PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Dear Family,

On Sunday, September 3rd at the 11 o'clock Mass we were serenaded with the sounds of many young children. At the 9 o'clock Mass there was a parishioner I know well holding an infant car seat. He quipped, "We got a new one, I stole her." I quickly connected with whose child she was and we all laughed. We have been blessed the last few years to see a beautiful increase of young families at the 9 and 11 o'clock Masses. A sign of life and the future of our faith and the church. Many times people share their delight with me at hearing and seeing this growth in our parish.

Sadly, however, there are many people in our community who, for a variety of factors, are unable to find hope in their own lives and make the devastating decision to end their lives. In particular, the Foresthill Bridge in Auburn is a site where this happens with regularity. For nearly a decade there has been an effort to reach people before they make that decision irreversible. The program is called "Notes of Hope," and our Culture of Life ministry is working to support this great effort to make a difference for so many others.

Next weekend they will pass out note cards after Mass so that we can add to these "Notes of Hope." There will be examples in the bulletin so that you can come up with your own message. Perhaps you know a child who might be able to draw a picture or decorate the card before you write your note of hope. I think we can all recall a time where our Good God sent us some encouragement or hope when we were struggling; what a blessing we can do that for our brothers and sisters!

As you write your notes of hope, say a prayer for whomever might read it or need a little boost of hope. I often recall the words of Archbishop Sheen, "when we get to Heaven we will be greeted by a great many saints whom we don't know. They will tell us that they are the souls we helped move from Purgatory to Heaven." I believe this project will add to that number, not only the poor souls in Purgatory but also those souls who have been affected by this beautiful project.

I am writing this in anticipation of my departure for Italy, and wish I could be there to be a part of this great effort. I am confident that there will be a great response and join my prayers to yours. Please keep me in your prayers. I am grateful to God that I have this opportunity to travel, but as the old saying goes "There's no place like home." I look forward to being back with you all again.

Reflecting on the Gospel

Jesus practiced forgiveness that knew no bounds. Time and time again, he forgave people who hurt him or his disciples. Jesus even forgave those who sentenced him to death, crying out from the cross, "Forgive them, Father, for they know not what they do." Today's gospel challenges us to practice this same spirit of forgiveness, a spirit that is generous and ongoing.



Jesus poses a tall task. Forgiveness is rarely easy. The need for it only comes about because of harm inflicted on another (or many others). Forgiveness reminds us that we are far from perfect. Pain is part of our realities. Given the sensitivities surrounding forgiveness, let us consider a few key points about the type of forgiveness advocated for by Jesus.

Jesus calls his disciples to forgive their sisters and brothers "from your heart" a practice of transformation. Forgiveness is not about forgetting, despite what the popular adage says. A real harm has been perpetrated. Jesus would never want a person to put themselves back in an abusive or dangerous situation. Rather, the act of forgiving frees a person to begin healing. Forgiveness does not always happen overnight. Sometimes the response is immediate, like when the king in today's gospel forgave the servant on the spot. But oftentimes, forgiveness is a longer process of acknowledging the harm, working through the feelings and thoughts that were provoked, and praying for God's help.

DEACON'S CORNER

Bless the LORD, O my soul; and all my being, bless his holy name.

For if we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord; so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's.

I give you a new commandment, says the Lord; love one another as I have loved you.



Two little brothers, Tom & Jim, had finished supper & were playing until bedtime. Somehow, Tom hit Jim with a stick, & tears & bitter words followed. Charges & accusations were still being exchanged as their mother prepared them for bed. She said, "Now boys, what would happen if either of you died tonight, & you never had the chance again to forgive one another?" Jim spoke up, "Well, OK, I'll forgive him tonight, but if we're both alive in the morning, he'd better look out."

The ability to love is such an amazing gift that creates community, family, friendships. It is ultimately the source for the joy we experience. It is a unique power that we have because we are made in the image & likeness of God. But as that wise old philosopher, Spider-Man's Uncle Ben shared: "With great power comes great responsibility." It is our responsibility to forgive, not just once, not just twice but 7 X 70, in other words.... always. Forgiveness never means remaining

in an abusive, dangerous situation but it does mean learning to let go of the hurt & the desire to "get even". I don't know about you, but for me it is often a slow, frustrating, difficult process.

These 2 stories by Fr. Fuller seems to depict how I have often responded when I have been hurt. "A little boy was sitting on a park bench in obvious agony. A man walking by asked him what was wrong. The boy answered, "I'm sitting on a bumble bee!". "Then why don't you get up?" the man asked. The boy replied, "Because I figure I'm hurting him more than he is hurting me!" The healing process begins when we get up off the park bench. French author Victor Hugo has a short story titled, "93." In the midst of this tale, a ship at sea is caught in a terrific storm. Buffeted by the waves, the ship rocks back & forth, when suddenly the crew hears an awesome crashing sound below deck. They know what it is. A cannon they are carrying has broken loose and is smashing into the ship's sides with every list of the ship. Risking their lives, 2 brave sailors manage to go below & fasten it again, for they know that the heavy cannon on the inside of their ship is more dangerous to them than the storm on the outside."So it is with people. Problems within are often much more destructive to us than the problems without. Sometimes the reason I can't forgive is my fragile little ego & sense of pride.

This final story by Fr. Lobo is a wonderful parable of where the power to forgive comes from. Once upon a time 2 brothers, who lived on adjoining farms, had their 1st serious fight in 40 years of farming side by side, sharing machinery, & trading labor & goods without a conflict. Then their relationship fell apart. It began with a small misunderstanding, & it grew into a major conflict. Finally, it exploded into angry & bitter words followed by weeks of silence. One morning there was a knock-on John's door. He opened it to find a man with a carpenter's toolbox. "I'm looking for a few days' work," he said. "Perhaps you would have a few small jobs here I could help with?" "Yes," said the older brother. "I do have a job for you." "Look across the creek at that farm. That's my younger brother's farm. Last week there was a meadow between us & he took his bulldozer to the river levee & now there is a creek between us. He did that to spite me, but I'll do him one better." "See that pile of lumber by the barn? I want you to build me a fence, an 8-foot high fence, so I won't need to see his place or his face again." The carpenter said, "I think I understand the situation. Show me the nails & the post-hole digger & I'll be able to do a job that pleases you." The older brother had to go to town, so he helped the carpenter get the materials ready & then left for the day. The carpenter worked hard all that day measuring, sawing, and nailing. About sunset when the farmer returned, the carpenter had just finished his job. The farmer's eyes opened wide, & his jaw dropped. There was no fence there at all. It was a bridge — a bridge stretching from one side of the creek to the other! A fine piece of work, handrails & all —and his younger brother was coming toward them, his hand outstretched. "You are quite a fellow to build this bridge after all I've said & done." The two brothers met in the middle of that bridge, taking each other's hand. They turned to see the carpenter walking away. "No, wait! Stay a few days. I've a lot of other projects for you," said the older brother. — "I'd love to stay on," the carpenter said, "but I have many more bridges to build." A question for you. What bridge do you need to build?

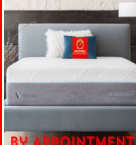
