

# A WORD FROM FR. LEVI

Grace, love, joy and peace to you in Christ Jesus our Lord! Today we celebrate the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of Advent which is known as Gaudete Sunday! Gaudete is the word in Latin for "Rejoyce!" Today we shift our focus from the second coming of Christ to Christmas!

We are just 2 weeks away from Christmas and some of us have so many things to do and wish we had a few less. Others have hardly anything to do and wish they had a few more things on the calendar, while still others are perfectly content to be right where they are. Wherever you find yourself at this moment, I invite you to ask yourself, "What does Christmas mean to me?"

Many of us have experiences of Christmas from growing up that we absolutely treasure! Experiences of tremendous love and joy! Perhaps some of the traditions we remember so fondly are things that we are still doing today. Some of us may experience the Christmas Season with pain and sorrow because of the loss of loved ones or other traumatic things we have experienced. Wherever our past experience, I would invite you to ask yourself, "What does Christmas really mean to me and what am I waiting for?

In the Gospel, we hear what the Kingdom of God coming into the world looks like! Jesus says to John's disciples: "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have the good news proclaimed to them. And blessed is the one who takes no offense at me." These are signs of the Kingdom of God breaking into the world! These are the signs that fulfill the ancient prophecies about the Messiah! These signs continue to be worked by Christ today through His Church, through whom he manifests his presence!

This Christmas let us meditate on the coming of Christ as a baby, helpless and humble. Let us also ponder the mystery of the Christ Child's Divine Nature. This is no ordinary birth. This is a birth that changes everything because it brings together the human and divine. It is the birth of Christ that shows us that God is willing to humble Himself to the point of being joined to our human nature. What wonderous love is this?! This love is the true source of joy!

As we approach Christmas this year, let us ponder how the Kingdom of Heaven is breaking into our lives! Let us take some time to pay attention to how Jesus is working within, through and around us! May our joy be full as we ponder the mystery of the Christ-child this year, and most importantly enter into His Divine Life, at the Christmas Mass celebrations!

# LITURGY PREPARATION

# Third Sunday of Advent

Happy Gaudete Sunday! Gaudete (gow-DAY-tay), which is Latin for "rejoice," is the theme for this weekend. This Sunday takes its name from the Entrance Antiphon, which begins with the words *Gaudete in Domino semper*, or *Rejoice in the Lord always*.

Prior to the ninth century, Advent lasted for 40 days, like Lent. It used to begin on November 12<sup>th</sup>, the day after the Feast of St. Martin, so it was called St. Martin's Lent. Eventually, Advent was shortened to four weeks, as we know it today. However, similar to Lent, there is a halfway point where we take a "break" from the penitential nature of the season to celebrate how close we are to experiencing Christ's coming. You'll notice a pause in the color purple as the rose candle from the advent wreath is lit, and the priest dons rose-colored vestments. One of the reasons we shift to a lighter colored hue (purple to pink) is because the penitential season of Advent is "lightened" for a bit to experience the anticipated joy of Christmas.




This theme of rejoicing is also echoed in the readings we'll hear today. Isaiah preaches that when the Messiah comes, "then will the eyes of the blind be opened, the ears of the deaf be cleared; then will the lame leap like a stag, then the tongue of the mute will sing." (Isaiah 35:5-6) This passage sees its fulfillment in the Gospel today when John the Baptist's disciples visit Jesus to inquire whether he is the Messiah. John was unable to ask Jesus personally because he was in prison, but Jesus sends word back to him through John's disciples saying, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have the good news proclaimed to them." (Matthew 11:5)

The real reason for rejoicing over those passages isn't so much that Jesus healed people of various disabilities, although I'm sure for the ones that were healed there was *much* rejoicing. But the bigger reason for rejoicing is that Jesus is finally here to save us, and those miraculous healings were just one of the ways that Jesus chose to prove he was the Son of God.

