services and minimizing utility expenses.
- · Strengthen team dynamics, unity, and presence by bringing our talented staff together under one roof.
- · Improve service delivery through unified communication and shared resources.
- · Create space for innovation by freeing up time and budget for mission-aligned initiatives.

A Team Ready to Lead Together

Our office personnel were thoughtfully prepared ahead of this transition and have responded with enthusiasm and grace. Their commitment to collaboration and shared purpose is a testament to the strength of our parish family. By working side-by-side, they'll be able to support one another more effectively, respond to parishioner needs more swiftly, and build a culture of unity that reflects the heart of our faith.

Stewardship in Action

This move is part of a broader strategy to ensure our parish remains vibrant and mission-driven. We are actively exploring additional cost-saving measures and operational efficiencies, including:

- · Shared technology platforms to reduce licensing fees and improve data security.
- · Centralized purchasing for supplies and services to leverage bulk discounts.
- · Flexible workspace planning to accommodate evolving needs and maximize use of space.
- · Digitized workflows to reduce paper waste and improve recordkeeping.

Each of these efforts is rooted in our commitment to responsible stewardship—not just of finances, but of time, talent, and trust.

Honoring Our Legacy, Building Our Future

While change can be bittersweet, it also opens the door to renewal. The Monongahela and Donora offices have served our parish faithfully for many years, and we honor their legacy with gratitude and hope for the future.

Our intent today is to leverage every square inch of our properties. A real example of this is our increased and repurposed usage of the parish formation center. Through strategic partnerships and grant awards, we've improved (and are still improving) the property to a fresh, inviting space utilized every day (and many evenings) for various ongoing education, formation and fellowship opportunities. As we transition to a centralized model, we carry forward the spirit of service that defined those spaces—and embrace new hope for redefined, relevant and shared purposes.

We invite all parishioners to join us in prayer and support as we take this important step. Together, we are building a stronger foundation for ministry, outreach, and community—one that will sustain us not just through 2026, but far into the future.



ON FIRE FOR CHRIST

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How many times have we waited for that call or text or email for news we longed to hear? Even with all the electronic media, sometimes the response just isn't fast enough. Have you ever waited for an acceptance to maybe a college, or to that job that you really wanted? Or from a friend or loved one that you hadn't heard from in a while. Or perhaps about the results of some medical test that you had performed. The one thing that each of these has in common is hope. We all have hope for good things to happen. Hope? That's what Advent is about! It is about hope but is also about preparation and being ready!

Today we begin the season of Advent. For many this indicates the beginning of the Christmas season, the "run to Christmas." Our weeks will be packed with the hustle and bustle of the season with absolutely no time to slow down. For some, it means a time for sadness, depression, thoughts of suicide because of loneliness, separation, remembrance of a loved one who passed away. We need to reach out to these individuals and offer them our love and support during this time. But this <u>is</u> a time of great joy and preparation and truly celebrating and preparing for the true "Reason for the Season," the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Today on

this first Sunday of Advent we also begin a new Church Year. Many consider this our birthday and perhaps we should sing!

Advent should be a time of new beginnings as we turn our attention to the coming of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. I would suggest that we also think about Advent as a time for preparing and watching for the coming of the Lord every single day and in every situation, both delightful and very difficult times. According to St. Matthew in today's gospel, the certain coming of Jesus requires us to make a decision to watch for him. Any day, any moment could be the final coming of the Lord for you and for me. Noah prepared as God had asked him but those around him busied their lives and filled them with things that were not preparing themselves for the coming of the Lord. Advent is a time of preparation for this coming of the Lord. As St. Paul tells us in the second reading, it is time to awake from our sleep, turn from our distractions our vices, for our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed and to once again understand what it means that God has called us to make Him present in the world. This means that during this season we are to take a good look at ourselves spiritually and prepare and ready ourselves to welcome the Lord when the time comes.

You will see that the readings of each Sunday of this season of Advent can help us to become more alert to watching and waiting for the Lord every day in our lives. Advent can become that time that we wait and watch for Christ, not just at the end of time, not just coming in our celebrations of Christmas, but watching and preparing for Him in every single situation and in every person we encounter daily. It may be in that moment when we are faced with our own failure, our own lack of charity, patience, or compassion. That moment when we have not done what God called us to do since His call to us at our Baptism. To see our failures can be very difficult but is a real gift from the presence of the merciful Lord. The mercy of God can give each of us hope for the future of eternal life.

