PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Dear Family,

We all know the expression, "time flies" and how true it is! I remember as a child how summer break seemed so long and now summer has come and gone. This week alone, twice I dated something for September, and it was only Wednesday of this week it dawned on me that we are halfway through October, entering November and not in September entering October. The passage of time is measured in so many ways: there is of course the normal calendar, then there is the liturgical calendar (I have to be honest; this is my greatest marker of time) and then there are the events of life that mark things as well.

Twice a year I have the great privilege of celebrating Mass for a priest who was very dear to me, Fr Paschal. I doubt I would be a priest if it weren't for him and his influence throughout most of my seminary career. Fr Paschal died a year and two months before I was ordained a transitional deacon, so I always reckon the years of his passing by that. Last week, on his birthday, I offered Mass for him once more. As I write this, I realize that it sounds macabre, if not sad. I remember him with great joy and happiness. In a phone call, I told a seminarian about a wedding I did "a little more than a year ago" and that the happy couple are now expecting a baby.

In the last few minutes before Midnight Mass, we chant the Roman Martyrology for Christmas Day with the same ceremonies of the gospel at Mass; that is with candles and incense. The Roman Martyrology often gives us a list of saints for that day but on this day, it focuses solely on the birth of our Lord and its connection to events in history. So long since creation, so long since the Flood of Noah, so many years since the Exodus, so many years since David was anointed king, so many years before the founding of the city of Rome.

I would propose that on occasion we all mark time in that fashion, connecting the happenings of our daily lives to the greater happenings of life. I think it helps us remember others more, but more than that I think it helps us step out of the march of time and tip toe into the flow of eternity. I remember when Fr Paschal was teaching us Gregorian chant. He impressed upon us that Gregorian chant starts soft and ends soft. That it doesn't march like soldiers but floats because in eternity there is no time. That's why the Church gives it pride of place and every pope from Pius X until today affirms its place in our liturgy.

I remember celebrating the Easter Vigil this year, it started later than ever, and I knew it would be late before we got out; it never felt like it lasted as long as it did. I joke about Midnight Mass every year, but it never seems like we are walking out of church at 1:00 am. Wouldn't it be wonderful if every Mass lost its sense of time? It should because when we attend Mass we step outside of time and space and enter into Heaven. Let us cultivate time with the Lord in silence and in adoration so that we can set ourselves free from the shackles of time.

STEWARDSHIP

Managing God's Gifts To Us

THE PILLAR OF PRAYER

The four pillars of Parish Stewardship are: Hospitality, Prayer, Formation, and Service. Today's readings show us the immense value of Prayer. However, without the first pillar of Hospitality, how are people expected to respond to increasing their prayer life, their formation, and their service within and outside the Parish?

At times, our personal prayer encounters with God can be difficult. Many times, we feel as if God is distant and inattentive to our lives. It's important to remember that whenever we have these feelings, it's not reality. It's only a feeling. God's ways are mysterious - the reality is that God is infinitely more attentive to the details of our lives than we could ever realize. God is always deeply concerned about every detail.

So, why might it feel like God is distant at times? Why is this happening to us? There could be many reasons for this common experience in prayer, but we must trust that there is always a reason. Perhaps we're not listening to Him. Maybe we're not praying as we should. Or maybe He has chosen to remain silent in a matter as a way of drawing us closer Himself. Perhaps His silence is actually a very clear sign of His presence and His will for our vocations.

Reflect today upon the fact that regardless of how we may feel at times in our prayer life, our job as Christian Stewards, is simply to remain faithful to our relationship to God through prayer. Also, let's not forget that, through the Pillar of Hospitality, we learn to rely on each other in our communities - family and Parish - as we support each other in prayer. A strong Pillar of Hospitality and Prayer will make all our other Stewardship efforts fruitful.

Ex 17:8-13
2 Tm 3:14-4:2

Paul tells Timothy the uses of the Scriptures and how necessary they are for salvation. When he's writing, Paul doesn't know that his letters will themselves be added to the canon of Scripture. In this way, Paul is able to speak not only from the authority of an author inspired by the Holy Spirit, but as one of us, hoping to understand more fully how to follow Jesus Christ. In his letters, Paul offers us an opportunity to go through the steps of someone discerning how to live a life inspired by Christ. He tells us directly, "All Scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for refutation, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that one who belongs to God may be competent, equipped for every good work."

Paul reminds Timothy to remain constant in his goals, as Jesus tells us in the gospel. He tells Timothy to "be persistent whether it is convenient or inconvenient; convince, reprimand, encourage through all patience and teaching." Jesus uses the example to refer to prayer without weariness, and Paul expands that to following all of the Scriptures and the person of Jesus Christ.