The one thing that hasn't changed from Jesus' time to today is that everyone experiences difficulties and burdens. They might be physical limitations like those from the readings, or they could be any other thing we experience as humans. I'm sure many of us pray for Jesus to remove our suffering just as instantly as he healed the blind, deaf, and lame. I mean, we know he has the ability to do that! Even if He chooses to allow our burden to remain (which is for our greater good, even if we can't see it now) we shouldn't allow that burden to replace our inner joy. Sometimes I visualize burdens as a cloak we wear, and it can seem as if our joy is "cloaked" in hardship. Even if we have a heavy cloak, our joy can still remain because both things can be true at the same time: we can experience the difficulties of life, but we also have the hope of a Savior who will redeem us from all sin and suffering. This hope can do wonders to lighten whatever load we carry because it gives purpose to our suffering.



The Lord is using every hardship for good in some way. I pray that we can place our burdens in the Lord's hand and continue to walk with an inner heart of rejoicing through this Advent season toward the light of Christ's coming and the joy of Christmas. Gaudete!



# PROFESSION OF FAITH


I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.







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# GROWING CLOSER TO CHRIST

The Signs of the Savior

When you think about the relationship between a father and his child, what comes to mind? What do you think of and how do you feel? When I think about the relationship between a father and his child, I imagine that a father who loves his child would do everything in his power to reveal and communicate his love for his child so that there would be no confusion about the matter. In the same way, when we think about God the Father communicating His love to His children, we must keep in mind that the Lord always desires to reveal and communicate His everlasting love to each and every one of us. There's nothing He wants more than to love you and to have you know, experience and live in His love. And because Jesus Christ is the Son of God and perfectly reveals the love and Heart of the Father, we can know with certainty that we are loved by the Lord. Knowing His love for us, we are called to love Him in return by repenting of our sins, giving our lives to the

Father through Christ and living in His love as we keep the commandments and live a life of holiness.

In the Gospel reading for the Third Sunday of Advent, we see clearly the signs of the Savior. God the Father wanted to clearly communicate to each of us that Jesus is the Son of God. Jesus proved He was indeed "sent by the Father" (John 20:21) through miracles, signs and wonders. We read in the Gospel of Matthew, John the Baptist's disciples asking Our Lord, "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?" (Matthew 11:3). Jesus responded to them, saying, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed. The deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have the good news proclaimed to them. And blessed is the one who takes no offense at me." (Matthew 11:4-6). These are many of the signs and wonders that Jesus did which proved He is God in the flesh! It is in Jesus Christ that we can know with certitude that God the Father is not some distant being somewhere in the sky, but rather, much closer to us than ourselves and is compassionate towards His creation. Let us also keep in mind that Jesus is the Word made flesh (John 1:14). Jesus is the Word that God the Father wanted to say to the world! The life, passion and death of lesus is what God the Father wanted to declare to the world. In fact, the Catechism of the Catholic Church states, "Christ, the Son of God made man, is the Father's one, perfect and unsurpassable Word. In him he has said everything; there will be no other word than this one" (CCC 65). And every word that Jesus utters, every sigh Christ makes, and every tear Christ sheds is allowed in order to reveal the glory and the Heart of the Father.

My encouragement for all of us is that we come to make Jesus Christ loved and to realize that miracles, wonders and signs are not a thing of the past, but rather, they are still happening today! The Holy Spirit is just as present to us now as He was to the first Apostles! The Lord wants to bless the whole world through us! Our Blessed Lord even says, "Amen, amen, I say to you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do, and indeed will do even greater ones than these because I am going to the Father." (John 14:12). Jesus desires to communicate His Spirit to us so that we may become the glorious saints we were destined to be! And because the same Holy Spirit that raised Jesus from dead lives in You (Romans 8:11), you are called to give sight to the blind, cleanse the lepers, raise the dead and proclaim the good news to the poor and to every living creature (Mark 16:15)!

# A Sweet Legacy: Honoring Our World Famous Donuts

Some ministries feed the soul. This one also feeds the sweet tooth—and has for over four decades.

