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PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Dear Family,

This past week, as many of you know, we had our priest convocation, a time to reflect on the dynamics of the corporate body of priests, our ministry and the diocese. We have two major gatherings of priests a year, our Autumn retreat for ongoing education and our Spring retreat which is our spiritual retreat. The face of the priesthood in the Diocese of Sacramento is quite different today than at any other time, while we all look different, have different cultures, speak different languages, the communion of our Faith and our sharing in the priesthood of our Lord unites us; new bonds are formed, and old ones strengthened when we gather for these events. The range of ages is heavily tilted toward retirement age-and older! We need to pray for more and more vocations to the priesthood.

During one dinner, I was seated with a retired Irish priest who I don't know very well but over the last few years have gotten to know more. Like many of us, I grew up with Irish priests and so it's very special for me to spend fraternal time with them. At dinner, Father mentioned that as he gets older he finds himself returning more and more to the prayers he was taught as a child and prayed in his home. At the top of the list was the daily family Rosary. Yesterday, (Oct 7th) we celebrated the Feast of the Holy Rosary, a beautiful feast with a wonderful history.

The Rosary is the most powerful of all devotions in the life of the Church. Our Lady made 15 promises to those who pray the Holy Rosary with devotion and frequency. Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, speaking of the Rosary said, "In the Rosary, we turn to the Virgin Mary so that she may bring us to a closer union with her Son." In fact, nearly every Pope since Pope St. Pius X has urged us to pray the Rosary and there have been countless documents written on the Rosary by the popes.

In my own family, whenever there is an urgent need, we all pray the rosary, wherever we are at the same time. I could write volumes on the graces, blessings, and indeed miracles received by this prayer. It was this tradition that prompted the daily 7pm Rosary on Facebook during the pandemic. It was something very powerful and comforting for many of us as we prayed together every day. Unfortunately, the theft of our live-streaming equipment has made that hard to revive.

May struggle with the Rosary, at the first level it is because it is a repetition of prayers but really it's because meditation is hard. We have to still the mind and body, which is very difficult in our day. Each mystery of the Rosary gives us an event in the life of our Lord or Lady, the vast majority taken from the Gospels and Sacred Scripture. All of them present a summary of the history of salvation and the meaning of the Christian life. I promise that if anybody preserves in praying the Rosary, it will soon become a favorite prayer. The only poorly prayed Rosary is the Rosary not prayed! There are many ways to start just grab a set of beads and give our Blessed Mother a call-she always loves to hear from her children.

Annual Stewardship Renewal

The Annual Stewardship Renewal is perhaps the most significant event for increasing parish stewardship. It's a deeply spiritual time of prayer for each of us to reflect on our God given gifts and how can we use them for God's purposes and glory, building His kingdom on earth. Also, this annual renewal affords us the opportunity to change our commitments as we grow as Disciples of Christ and our priorities change. Furthermore, The Stewardship Renewal is a time to educate parishioners about the true spirituality of Stewardship, as well as an invitation for each of us to make specific commitments to God, with our Time, Talent, and Treasure on an annual basis to the church. For St Patrick's, we will begin the three week renewal process starting October 21/ 22 with Kickoff Sunday and our annual Ministry Fair in the Large Hall, donuts and coffee as well.

Very soon, each parishioner will receive in the mail a Stewardship Renewal packet. The Renewal packet includes a Stewardship formation brochure; a ministry catalog; a letter from the pastor, explaining the purpose of the Renewal; and finally a commitment card that allows each of us to select a particular commitment to prayer, ministry, and offertory. We ask each family to prayerfully consider completing a commitment card each year.

Why are we asked to fill out a Commitment Card? If we are all honest, when we write our name down to a particular commitment whether it be to prayer, ministry, or monetary offering, we are more likely to be dedicated to our decision than if we verbally make a promise. When we make only a verbal promise, we are potentially more apt to rationalize our way out of that commitment... Very quickly! Therefore, when we all hand in our forms, we know what we are expected to do, but it also allows us to alter or change our commitments each year.

