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PASTORS PONDERINGS

Dear Family

During these weeks of Easter, most of my weekly columns have explained the meaning of the symbolism in our church. Next Sunday will be the last column that explains the different symbolism of our church but there are many details left to finish, the sound system one of the most important. We are slowly working on improving the sound system. I ask for your continued patience.

One of the things I enjoy the most is how I am able to gaze at the statues of our Blessed Mother and St. Joseph from the Celebrant's chair. What I am personally pleased about in the renovation of our church is how liturgical it is and how the beauty is truly an aid to prayer and contemplation. There are three features of this alcove that I enjoy very much. The first is the mural of the Holy Spirit, it takes its inspiration from the Annunciation when the Angel Gabriel tells our Blessed Mother that the Holy Spirit will come upon her and she will be overshadowed by the power of the Most High. (Luke 1:35).

Just like any family, the Holy Family, faced numerous difficulties and trials but because of their strong trust in God they overcame them. There are devotions related to both the 7 Sorrows and 7 joys of our Lady and St. Joseph which help us remember that they suffered great distress and overcame it because of their faith; that even in these moments they rejoiced in God's greatness and goodness. It was not their own grit but their faith; the power of the Most High which enabled them to remain steadfast in that faith.

The other two features are the Immaculate Heart of Our Lady and the Chaste Heart of St. Joseph. From a practical point of view, the two hearts connect this space to the devotional area of the Sacred Heart. These features, however, go beyond the practical. Devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary goes back many centuries but was strongly spread by St. John Eudes. Devotion to the Chaste Heart of St. Joseph is a more recent devotion that began in Brazil in the late 1990s. About five years ago, I celebrated the wedding of a couple who shared devotion to the "Three Hearts." The Sacred Heart of Jesus, the Immaculate Heart of Mary, and the Chaste Heart of St. Joseph. All three hearts remind us of how we should love both God and neighbor, equally they remind us of how much God loves us.

The beauty in a church is not here for its own sake nor to simply please the eye or the heart. It is meant to raise our mind to Heaven, to draw us into prayer. At St. Canice there are two stained glass windows of Our Lady that inspire prayer, one of Our Lady as a young girl and the other as the Immaculate Conception. I see this front the Celebrants Chair as well, in the back corner there is the statue of St. Anthony. He had a strong devotion to the Infant Jesus and the Most Blessed Sacrament. As we understand the role of beauty in the life of the Church, may it help us to draw closer to our Lord and God and encounter Him more deeply in the Sacred Mysteries we celebrate.

CULTURE OF LIFE

When the government thinks they can raise children better than the parents...

Do you remember the story of the Dionne Quintuplets of Canada who were born in 1934 and a year later taken as wards of the state by the Canadian Government to provide the care the family supposedly could not and protect the children from possible exploitation? During the years of custody by the government the children were guarded in hospital-like compound, allowed no contact with parents or other siblings, subjected to constant medical testing and exploited for financial gain. During that time the girls were cast in three movies, appeared in ads endorsing many products all the while being gawked at by millions of sightseers in a facility that became known as Quintland, the biggest tourist attraction in Canada at the time. After a long legal battle, the parents regained custody but the reunion was difficult and heartbreaking. The girls left home at 18 and severed contact with them. In 1998, after decades of dealings with psychological trauma and difficult lives, three surviving sisters sued the government for exploitation and removing them from their family, they received an apology and compensation.

Fast forward to 2023, California Assembly Bill "AB 665 would allow minors as young as 12 to consent to mental health treatment or place themselves into an outpatient residential shelter without parental consent or notification" (Terry McLaughlin, 2023). You might wonder what child would seek to take advantage of this law? Critics who call this bill "state-sanctioned kidnapping" feel it will be used to remove trans-identified children from their home. They suggest school counselors are being trained to keep secrets from parents and are taking on an activist role to turn children against their parents. Social worker Pamala Garfield-Jeager testified, "Separating children from parents is one of the most traumatic things you can do to a child and should only be done as a last resort." Adding, "My 20 years of experience with families and children have taught me that conducting therapy without any parental input is not effective." Yet in California, in the name of protecting children from parents perceived to be inept, uninformed or dangerous our children can be provided abortions, mastectomies, gender therapy without parent knowledge or consent. If AB 665 is signed into law, children can be removed from their families and placed into a residential shelter by a government who thinks they can raise children better than their parents.

Acts 1: 1-11 Eph 1:17-23

The second reading affirms the power of Christ and that the church, his body, continues his work on earth beyond the ascension. While the gospel has another moment of Jesus's preparing the disciples for his departure, the first reading contains the actual ascension narrative. Here, too, he leaves them with a mission – they are to be his witnesses all through the world. And here, too, there is a promise to return. This is still not the end of the story.

