## PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Dear Family,

No matter how many times I drive up and down Highway 49 the scenery always takes my breath, especially in the mornings when I drive back and forth between parishes. The colors in the sky, the trees reaching to Heaven, the hills on either side remind me of a secret invitation to some magical place. The new paint job on St. Patrick's seems to soften the face of the church. Someone once told me that the front face of the church seemed scary, sometimes it looked gloomy. Now it is bright and fresh, welcoming with its simple beauty.

On my day off I often make my way to our cathedral in downtown Sacramento to go to Confession. I try to get there early because many of the downtown workers will come during their lunch break for Confession and Mass. Anytime I am in the cathedral, I think back to my ordination recalling that magnificent day in my life. The cathedral rectory hands out lunches to as many homeless people as possible and many will come in the cathedral to just sit. Perhaps they want out of the summer heat or the cold of winter. But many will walk around the cathedral, some in prayer others taking in the beauty. For all of us, that time in the majestic beauty of our cathedral is time to step out of the harsh world. Our worries can melt away, the mind can slow down, and we can simply be still in the presence of our loving God.

In Philosophy there is a concept called "The Three Transcendentals" These are truth, goodness, and beauty, these three things are found in the world around us but have their source in God and are meant to lead our mind to Him. In the early days of the Church, it was the radical goodness or charity of Christians that caught the attention of the world. "See how they love another" was a common comment about Christians. Much of the western intellectual tradition would have been impossible without the Church. The university system is a product of the Church. The great modern Philosopher Peter Kreft often mentions how the beauty found in our churches was an influence on his conversion. He said something to the effect that the beauty in our church opened his mind to the possibility the Church is right intellectually. A cardinal, whose name escapes me, in a commencement speech, said that beauty is the last of the three who speak to a postmodern world. How much more do we need beauty in a post-religious and now post-truth world?

I firmly believe that as we encounter God through beauty it leads to an understanding of the truth He teaches and bears fruit in lives of goodness or Christian charity. Our encounter with our Lord through the Sacraments, through Beauty, through the truth of our faith open our mind to encounter Him in our neighbor, in the one who is different. It is my prayer that the beauty of the parish, physically, spiritually and as a community will be fruitful and a blessing to many others so that they too may encounter our God who is good and loving.

**Mal 3:19-20**  
**2 Thess 3:7-12**

In the first reading, Malachi tells of horrible destruction, but it's for the enemies of the Lord, not those who "fear [his] name." This appears to run in contrast to what Jesus is telling his disciples in the gospel—that they themselves will experience persecution. However, both Malachi and Jesus are seeing the big picture and the long game. The Israelites in Malachi's time are experiencing horrible physical destruction, but Malachi puts their sights on the Lord and the "sun of justice." Jesus tells his disciples that they may lose their lives, but, "By your perseverance you will secure your lives."

How many times do we endure something hard, because we know a benefit lies at the end of the struggle? A challenging year of school, a hard workout, a difficult conversation with a spouse? Our species has evolved to avoid pain, as any animal, and yet as creatures made in the image and likeness of God, we have the ability to choose to endure hard things because we can perceive the benefit of going through them.

**Luke 21:5-19**

**"You will be hated by all because of my name, but not a hair on your head will be destroyed."**

The gospel this week begins with entering a temple and some of Jesus's disciples pointing out how lovely it is inside. Jesus uses this moment to caution everyone that what is coming isn't an easy life, "adorned with costly stones and votive offerings." Jesus tells them that destruction is coming and those who follow him will be persecuted. Understandably worried, they ask when it will happen and how they will know it's going to happen. Jesus responds in an eschatological way, referencing the end of the world—probably not what his disciples were expecting on a routine trip to the local temple. No matter where he is in his ministry, Jesus maintains a clear-eyed view of the future and wants his disciples to know the weight of what he's asking of them.



## STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION ON GRATITUDE

A little over a year ago, my wife introduced me to an organization that has greatly improved my life: A Network for Grateful Living. The co-founder and spiritual advisor is Brother David Steindl-Rast, a Benedictine monk. His philosophy—"the root of joy is gratefulness"—has nudged my perspective away from a cynical and negative outlook of life.

One of the principles of grateful living is appreciating the extraordinary in the ordinary; everything is a surprise, which we can only recognize when we are present and then mindful of the world around us. We need to take time to cultivate this awareness that isn't always necessarily always by sight.

In today's gospel reading, Jesus teaches the Pharisees that "the coming of the Kingdom of God cannot be observed, and no one will announce, 'Look, here it is,' or, 'There it is.' For behold, the Kingdom of God is among you."

I always feel like I miss these subtle signs time and time again! I am embarrassed to admit how often I've failed to recognize opportunities to support the kingdom of God in what I see, who I meet, what I hear, or what I say. I'm always just a step behind.

I've realized it is simply not enough to notice the kingdom of God while sitting in church or basking in the presence of a living saint. Yes, the kingdom of God is extraordinary, but we can find it and live it out in the most ordinary rhythms of life.

A good place to start? Gratitude.

