

A WORD FROM FR. LEVI

Happy Holy Family Sunday! The Holy Family is an icon of family life as it reflects the perfect love of the Trinity in such a profoundly beautiful way! Just as the Trinity is a communion of persons, so the Holy Family is a communion of persons. This is the calling of all families, the church and the whole human race. Today the readings speak to us about how we should be building and preserving Communion within our families through the grace of God!

First, we must recognize that no family is perfect, just as none of us are perfect. That is something that we just have to accept. That being said, by the grace of God we can allow ourselves to be perfected every moment and every day. Yes, indeed the hand of God can transform us if we let it!

The Responsorial Psalm says, "Blessed are those who fear the Lord and walk in His ways." The fear of the Lord is not a servile fear, but a fear that is learned. It is a healthy and good fear which shows honor to God! This healthy fear of God is similar to the healthy fear we should have of our parents. It is a deep respect and reverence for. knowing that they are in charge and we are not. In the first reading we heard that we should be obedient to our parents and honor them all the days of their lives. The reading from Sirach even says, "whoever honors his father atones for sins." So the first things we need to do to work toward greater Communion in our families is to work at better honoring our father and mother.

The second reading is a road map to Communion in any community! Please take the bulletin home and keep reading over this passage and ask the Lord how you can better apply this wisdom. I don't have enough room in the bulletin to break down the passage, so I will just highlight one thing: Forgive!! Forgive!! Forgive!! If our Lord has forgiven us, who are we to not forgive our blood family. church family and human family? How can we ask the Lord to forgive us, knowing that our sin is why Jesus suffered His passion, and then turn around and not forgive our brothers and sisters? Even the greatest offenses committed against us, do not amount to what we owe God for dying for our sins. Saint Pope John Paul II forgave the man who shot him. St. Stephen called out as he was being murdered, "Father forgive them." Forgiveness is the key to Communion and it is the key to true joy! Do not let your hearts grow you remained with Jesus for that day, cold and embittered, but forgive and live in the freedom and love of the children of God!

In the Holy Family we have the perfect model of heartfelt compassion, humility, gentleness, patience, love and forgiveness! In them we find the ideal for which we long, but we must not seek to make ourselves holy like them, we must yearn for our Savoir to fill us with the grace to be made holy like them! By this I mean to say that our perfection lies not in our own will and ability, but in the grace of God! So let us avail ourselves of the grace and mercy of God and discover His awesome work within each of us and our families!

Feast of The Most Holy Family of Jesus, Mary & Joseph

For everyone that's a mother or father, you know there is a definite point in time before becoming a parent and after becoming a parent. That may seem like a nonsense statement, because of course there's a "before" and an "after," but parents never really know how much of their lives will change until they have kids and start to experience all the changes they have to make firsthand. In the "before," you could probably go out to dinner on a whim, call up a friend and have an uninterrupted conversation, make weekend plans to spend time with friends, or come home from work and just immediately start relaxing (I'm laughing out loud at that one!). In the "after," those things and many others become rare, or sometimes even impossible. You might not realize it when you're in the delivery room, but when you walk out of that room, your life is completely different and the life you had before can become unrecognizable.

When Mary and Joseph became parents, they must have gone through guite a transition as well. Even before becoming parents, Mary and Joseph experienced a number of hardships: Mary become pregnant out of wedlock, Joseph married his pregnant fiancé on faith, they had to endure a long journey to Bethlehem while Mary was 9 months pregnant, and then they couldn't find a place for her to give birth! As traumatic as all of that was, when they left Bethlehem, they had to flee to Egypt (now with a newborn in tow) to ensure the safety of their baby from King Herod. There had to be times where Mary and Joseph's prior lives felt so far away.

I think there's a beautiful analogy here between becoming parents and Christ coming into our lives at Christmas. There is a "before" and "after" there too, and in the "after" our lives should look different in the same way as when people become parents. If we allow Christ to be birthed into our lives then we'll find that our lives start aligning to Him, which generally causes some rearranging to happen! How beautiful it is that when we have children our focus is taken off of ourselves and placed onto them. In the same way, when we give our lives to Jesus, we realize our lives aren't about ourselves and never were. Sometimes it takes a child to show us that truth.