Each of us is called to share in the evangelizing work that Christ entrust to the disciples here. For layperson, it is not always apparent how we are making disciples or teaching the faith or leading others to baptism. But opportunities abound and every relationship is a chance to make Christ more present to someone, baptized or not, who might not know him well.

Matt 28: 16-20

"And behold, I am with you always,
until the end of the age."

Finally comes the moment for which the last weeks have prepared us. Jesus is going away, at least in one sense: the disciples will not have his bodily presence to which they have become accustomed. He gives them their mission for while he is away: to make disciples, to baptize, to teach all that Jesus has taught. This will be the ongoing work of the church, work that continues even today. And Jesus does not leave the disciples – or us – alone in this work. Many of our Easter season readings have prepared us for this moment. He remains present in the breaking of the bread; he has promised the Holy Spirit as guide and companion. He is with us always, never leaving us alone, even when the life of faith is a struggle.



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DEACON'S CORNER

Dignum et justum est

May the eyes of your hearts be enlightened, that you may know what is the hope that belongs to his call, what are the riches of glory in his inheritance among the holy ones,... which he worked in Christ, raising him from the dead and seating him at his right hand in the heavens,

"Let us give thanks to the Lord, our God. It is Right and Just."

It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give You thanks, Lord, Holy Father, almighty and eternal God

What we believe and who we honor, forms our very reality. In 1964, a pro football great, Jim Marshall, a defensive end for the Minnesota Vikings, picked up a fumble and began to sprint with all his strength to the endzone. At the end of that 66-yard sprint, he crossed into the endzone and in celebration tossed the football into the stands and raised his arms joyfully into the air as he turned to greet his teammates in celebration of his touchdown. Instead he stood there all alone in the 49er's endzone, he had just scored 2 points for them instead of 6 points for his Vikings. Jim Marshall believed he was running for the winning touchdown but the reality was he scored for the other team. And this wonderful football player, rather than being in the Hall of Fame, lives with the nick name Wrong Way Marshall.

I know you are wondering what does this story have to do with the Feast of the Ascension and the prayers at the beginning of the Preface of our Eucharistic Prayer at Mass. What we believe and who we honor, forms our reality; and when we believe in what is true and just, we can then live in reality and create a home and a community that is right and just. In Genesis, the Lord God said: *Let us make* human beings in our image, after our likeness.... God created mankind in his image;.... in the image of God he created them; male and female* he created them*". Unfortunately, ever since Eve bit that "big apple" we are a little dyslectic and translate this verse: "Let us make god in our own image, after our likeness....And mankind created god in his own image." This I think is especially true in the society we live in here in California.

The Feast of the Ascension, that gets lost between the great celebration of Easter and Pentecost, is told by all 4 gospel writers. It is so vital to our faith because it affirms that Jesus was more than just a wise generous man. In the reading from the Acts of the Apostles, Luke tells us: *When he had said this, as they were looking on, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him from their sight*. The cloud in the Old Testament is always a symbol of God's Presence. In Jesus the Christ, we are shown the Image of who we are, who we are created to be. When we believe in Him and honor Him, we are able to then live in a way that brings glory to God and joy to our lives.

We live in California, a very secular society, a culture that holds up the gods of pleasure, feelings, comfort, conformity, relativism and others to worship. Each in their own right are good things but when we make them the source of how we will live that day, we choose a false god (an idol). Each day we have a simple choice to make: what will we believe in and who will we honor by our actions. This is why, at the very heart of our worship, we are challenged by Father when he says: "*It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give You thanks, Lord, Holy Father, almighty and eternal God.*" So the questions I continually need to ask myself are: "Am I living as a follower of Jesus in a secular world or do I live in a secular world and go to church on Sundays? Am I worried about appearing to be too religious around others?

Scott Hahn, in his book It is Right and Just, writes: "if Jesus Christ is not at the top of the soul's hierarchy of goods, something or someone else will be. What that is, depends on the person: The devil knows our weaknesses and will present us with the idols that are most compelling to our preferences and that feel the most like liberation, and therefore that feel the least like they actually are. Christ conquers our souls through reason and love; His competitors always use coercion and deceit. Christ is the benevolent King; His competitors are venal dictators. This is what Pope Benedict XVI called the 'dictatorship of relativism'... And idols are by definition jealous gods, soon demanding more than we were originally willing to give: more sacrifice of the virtue of religion to achieve more wealth, more autonomy, more pleasure, more success, more prestige." Each day we need to make a choice of what and who we believe is important, what will bring us life, Who truth is. At the end of my days, I hope I am not known by Our Lord as Wrong Way Rick.

"Let us give thanks to the Lord, our God. It is Right and Just. Dignum et justum est"

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
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