What began in the 1980s at the former St. Anthony's site as a humble fundraiser has risen—quite literally—into one of the most beloved and enduring traditions in our parish's history. Our *World Famous Donuts* are more than a treat. They're a symbol of community, resilience, and joyful service.

In 2021, as the world slowly emerged from the isolation of the pandemic, the scent of fresh donuts once again filled the air—this time at the parish park in Monongahela. With offertory down and spirits in need of lifting, the donut ministry was revived not just to raise funds, but to rekindle connection. Thanks to the generosity of the Amati family, who sponsored a new donut machine, the tradition was reborn with purpose and pride.

Since that celebrated return (and through November 2025), the donut team has sold an astounding **65,167** donuts, raising **\$57,990** in gross profits to support parish life and ministries. But the real story isn't just in the numbers—it's in the people.

At the heart of this ministry is a dedicated team of volunteers who rise early, work joyfully, and serve faithfully. Today, the operation is led by the ever-energetic **Liz Cichy**, whose leadership keeps the ministry running smoothly and sweetly. Alongside her, we gratefully recognize the faithful hands and generous hearts of:



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# ON FIRE FOR CHRIST



Today is the third Sunday of Advent, popularly known as "Gaudete Sunday." The term Gaudete simply means "to rejoice." This Advent, we should be preparing to live a new experience of love and faith in God.

As we come closer to the feast of Christmas, the church encourages us to rejoice because God is about to fulfill His promise to us. However, this does not mean we have come to the end of our preparation this season of Advent. Instead, it is a way of urging us to be more focused and courageous. It is also a way of assuring that our preparations shall soon be rewarded. Today, all our readings exhort us to be happy, joyful, prepared and patient as we wait for the Lord's coming.

For our joy to be complete this season we must be charitable, forgiving, just, and be modest in our actions. We must seek reconciliation and live in peace with one another. Above all, we must avoid all acts that can make life difficult for others. Finally, we need patience and constancy in prayer. These are very important spiritual virtues. These will lead us to sanctity and

fullness of joy. As we wait joyfully for the fulfillment of God's promises to us this season, may He fill our hearts with charity and peace of mind. Amen!

So, during this Advent season, we need to continually look for His presence in the people that we enjoy being with and in the people that give us difficulties. Advent is that time when we can really concentrate on waiting, watching and preparing for the Lord; and Advent is a time to reflect on what's really important in our lives and to prepare ourselves to meet Jesus, to welcome Him into our lives not only at Christmas but each and every day and especially when we meet Him face to face.

We should ask ourselves, "If I changed some of my habits or activities would this give me more time to grow closer to God? Am I too comfortable in my current routine? Am I stretching myself to move out of my comfort zone to better serve Him? Could I possibly make more room in my life to become more involved where I can make better use of the gifts and talents He's given me?

Make small changes: consider giving up a half hour of television so you can read and reflect on the day's Mass readings and pray the rosary or perhaps rise half hour earlier each morning. St. Francis de Sales once said, "Every one of us needs a half an hour of prayer every day, except when we are busy—then we need an hour." Maybe you could come to morning Mass or Adoration a few days a week and spend time with our Lord in the Eucharist. There is no better way to start your day than with Mass! You could consider receiving the Sacrament of Reconciliation to receive God's infinite mercy. Challenge yourself and jump into a new ministry or stop and help a homeless person. Give of yourself and see Jesus in others.

Do you want to really challenge yourself? Don't tell anybody, but for the next two weeks until Christmas do everything for others. Ask them if they need help. Immediately respond if they ask you to do something. Go out of your way to help others with your time, talent, and treasures. Get up each morning and ask your spouse, how can I make your day easier? Let me know how you feel after Christmas. I'll bet you will be overcome with joy. I challenge you! I will pledge that I will do this.

It hit me the other night after consuming the large Thanksgiving meal and I was bursting at my seams. Were you this way? What if we came each day, each Sunday to this Eucharistic Table that God has laid out and consumed Christ so much that we were bursting at our spiritual seams. Can you imagine the joy that you would have?!