Prayer to the Holy Family

Jesus, Mary and Joseph, in you we contemplate the splendor of true love; to you we turn with trust. Holy Family of Nazareth, grant that our families too may be places of communion and prayer, authentic schools of the Gospel and small domestic churches. Holy Family of Nazareth, may families never again experience violence, rejection and division; may all who have been hurt or scandalized find ready comfort and healing. Holy Family of Nazareth, make us once more mindful of the sacredness and inviolability of the family, and its beauty in God's plan. Jesus, Mary and Joseph, graciously hear our prayer. Amen. GROWING CLOSER TO CHRIST

GOD AS A FAMILY

Have you ever thought of God as a family? As Catholics, we believe that God is a family because God is love! The great Catholic philosopher, Peter Kreeft, describes how in order for God to be love, God must be a Trinity, stating, "If God is not a Trinity, God is not love. For love requires three things: a lover, a beloved, and a relationship between them." St. Augustine also proves this point by saying, "Wherever there is love, there is a Trinity: a lover, a beloved, and a fountain of love." God is a trinity, a Communion of Persons - Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Because God a trinity, God is a family. And because God is a family, every human family is a reflection of the Most Holy Trinity!

God is a family of perfect love. We read in the first letter of St. John the reality that, "God is love, and whoever abides in love abides in God and God abides in him" (1 John 4:16). Father Boniface Hicks describes this profound

truth by saying, "Only in Christianity do we have the revelation in Christ that God is love. And so, in Christianity we can say that holiness is love... holiness is the perfection of love, the perfection of charity. So how do you start living holiness? By loving." St. Paul in Colossians goes straight to the heart of what it means to be holy, "And over all these put on love, that is, the bond of perfection." (Colossians 3:14) Therefore, to be like God and to be holy means to be perfect in love. When we truly allow ourselves to be loved by the Lord and charity is set ablaze in our hearts, we will begin to desire a life of holiness!

We see the love and holiness of God in such a beautiful way in the life of the Holy Family. Just by looking at a picture of the Holy Family, we can get a sense of the simplicity, beauty, and charity that was present in the lives of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. If you mediate upon the selfless and sacrificial love of St. Joseph, the docility and purity of Mary and the obedience and humility of the Child Jesus, you will begin to understand what it means to be truly holy and how a family can reach the heights of Christian perfection. Pope St. John Paul II exclaims, "The Holy Family is the beginning of countless other holy families!" However, St. John Paul II also warns us saying, "The great danger for family life, in the midst of any society whose idols are pleasure, comfort and independence, lies in the fact that people close their hearts and become selfish." But when a husband truly wills the good of his wife with a sacrificial love (the way Christ loved the Church), when a wife loves her husband by receiving his love and submitting to his headship, and when children are raised in the way of the Lord and are obedient to their parents, we can really get a glimpse of the Holy Family in the world today.

I truly believe that men who imitate St. Joseph in sacrificial love and joyful obedience to the Father will *transform* the world. We hear from the Gospel that the angel of the Lord appeared to St. Joseph twice in his dreams (Matthew 2:13, 19-20). Because St. Joseph listened and was obedient to the voice of God, St. Joseph saved Jesus' life from Herod. We don't know how things would have turned out if St. Joseph was not obedient, but the reality is that St. Joseph was obedient to the Lord and he walked fully in his masculinity as a courageous and humble man of God. St. Joseph was entrusted with the task of being the head and leader of the Holy Family, and God was so humble so as to subject Himself in Christ to the authority of St. Joseph! Let us run to St. Joseph and ask him with child-like trust and confidence to lead us by the hand and to help us become the men and women we were made to be!

Community Grant Awarded to St. Andrew the Apostle Ministry

In October, our parish shared the story of the Dignity Robe Ministry, led by Mrs. Rita Demeter and her dedicated team. Their mission of creating handmade dignity robes touched the hearts of many, and the spotlight through both the bulletin and a Ministry Minute video inspired parishioners to respond with generosity. Targeted donations were solicited to help cover the cost of supplies and materials, and awareness of the ministry's purpose grew throughout the community. As a reminder, Mrs. Demeter and team produced and distributed over 900 dignity robes in 2025 across the Allegheny Health Network, Mon Valley Penn Highlands, and most recently UPMC's Hillman Cancer Center.