So today I challenge you to take a little more time to pray over the next four weeks before Christmas, asking God what he wants YOU to do with the many gifts He's given you. Ask Him when you receive communion today to speak to your heart about this. My brothers and sisters, do you have the faith necessary to step out of your comfort zone and change your routine to allow God to prepare and ready you for His coming?

Stay Awake! Watch for Him during this Season of Advent. Be on fire for Christ! God Bless. May God's many blessings be upon you and your family. I'll see you at His table.






GROWING TOGETHER IN HOPE

THE HOLY SACRIFICE OF THE MASS

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states, "God, infinitely perfect and blessed in himself, in a plan of sheer goodness freely created man to make him share in his own blessed life" (CCC 1). Because we are not a necessary part of creation, the reality is that we do not have to exist. There is only one reason why we exist and that is because God wants us to exist. In the words of Father Mike Schmitz, "God, from all eternity, looked out at this universe and He declared, 'I do not want a universe without you in it. God does not want a universe without you in it." That is how amazing our God is! And because God alone is "the source of every good and of all love" (CCC 1723), we owe Him everything. It is so important to know that God is God (and we are not) in order to understand why we are called worship God.

In the book of Exodus, we read that the Lord gave Moses the Ten Commandments. The Third Commandment states, "Remember the Sabbath and keep it holy" (Exodus 20:8). We must keep in mind that just because The Third Commandment was in the Old Testament, that does not mean we get a free pass

to not keep holy the Lord's Day. Jesus Christ has said, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the law and the prophets; I have not come to abolish them but to fulfill them" (Matthew 5:17). Because of the New Covenant that God has made with us in Jesus Christ, we do not have a Sabbath day on Saturday, but rather, we have the Lord's Day on Sunday in honor of the Resurrection. The Catholic Church clearly teaches that, "On Sundays and other holy days of obligation the faithful are bound to participate in the Mass" (CCC 2180). And to express the importance of the Eucharist and attending Mass, the Catechism also states, "The Sunday Eucharist is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice. For this reason the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants) or dispensed by their own pastor. Those who deliberately fail in

this obligation commit a grave sin (2181). It is a sin against justice to not attend Mass on Sunday (or Saturday evening) since God alone is worthy of all worship and adoration. It is also a sin against charity since not only does not going to Mass (without a serious reason) hurt your relationship with God, but it also hurts your relationship with the Body of Christ.

Jesus tells us, "If you love me, keep my commandments" (John 14:15). If we love Jesus, we will keep the Third Commandment because we always make time for the things we love. If we can make time for friends, family, sports and so many other things, we can give God one hour a week to love and worship Him. And the way that the Lord wants us to worship Him is by attending and participating in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. As Catholics, we are also called to rest on Sunday. The Catechism teaches us, "On Sundays and other holy days of obligation, the faithful The mission of are to refrain from engaging in work or activities that hinder the worship owed to God, the joy proper to the Lord's Day, the performance of the works of mercy, and the appropriate relaxation of mind and body. Family needs or important social service can legitimately excuse from the obligation of Sunday rest. The faithful should see to it that legitimate excuses do not lead to habits prejudicial to

religion, family life, and health. The charity of truth seeks holy leisure- the necessity of charity accepts just work. (CCC 2185). What is the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass? In short, the Mass is the re-presentation of

Calvary. St. Thomas Aquinas states that, "The celebration of the Holy Mass is as valuable as the death of Jesus on the Cross." The Mass is not a new sacrifice, but the same sacrifice as Christ's sacrifice on the cross being re-presented in an unbloody manner. If we knew what merit we would obtain by attending a single Mass, if we knew the significance and meaning behind those sacred and eternal words that come from the lips of the priest: "This is My Body... This is My Blood," and if we knew how much it meant to Our Blessed Lord when we simply show up and be there for Him in faith and with "a contrite and humble heart" (Psalm 51:17), we would, in the words of St. Padre

Pio, "risk our lives to be present at a single Mass." At every Catholic Mass, the holy souls in purgatory are relieved from their suffering, Our Lady with all the angels and saints sing the praises of God, heaven and earth kiss and the Marriage Supper of the Lamb takes place. 21



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