## NOVEMBER IS NATIONAL HOSPICE AND PALLIATIVE CARE MONTH.



The National Catholic Bioethics Center is involved with among other issues, getting the World Medical Association to adopt new text for its International Code of Medical Ethics to ensure that medical personnel can conscientiously object to unethical medical practices such as abortion or assisted suicide. Interestingly the International Code of Medical Ethics came into being after Nazi crimes against humanity were exposed. Unfortunately, the 1948 Declaration to act "with conscience" and to "maintain the utmost respect for human life from the time of its conception" has eroded over the years and NCBC works to restore needed protections.

The National Catholic Bioethics Center has announced a new Personal Consultation Department to provide help for individuals, priests and health professionals to navigate challenging health care decisions. On a 24/7 basis they can provide one-on-one explanations of Church teachings and their application in situations such as assisted nutrition/hydration, palliative care, organ transplants, abortion, sterilization, gender transitioning, contraception and reproductive technologies. Also found on their website is a recommendation for a new App from MyLifeAngels.com and Texas Right to Life. This new App was designed to safeguard patients' rights in critical end of life situations and medical emergencies. It can store patients' legal documents such as power of attorney so they are available during an emergency when there is no time to track down loved ones or end of life care directives. To assure loved ones are notified the App can detect that the App user is in an ER and will provide the location and contact information to designated persons. ## DEACON'S CORNER

*Sing praise to the LORD with the harp, with the harp and melodious song.  
With trumpets and the sound of the horn sing joyfully before the King, the LORD  
Stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand*

Well this is the last Sunday in Ordinary Time for this liturgical year. As we bring the year to a close, the church wants us to focus on what is important: where are we going? This Sunday we are asked to take stock of what is important. A few weeks ago, while we were on vacation in Utah, I had a health issue that had me end up in the emergency room in St George. As I sat there waiting for the results from the tests they took, I began to think about how maybe I am closer to the end of my race than I am to its beginning 74 years ago. Since then I have tried to look for and experience the beauty of this moment more. I am spending a little more with people instead of doing things and I have found forgiving and laughing a little easier to do. Hopefully these stories will make you laugh a little, think a little, and give thanks to the Lord for the gift of your life.

There is a story about two little boys whose mother asked them to chase a chicken snake out of the henhouse. They looked everywhere for that snake, but couldn't find it. The more they looked, the more afraid they got. Finally, they stood up on their tiptoes to look on the top nesting shelf and came nose to nose with the snake. They fell all over themselves and one another running out of the chicken house. 'Don't you know a chicken snake won't hurt you?' their mama asked. 'Yes, ma'am, one of the boys answered, 'but there are some things that will scare you so bad you'll hurt yourself.'" Sometimes we can become so preoccupied with what bad thing could happen and the fear in us that it creates, we miss the beauty in this moment.

"A disciple once asked a wise rabbi, "When should I make confession of my sin and make restitution of all that I have taken from another, and make peace with my enemies?" The rabbi replied, "Only in the final moments, in the minute before you die." The disciple was utterly astonished, and responded, "But which one of us knows when we are going to die?" The rabbi said, with some satisfaction, "Precisely. Do it now!" The question I need to keep asking myself in life is: what should I do at this particular moment? What should I say? All you can do is to be, at every single moment, as true as you can with all the power in your being - and then leave it to God to use you, even in spite of yourself. Or as Thomas Merton once shared "Dear Lord .... I do not know if what I am doing pleases you, but I do know that my desire to please you does. in fact please you. And I hope that I have that desire in everything I do. I hope I never do anything apart from that desire."

The widower opened the bottom drawer of his late wife's bureau and lifted out a tissue-wrapped package. He unfolded the tissue and handed his wife's sister a beautiful slip. The expensive garment was exquisite. The price tag was still attached. He said to his sister-in-law, "Jan bought this the first time we went to New York, 8 or 9 years ago. She never wore it. She was saving it for a special occasion. Well, I guess this is the occasion." He took the slip and put it on the bed with the other clothes that they would bring to the funeral home. His hands lingered on the soft material for a moment, then slammed the drawer shut. "Don't ever save anything for a special occasion," he said softly to his sister-in-law. "Every day you're alive is a special occasion."

The sister remembered those words through the funeral and the difficult days that followed as she helped her brother-in-law and niece attend to the sad chores that follow an unexpected death. She thought about the things her sister hadn't seen or heard or done, about all her late sister had done without realizing they were special. The words of her brother-in-law began to have a dramatic impact on her life. She writes: "I'm reading more and dusting less. I'm sitting on the deck and admiring the view without fussing about the weeds in the garden. I'm spending more time with my family and friends and less time in committee meetings. I'm not 'saving' anything; we use our good china and crystal for every special event such as losing a pound, getting the sink unstopped, the first camellia blossom. 'Someday' and 'one of these days' are losing their grip on my vocabulary. I'm trying very hard not to put off, hold back, or save anything that would add laughter and luster to our lives. And every moment I open my eyes, I tell myself that it is special. Every day, every minute, every breath is a gift of God."