That awareness has now blossomed into something even greater. On December 2nd, our parish was awarded a \$3,800 grant jointly funded by Highmark Blue Cross Blue Shield and the Alleghenv Health Network. This opportunity came to us thanks to lifelong parishioner Johnna Pro, who shepherded the grant application with the help of Mrs. Demeter and me. The grant will provide vital support and supplies for the Dignity Robe Ministry, ensuring that more garments can continue to be created and more lives can be touched by the gift of dignity and compassion.

Highmark Blue Cross Blue Shield and Allegheny Health Network are two of the region's leading health organizations, both deeply committed to improving the well-being of Western Pennsylvania. MEET 'THE LORETO PROJECT'

Hello Saint Andrew the Apostle Parish Community, we are very excited to start providing music for the 6pm Liturgy at your Church in Monongahela! Funny enough, our names are Joseph and Mary — and we also have a son named Joshua (which is another translation of the Hebrew name for Jesus). Since we are new to the community, Fr. Levi and the parish staff thought it would be fitting for us to share a bit about ourselves - and even more fitting to do so as we celebrate the Solemnity of the Holy Family.

To share a bit about where we are from, Mary is a cradle Catholic from a large family of nine children hailing from a suburban area in the most northern part of Mississippi. Joseph, on the other hand, was raised an atheist in a rural part of southwestern Michigan as the oldest child in a family of two. Both of us through the providence of God found our way to Steubenville, OH where we both completed our undergraduate degrees: Mary receiving a degree in business and Joseph a degree in philosophy.

While it may sound like a potential college romance story, we didn't meet during our time at university. We met through mutual friends while Mary was working for the Catechetical Institute and as Joseph was completing a masters in catechetics and evangelization and also working for the university. Following a 6 month dating period, we were betrothed formally on the Solemnity of the Holy Family in 2023 at Holy Family Parish in Steubenville — the parish where we would get married in 2024 on the feast of Our Lady of Perpetual Help.

Our experience in music differs about as much as our upbringing. Mary started playing music at the age of 7 and was leading masses for her local parish by the age of 12. She has been playing music for the Church ever since, even having the opportunity to do so for Franciscan University conferences, retreats, and even a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. Joseph started playing guitar at 14 and by the age of 19 was in a semi-professional metal-core band. Following his conversion, he joined a Church choir where the Lord baptized his gifts. Since then, he has also served the Church by leading masses, retreats, and even a couple pilgrimages to Medjugorje and Fatima.

In the coming weeks we will share more about what the Lord has been doing with our music ministry as a married couple, but for this week we want to end by thanking you for welcoming us to be a part of your community in a special way. It seems a biblical wrong is undone as Joseph, Mary, and Joshua have found room to stay within your parish! We are looking forward to getting to know each of you more personally week in and week out, and we are excited to be following Christ together.





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As we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family, we see not perfection, but profound faithfulness. In their flight to Egypt, they faced fear and uncertainty, yet Joseph trusted God, Mary supported him, and Jesus grew in wisdom. This is our call: to be a *family on pilgrimage*, trusting God in our own uncertainties. Let us be a haven of love, forgiveness, and quiet prayer, creating sanctuaries where faith takes root. May we, like Mary, offer a resounding "YES" to God's call, like Joseph, protect and provide, and like Jesus, grow in love. 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GROWING TOGETHER IN HOPE

One Faith, Many Beautiful Ways to Worship: Preparing for Our New Mass Schedule

In the coming weeks, our parish will be adding three new Sunday Mass options to our existing schedule. Any change in something as precious as the Mass can feel unsettling, especially if you have worshipped in a certain way for many years. Your love for the Eucharist and your fidelity to this parish are a gift, and this new schedule is meant to *honor* that love, not replace it.