There's a lot to do between now and Christmas, most of which has to do with what's on the inside to get ready to meet Jesus. My brothers and sisters, are you up for the challenge? Do you have the faith necessary to step out of your comfort zone and change your routine to allow God to prepare and ready you for His coming? Be on fire for Christ! Go out and spread His Good News! God Bless. I'll see you at His table.

# **FAITH FORMATION**

Sometimes when we look at the world around us it can feel discouraging, as if God is far away or not working in the midst of everything happening. Advent reminds us that we are a people of hope. God's saving love is already present in our world, and yet we continue to wait for its fullness.

Read today's Gospel together. Reflect on John's question to Jesus: "Are you the One?" Notice how Jesus answers by pointing to the signs of God's kingdom already taking shape: acts of healing, mercy, and new life.

As a family, spend a few minutes looking through a newspaper or news website to find stories that show hope, kindness, and God's work in the world. Talk about where you see goodness shining through.





# **GROWING TOGETHER IN HOPE**

Physical postures and the postures of the heart at mass

When I taught the students at Madonna how to go to Mass, I gave them a little phrase to memorize: "we stand to respond, we sit to listen, and we kneel to adore." They repeated it so often that (hopefully) it became second nature. But the truth is, that simple line really holds the heart of what our bodies are doing during the liturgy. If you remember nothing else from this article, I hope you remember that.

The Church reminds us in the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* (yes, the priest's book comes with instructions) that the gestures and postures we use at Mass help show our unity with one another (GIRM 42). They're not just motions we go through; they actually help us pray. Even when age or health keeps us from doing everything physically, the intention of the heart still matters tremendously. Here's a look at those three basic postures and what they mean for our prayer.

# **Sitting** — A Posture for Listening

Most of us spend a good part of Mass sitting down, especially during the readings and the homily. Sitting isn't a "break" from worship; it's the posture of someone who wants to learn. It's the posture Mary took when she "sat at the Lord's feet and listened to him" (Luke 10:39). The Catechism reminds us that God's Word is a light for our path (CCC 131; cf. Ps 119:105). When we sit and listen, we're doing exactly what disciples are supposed to do.

# Posture of the heart — "Lord, help me hear You."

And for many of us, especially those who can't stand or kneel easily, sitting becomes a real offering. Simply being present and attentive is a prayer.

# **Standing** — A Posture for Responding

Standing is something we all instinctively understand. When someone important enters a room, we stand. When we want to show respect, we stand. It's the same at Mass. We stand for the entrance procession, for the Gospel, and at times when the prayers call for our active response.

Scripture shows God's people standing to hear His Word (Nehemiah 8:5), and the Church says standing is a sign of respect and attention (GIRM 43).

# <u>Posture of the heart</u> — "Here I am, Lord."

If standing is difficult, don't worry. God sees the heart that wants to respond, even if the body can't quite keep up.

#### **Kneeling** — A Posture for Adoration

Kneeling has always been a gesture of reverence and humility before God. Saint Paul says that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend (Philippians 2:10). During the Eucharistic Prayer, kneeling expresses our belief that something holy, something miraculous, is happening before us. The Church says kneeling during the consecration is a sign of adoration (GIRM 43), and the Catechism speaks of gestures like kneeling as signs of the worship we give to God alone (CCC 2628).

# Posture of the heart — "My Lord and my God."

And again, if kneeling isn't physically possible, a simple bow of the head can express the same reverence.

#### **One Simple Takeaway**

As our parish prepares for the new Mass schedule, it's a good time to think about how we enter into the liturgy. The Mass involves our bodies just as much as our minds and hearts.

So remember the little phrase: "we stand to respond, we sit to listen, and we kneel to adore." These movements, whether we can make them physically or only in our hearts, help us pray more fully and draw us closer to the Lord who welcomes us at every Mass.





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
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
