

A WORD FROM FR. LEVI

Grace and peace to you in Christ! I pray you are well and keeping warm these days! The readings this week turn our life expectations up-side down! Perhaps the verse that sums everything up the best is 1 Corinthians 1:27, which states, "Rather, God chose those who were weak to shame the strong. God chose those in the world who were lowly and despised, those who count for nothing, to reduce to nothing those who were regarded as worthy, so that no one could boast in the presence of God." Notice that throughout salvation history God always raises up the humble and lowly who are obedient to him!

Christ himself conforms to this pattern by being born to a humble family and coming to earth as an outcast in a stable. He then lives as a refugee in Egypt and upon returning to Israel spends years in humble obedience to his parents. During the time of Jesus' public ministry, he had no home. He went from place to place and stated himself, "the son of man has nowhere to lay his head." (Mathew 8:20). Perhaps the verse that sums up our Lord's conformity to this pattern of humility and poverty being raised up is Philippians 2:6-11, which says, "Though he was in the form of God, he did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness... Because of this God greatly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above all other names." Jesus is the perfect example for us to follow!

The beatitudes may sound funny because we are expecting them to say, "blessed are the wealthy, because God has favored them." That is certainly how the Jews of Jesus' day would have been thinking, and it is often how we still think today. Jesus helps to change our perspective as we read these beatitudes. He tells us, "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are they who mourn...Blessed are the meek...Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness for they will be satisfied."

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ! Let us not be afraid to be lowly and humble. Let us not be afraid to be among the meek and mourning. The beauty of the Gospel is that God comes to meet us when we are feeling our lowest and struggling the most! Jesus meets us there and raises us up with His love beyond all telling! May we, the St. Andrew the Apostle Parish family humble ourselves as Christ did and help to raise up those who we encounter at their lowest. May we reveal his Most Sacred Heart to all of those in need!

LITURGY PREPARATION

4th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Have you ever battled with something for years, like in the case of a chronic illness, a tough relationship with someone that hasn't improved with time or effort, or a job where you've been dissatisfied, but haven't had the ability to quit? These, or any other long-term battles can take so much from you and leave you exhausted in their wake, but they can also teach many different life lessons, they can hone virtues if we bear with them patiently, and hopefully they draw us closer to Christ knowing that he has orchestrated every difficulty and every good in our life for a specific reason.

One of the long-term spiritual battles that every human is forced to contend with is called *concupiscence*. The Catechism of the Catholic Church says this about concupiscence: "It is a deprivation of original holiness and justice, but human nature has not been totally corrupted: it is wounded in the natural powers proper to it; subject to ignorance, suffering, and the dominion of death; and inclined to sin." (CCC 405) This inclination to sin is one the after-effects of Original Sin. Even though Original Sin is removed at our baptism, concupiscence remains. It's like we are "bent" toward sin, and in order not to sin, we need to actively "bend" toward what's right, otherwise our fallen human nature will take over.

The Gospel passage today is the Beatitudes from the Sermon on the Mount, and the 1st reading, psalm, and 2nd readings all echo themes similar to the beatitudes, how God calls us to behave and treat others. Unlike the commandments, which begin with "Thou shalt not," and literally command us not to do certain things, the beatitudes show how God will bless us *for* doing certain things. It seems to me that one way we can battle against our concupiscence is by following the beatitudes. Each beatitude lists something that in our human nature we would not intrinsically desire. Who would want to be poor in spirit when we could make our own rules, or to mourn when we could be happy, or to be merciful when we could get revenge, or to be persecuted when we could be protected and safe, or to be insulted when we could be praised? Our "inclination toward sin" would have us reject the beatitudes because they go against the grain, they're hard, they're uncomfortable. But God, with his help and grace, is always calling us to higher heights of holiness, and so to combat our concupiscence we should actively train ourselves in the way of the beatitudes: to be meek, merciful, clean of heart, and to act as peacemakers.

I chose "The Prayer of St. Francis" today as the Preparation Hymn because like the Beatitudes, this hymn shows a surprising inversion. When we encounter hatred, we show love, when there's been injury, we pardon, if we see despair, we offer hope, instead of sadness, we bring joy. The whole hymn is a prayer about abstaining from reacting to negative things in the normal, human fashion, and instead reacting in a way that brings us into alignment with how God calls us to act as Christians.

We're going to need divine help as we learn to "bend" toward righteousness, but God absolutely hears and answers our prayers, especially when we ask for help in becoming more pure, more holy, and more like him.



GROWING CLOSER TO CHRIST

In today's Gospel, Matthew tells us that Jesus went up to the mountain, sat down, and began to teach. Matthew is portraying Jesus as the new Moses. Moses went up to the mountain to receive the law. When Jesus sits, He assumes the position of a rabbi, and now He is teaching the law.

In the Jewish tradition, beatitudes were used in two ways. The first was praise for someone who had chosen a holy path or found themselves in a fortunate situation. The second was a promise of future comfort and consolation to one who was suffering. Jesus proceeds to teach using beatitudes in both manners. He defines the characteristics of His true disciples and offers encouragement to the downtrodden.

I like to use the Beatitudes as an examination of conscience at the end of the day. Reviewing my day and the areas where I've fallen short of living the Beatitudes allows me to repent and seek the Lord's guidance and support in doing better the next day.

At the heart of the Beatitudes is the answer to what we can do to share God's love with the world. As we begin Lent next month, we can each choose a Beatitude to focus on.

I'll share with you three that I'm considering.