From the very beginning, the Second Vatican Council's Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, Sacrosanctum Concilium, said that "Mother Church earnestly desires that all the faithful should be led to that fully conscious, and active participation in liturgical celebrations which is demanded by the very nature of the liturgy." (SC 14) One of the strengths of the current form of the Roman Rite (the Novus Ordo) is that it allows this active participation to take shape in more than one way, while still preserving the unity of the Mass. The Council explicitly taught that "even in the liturgy the Church does not wish to impose a rigid uniformity in matters which do not involve the faith or the good of the whole community" and that she "respects and fosters" different gifts and traditions, so long as the true spirit of the liturgy is preserved (SC 37-38). This is what we desire to do with our new schedule: one faith, one Mass, expressed in many complementary ways

Our Existing Musical Traditions

First, nothing good is being "thrown out." The Council devoted an entire chapter to music, calling the Church's musical heritage "a treasure of inestimable value" and insisting that this treasure "is to be preserved and fostered with great care." (SC 112, 114) That is what we already try to do here through:

~ our Adult Choir ~the Children's Choir ~the Folk Group

These groups are not going away. They remain at the heart of our parish's musical life, helping us sing the Mass and not just be "at" the Mass. In fact, Sacrosanctum Concilium explicitly encourages choirs and says pastors should be careful that, whenever the liturgy is sung, "the whole body of the faithful may be able to contribute that active participation which is rightly theirs." (SC 114)

The new Mass options are meant to **build on**, not replace, this rich foundation.

The Three New Mass Options

7:30 a.m. Early-Morning Low Mass in Donora - Quiet and Reflective

Our earliest Mass, 7:30 a.m. in Donora, will be a simpler, quieter celebration. There will be no music and an atmosphere of silence and recollection. This reflects the Council's desire that the rites be marked by "noble simplicity"— "short, clear, and unencumbered by useless repetitions," and within the people's powers of comprehension (SC 34). For those who value peace and stillness, or who need a shorter, earlier Mass, this will be a place to rest in God without distraction.

11:30 a.m. High Mass in Monongahela - "All the Smells and Bells"

Later in the morning, at 11:30 a.m. in Monongahela, we will offer a more solemn High Mass, with incense, processions, and fuller use of chant and hymnody. Sacrosanctum Concilium teaches that "liturgical worship is given a more noble form when... celebrated solemnly in song" (SC 113) and that the Church's musical tradition forms a "necessary or integral part of the solemn liturgy." (SC 112) This Mass will draw from the Church's "treasure of inestimable value" in sacred music and ritual, helping us experience the beauty and reverence of our tradition in a very tangible way.

6:00 p.m. Evening Mass in Monongahela - Contemporary Praise and Worship


In the evening, at **6:00 p.m. in Monongahela**, we will add a Mass that incorporates contemporary praise and worship music, while remaining reverent and faithful to the rubrics. Here again, we are following the Council's own guidance. Sacrosanctum Concilium says that the Church "does not wish to impose a rigid uniformity" and that she sometimes even admits elements from different cultures "into the liturgy itself, provided they harmonize with its true and authentic spirit." (SC 37) For many younger Catholics—and many older ones, too—this style of music makes it easier to sing, respond, and pray with their whole heart. As the Council said, the goal is that the faithful "should not be there as strangers or silent spectators," but should "take part in the sacred action conscious of what they are doing, with devotion and full collaboration." (SC 48)

One Mass, Many Doors

Across all our Masses—old and new—the essentials do not change: the same sacrifice of Christ, the same proclamation of the Word, the same Eucharist, the same Roman Rite. What varies is the "door" through which people are helped to enter: silence or song, chant or folk harmonies, incense or a more understated style. The Council fathers were very clear that, "provided that the substantial unity of the Roman rite is preserved," there is room for "legitimate variations and adaptations to different groups, regions and peoples" (SC 38). Our parish is simply living this out on a local level: one parish, one faith, several pathways to deeper participation. You may find one Mass that fits you especially well—that's fine. You may also discover that occasionally attending a different style of Mass open's your heart in a new way. Our hope is not to divide the community, but to welcome all.

As we move into this new schedule, I ask for your patience, your openness, and above all your charity. In every Mass—whatever the style—we remain **one Body in Christ**, gathered around **one**

altar, worshipping one Lord.





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
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