Lk 18:1-8

"Will not God then secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night?"
In this gospel, Jesus uses the example of someone who won't give up, who continues to ask, over and over, for what she justly deserves until a disinterested party, the judge, relents and gives in. If this judge, who can't be bothered to do his job, relents in the face of persistence, how much more will our Lord, who desires to help us, be moved? Bearing this in mind, we should not give up when it seems that our prayers aren't being answered.

CULTURE OF LIFE

"In our present social context, marked by a dramatic struggle between the 'culture of life' and the 'culture of death', there is need to develop a deep critical sense, capable of discerning true values and authentic needs. What is urgently called for is a general mobilization of consciences and a united ethical effort to activate a great campaign in support of life. All together, we must build a new culture of Life." *Pope Saint John Paul II Evangelium vitae (1995)*

Back in 1995 when Pope John Paul II wrote *Evangelium vitae* you could still find pro-life people and politicians in both major political parties. Not so today. Now there is a clear divide between the two parties as is witnessed in the "Women's Health Protection Act of 2021", Bill H.R. 3755 passed by the Democratic controlled US House of Representative earlier this year. For a clear picture of how the Democrats and the Republicans are polar opposites when it come to the issue of LIFE, please read through the Women's Health Protection Act easily found on the internet. The statement below is found in the *Findings and Purpose* section of the bill then contrasted with an opposing Pro-Life viewpoint.



Caring for God's Creation

CREATION CARE



If you smoke cigarettes or know someone who does, consider that quitting can help the environment. The cotton like fibers in cigarette filters are made of plastic, and once on beaches or in the ocean they can be ingested by marine life, damaging the food chain.



DEACON'S CORNER



Beloved: Remain faithful to what you have learned and believed, because you know from whom you learned it, and that from infancy you have known the sacred Scriptures, which are capable of giving you wisdom for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus.

The word of God is living and effective, discerning reflections and thoughts of the heart.

Jesus told his disciples a parable about the necessity for them to pray always without becoming weary.



To rephrase a classic song from the 50's, made popular by Frank Sinatra, faith and prayer go together like a horse and carriage, you can't have one without the other. How and why we pray forms our faith. Our faith creates our prayer. So often I have listened to parishioners who want to grow in their prayer life. They seem so concerned about "doing it right". There is no one right way. Prayer is not a static form of expression. Our prayer is the expression of our relationship with God impacted by what we are experiencing in our life at that moment. Because the moments in our life are so fluid, our prayer life should be fluid also. Just as a conversation with our most intimate companion is never the same, so our prayers should never be the same.

Sometimes we are not even sure what we want to say as reflected in this story. A little boy knelt down to say his bedtime prayers. His parents heard him reciting the alphabet in very reverent tones. When asked what he was doing, he replied, "I'm saying my prayers, I am too tired to think of the exact words tonight. So, I'm just saying all the letters. God knows what I need, and He'll put all the words together for me. I trust Him"

An old college buddy, whose call to be a Deacon inspired mine, shared this story with me at his mother's funeral. His mom had a long lingering painful death from cancer. This big robust vital woman was eaten away by her cancer. My friend spent the last month of his mother's life caring for her. He told me that the quiet prayer he loved so much deserted him as the morphine had less and less effect on his mom. He shared that there were nights he just screamed at God to take her, to end her senseless pain. He would scream, he said, until he would fall asleep. When he saw the shocked look on my face, he gently smiled and said "Rick, God has big shoulders; He understood my grief and He was carrying me until I could walk again. He knew I could not carry this cross in silence" Bill's faith allowed him to pray in a way that he could share this pain as intimately as possible.

Often, I feel my prayer has gone unheard. Have you ever had that sense? Fifteen years ago my friend "Mary" did. She prayed for months that her husband, who was battling cancer, would be healed. They had spent years separated because of his addictions but during his long battle with cancer they had reconciled. She had brought him back into their home and cared for him. Every night for months she would pray that God would heal him so that they could be together again. A few nights after his funeral, she went back into church and prayed one last time. Her simple prayer was uttered out loud "Jesus, when I prayed to you about healing "Frank", what part of healing didn't You understand?" As she sat there in the church, she shared that she heard these words form within her. "I have healed him; he is with Me." Sometimes we miss God's response to our prayer because it is not what we want to hear.

A young black man asked his minister why their people had to suffer so much poverty, hardship, and oppression. "Why doesn't God do something?" he wailed. "He has," said that wise pastor. "He has created you." And so Desmond Tutu, former archbishop of South Africa, became the answer to his own question. Maybe the answer to our prayers is for us to have the courage to act. St Augustine once shared: "Without God, we cannot; without us, God will not." Ultimately the importance of prayer for me is that it allows for God and me to walk together so that His will may be done here on earth as it is in heaven. Is there any other purpose for our lives?