My first is, "Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be satisfied." (Mt 5:6) When we strive to see God's law observed with a zealous hunger, this desire often takes shape in very ordinary moments of daily life, especially in our families and closest relationships. It is the parent who insists on honesty even when a lie would be easier, or who apologizes to a child after losing their patience. It is choosing not to speak unkindly about a friend, coworker, or family member who is not present, correcting gently rather than harshly, and acting with integrity even when cutting corners or staying silent would be easier. When we orient our homes and relationships toward truth, justice, and goodness, we can create an environment where God's law is not a burden but a source of life.

The next is, "Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy." (Mt 5:7) Recently, I've been talking with others about forgiveness. What it is, how to do it, and how to live it. These have been robust and challenging conversations. They reminded me of a quote from Father Greg Boyle, founder of Homeboy Industries, about the difference between forgiveness and mercy. Father Greg explains that forgiveness often waits for the other to apologize, show remorse, or change, but mercy does not wait. Mercy is a full embrace, like the Father of the prodigal son. Mercy is what Jesus offers from the cross. He pours His life out for us and invites us to embrace His mercy and extend it to others. In our closest relationships, including family life and friendships, mercy often shows up in the moments when we are most tempted to withhold it. It is choosing to remain open to a spouse after a hurtful argument, or to a friend who has disappointed us, rather than closing off emotionally. It is responding with compassion to a child who is acting out, or offering patience to a coworker who is difficult or slow to change, rather than assuming bad intentions. Mercy does not deny the wound or excuse the behavior, but it refuses to reduce the other person to their worst moment. When we practice mercy, our relationships, whether in our families, friendships, workplaces, or parish life, become examples of healing rather than scorekeeping.

Finally, "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God." (Mt 5:9) A peacemaker seeks to reconcile themselves and their community to the Father. This work is about the restoration of relationships and holiness. Jesus is our ultimate peacemaker, and the reward for living as He did is an intimate relationship with God. In family life and beyond, peacemaking is not about avoiding conflict but about tending relationships with care. It can look like being the first to suggest a hard conversation with a family member or friend, rather than allowing resentment to grow through silence or distance. It can mean modeling reconciliation by admitting fault and asking for forgiveness. Peacemaking can also mean refusing to take sides in gossip, choosing humility in disagreement, and working quietly to restore unity in our communities.

As we approach Lent, I invite you to choose one Beatitude to live intentionally. Pray with it, notice where it challenges you, and look for small, concrete ways to practice it in your daily relationships, in your family, among friends, at work, and within our parish community. At the end of each day, return to that Beatitude in prayer and ask the Lord where you lived it well and where you need His grace. In doing so, we allow Christ to form our hearts and our homes more closely to His own.

JOURNEY TO THE FOOT OF THE CROSS: BISHOP RICKEN OFFERS 10 THINGS TO REMEMBER FOR LENT

Bishop David L. Ricken of Green Bay, Wisconsin, former chairman of the Committee on Evangelization and Catechesis of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), offers "10 Things to Remember for Lent":

1. Remember the formula. The Church does a good job capturing certain truths with easy-to-remember lists and formulas: 10 Commandments, 7 sacraments, 3 persons in the Trinity. For Lent, the Church gives us almost a slogan—Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving—as the three things we need to work on during the season.

2. It's a time of prayer. Lent is essentially an act of prayer spread out over 40 days. As we pray, we go on a journey, one that hopefully brings us closer to Christ and leaves us changed by the encounter with him.

3. It's a time to fast. With the fasts of Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, meatless Fridays, and our personal disciplines interspersed, Lent is the only time many Catholics these days actually fast. And maybe that's why it gets all the attention. "What are you giving up for Lent? Hot dogs? Beer? Jelly beans?" It's almost a game for some of us, but fasting is actually a form of penance, which helps us turn away from sin and toward Christ.

4. It's a time to work on discipline. The 40 days of Lent are also a good, set time to work on personal discipline in general. Instead of giving something up, it can be doing something positive. "I'm going to exercise more. I'm going to pray more. I'm going to be nicer to my family, friends, and coworkers."

5. It's about dying to yourself. The more serious side of Lenten discipline is that it's about more than self-control—it's about finding aspects of yourself that are less than Christ-like and letting them die. The suffering and death of Christ are foremost on our minds during Lent, and we join in these mysteries by suffering, dying with Christ and being resurrected in a purified form.

6. Don't do too much. It's tempting to make Lent some ambitious period of personal reinvention, but

it's best to keep it simple and focused. There's a reason the Church works on these mysteries year after year. We spend our entire lives growing closer to God. Don't try to cram it all in one Lent. That's a recipe for failure.

7. Lent reminds us of our weakness. Of course, even when we set simple goals for ourselves during Lent, we still have trouble keeping them. When we fast, we realize we're all just one meal away from hunger. In both cases, Lent shows us our weakness. This can be painful, but recognizing how helpless we are makes us seek God's help with renewed urgency and sincerity.

8. Be patient with yourself. When we're confronted with our own weakness during Lent, the temptation is to get angry and frustrated. "What a bad person I am!" But that's the wrong lesson. God is calling us to be patient and to see ourselves as he does, with unconditional love.

9. Reach out in charity. As we experience weakness and suffering during Lent, we should be renewed in our compassion for those who are hungry, suffering, or otherwise in need. The third part of the Lenten formula is almsgiving. It's about more than throwing a few extra dollars in the collection plate; it's about reaching out to others and helping them without question as a way of sharing the experience of God's unconditional love.

10. Learn to love like Christ. Giving of ourselves in the midst of our suffering and self-denial brings us closer to loving like Christ, who suffered and poured himself out unconditionally on the Cross for all of us. Lent is a journey through the desert to the foot of the Cross on Good Friday, as we seek him out, ask his help, join in his suffering, and learn to love like him.





Reflect on Jesus' description of happiness. Think about what each of the Beatitudes might have in common and write a family summary of the Beatitudes. Post the summary in a special place as a reminder of what your family will consider "true happiness."




