PASTORS PONDERINGS

Dear Family,

Just in time for the great feast of Corpus Christi two new features of our church were completed. One had to wait for the other but it was a great act of God's providence. The new sanctuary lamp was hung and the altar for the tabernacle was delivered and installed. Throughout the course of the renovation, I sought to preserve and incorporate as much of the parish patrimony as possible by integrating those pieces into the design. Thanks to Sylvia Crane, a long-time parishioner I was able to see photos of the church after it was built and so saw the old sanctuary lamp. Unable to find the original one, I wanted one as similar as possible, I think we accomplished that goal. When considering how to incorporate the tabernacle altar, I took my inspiration from St. Canice and how it looks like the old high altar was removed from the reredos (the back part) and adapted to hold that tabernacle. I wanted to do the same here. When our parishes were founded in the late 1800s, it was common to have very elaborate altar pieces which the altar, tabernacle, candles and crucifix were a part of but were not the focus. In the middle of the 20th century, there was a movement which had less adornment and much larger tabernacles, candles, and crucifixes; both churches were updated to reflect that look. I think for us, with the revival of freestanding altars (not built against a wall) a much more visible connection between the Sacrifice and the Sacrament is created. Just as the tabernacle altar at St. Canice shares a visible integrity with the altar of Sacrifice, so does the one at St. Patrick's. Both churches used to have side altars both the restoration of con celebration and the shortage of priests have eliminated the need for multiple altars in a church. My guess is that the old altar of sacrifice at St. Patrick's was built from the original high altar and used the top of a side altar, if my memory serves me right, someone told me that. In developing the tabernacle altar, I wanted to incorporate the old altar and so the top or mensa was built out of that same marble. The Chi-Ro (P and X) was framed into the front to pay homage to the many years that was there. The tabernacle altar isn't an altar proper because the Holy Mass can't be offered on it; it isn't big enough. But "altar" is often used to describe those things that hold sacred objects, in many cultures and homes (as in mine growing up) it is common to have a spaced dedicated which we might call "prayer corners" these home altars often contain images of the saints, most predominantly of our Lord and our Blessed Mother, candles, flowers and other things. In my family it is common to place photos of our dearly departed to honor their memory and pray for their happy repose. These altars are often in prominent places, at my parent's it is in the dining room. Prayer corners have become very popular and I think are a wonderful aid to prayer, but a home altar allows us the opportunity to benefit from the many sacramentals in the church and offer a simple way

of sharing our faith. Nothing reveals a Catholic home like a crucifix and image of our Lady. Perhaps your home and family would benefit from a home altar.


Let us also rejoice and give praise for the gift of children present in our pews! Thank you, parents and guardians, for making your young ones a part of this faith community. Jesus exclaims in

DEACON'S CORNER

The Lord is gracious and merciful, slow to anger and of great kindness. The Lord is good to all and compassionate toward all his works.

"Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light."

I hope you had a wonderful 4th of July. While I am on vacation this week, I hope these stories By Fr. Tony Kaveli brings a smile to your face and a moment of remembrance of God's grace and goodness in your life.

George came home from the psychiatrist looking very worried. "What's the problem?" his wife asked. "The doctor told me I could have no worry and perfect peace of mind if I take a pill every day for the rest of my life," he explained. "So what? Lots of people have to take a pill every day their whole lives," she replied. "I know," said George, "but the doctor gave me only four pills!"

In 1863, the Civil War was raging, and the end was far from sight. Abraham Lincoln was out for a ride with his friend and aide Noah Brooks. Brooks, noticing the president's obvious fatigue, suggested that he take a brief rest when they got back to the White House. "A rest," Lincoln replied, "I don't know about a rest. I suppose it's good for the body, but the tired part of me is inside and out of reach." Lincoln was acknowledging a very important truth. There are many sources of fatigue. Physical fatigue may be the most benign. There is fatigue that comes from stress, fatigue that comes from worry, fatigue that comes not only from worrying about the future but also worrying about the past, and fatigue that comes from trying to be something we are not. What we really need is not time off nor time away. Rather, what we need is time that is filled with meaning and purpose - time that is saturated with the grace of God. What we need, according to this wonderful Gospel paradox, is a different "burden" Christ's, and a new "yoke", His." Soren Kierkegaard was a Danish philosopher who suffered bouts of extreme melancholy, undoubtedly due to a difficult upbringing. One day he wrote in his Journal, "And now, with God's help, I shall become myself." What a liberating thought: "And now, with God's help, I shall become myself." Not what others expect me to be. Not some unrealistic image I have of myself. No, with God's help I shall become who I really am. No more stressful pretenses. No more misguided strivings. I will relax and be me. When we feel accepted by Christ, then for the first time in our life we become free. When we are yoked to Jesus, we no longer have to prove to the world that we belong.

If you put a buzzard in a pen that is 6 feet by 8 feet and is entirely open at the top, the bird, in spite of its ability to fly, will be an absolute prisoner. The reason is that a buzzard always begins a flight from the ground with a run of 10 to 12 feet. Without space to run, as is its habit, it will not even attempt to fly, but will remain a prisoner for life in a small jail with no top. The ordinary bat that flies around at night, a remarkably nimble creature in the air, cannot take off from a level place. If it is placed on the floor or flat ground, all it can do is shuffle about helplessly and, no doubt, painfully, until it reaches some slight elevation from which it can throw itself into the air. Then, at once, it takes off like a flash. A bumblebee, if dropped into an open tumbler, will be there until it dies, unless it is taken out. It never sees the means of escape at the top, but persists in trying to find some way out through the sides near the bottom... It will seek a way where none exists, until it completely destroys itself. — In many ways, we are like the buzzard, the bat, and the bumblebee. We struggle with all our problems and frustrations, never realizing that all we have to do is look up! That's the answer, the escape route and the solution to any problem! Just look up. Sorrow looks back, Worry looks around, But Faith looks up! Listen to Jesus' invitation in today's Gospel: "Come to Me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest."