Finally, new parishioners to our church need to be educated and invited into the Stewardship Way of Life, as well as to be instructed on why we do certain things.

Stewardship Sunday and Donuts




Sunday October 22nd will be a Sunday of joint celebration, Donuts in the small hall and Stewardship booths in the large hall.




Parish Book Club Gathering

Reflecting on the Gospel



We continue the series of gospel parables this week, with a landowner and his tenants taking center stage. Today's story reads harsh: tenants who are supposed to be caring for the land decide to seize and kill the people whom the landowner sent to obtain his produce, first the servants and then the landowner's very son. The tenants are ruthless in their rejection and Jesus insists that they will pay for their stance.

As with all parables, the meaning extends beyond the story itself. A first clue of what Jesus may have meant by this parable comes at the very beginning. Jesus addresses the parable to the chief priests and elders of the people. He wants these religious leaders to hear the consequences that come with rejecting the work of the gospel and even more, the person who embodies the gospel. Note that the tenants do not attack the produce. They attack the people who come to collect it, even the landowner's own son.

We can draw parallels between the landowner's son and Jesus, the Son of God. In telling this parable, Jesus reminds the religious leaders that the kingdom of God comes as a person Jesus. Their ministries must always draw people to the truth of Jesus. Those who try to turn Jesus into something he is not will face dire consequences. This is true for all of us. We are called to embrace the fullness of Christ, for it is only through him that we might one day enter the kingdom of God.

Second Saturday of the month



DEACON'S CORNER

Brothers and sisters: Have no anxiety at all,

but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus

I have chosen you from the world, says the Lord, to go and bear fruit that will remain. Alleluia, Alleluia

Learning how to bear fruit is a life-long process. As we walk through different stages of our lives bearing fruit is reflected in different ways & it is a slow journey of growth with many little side trips & dead ends along the way, as this story reflects. "A mother ran into the bedroom when she heard her 7-yr-old son scream. She found his 2-yr-old sister pulling his hair. She gently released the little girl's grip & said comfortingly to the boy, "There, there. She didn't mean it. She doesn't know that it hurts." He nodded his acknowledgement, & she left the room. As she started down the hall the little girl screamed. Rushing back in, she asked, "What happened?" The little boy replied, "She knows now." Maybe not the best story about the journey of growth, but it is probably a side trip we have all made.

Before we can bear good fruit for others we need to become Whole. We must somehow integrate within ourselves both the shadow & the sunlight, the dirt & the stars. In some way we must see in our weaknesses the key that unlocks the beauty within us. St. Paul begins to unravel this mystery for us when he shares in Corinthians "For when I am weak, I am strong."; and then today shares "*but in everything, by prayer & petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God*". The struggle is not avoiding or condemning our weaknesses but in acknowledging them for what they are & that we are powerless to overcome them unless we allow the Grace of God offered through His Son Jesus to embrace them & mute their power over our actions. Our wholeness & holiness is not because we are perfect but because we cry out "Take Lord & receive all my liberty, my memory, my understanding & my entire will, all that I have & possess. You have given all to me. To You O Lord, I return it. All is Yours, dispose of it wholly according to Your will. Give me Your love & Your grace, for this is enough for me." by St. Ignatius

This sense of wholeness is shared by Christian author Parker Palmer: "Jack pines ... are not lumber trees & they won't win many beauty contests either. But to me this valiant old tree solitary on its own rocky point, is as beautiful as a living thing can be.... In its silence it speaks of ... wholeness.... an integrity that comes from being what you are'. D. Wood, *Fawn Island*. 'Thomas Merton claimed that "There is in all visible things a hidden wholeness." But in the human world where we are less self-revealing than jack pines, Merton's words can, at times, sound like wishful thinking. Afraid that our inner light will be extinguished or our inner darkness exposed, we hide our true identities from each other & become separated from our own souls. We end up living divided lives, so far removed from the truth we hold within that we cannot know the "integrity that comes from being what you are." My knowledge of the divided life comes 1st from my experiences: I yearn to be whole, but dividedness often seems the easier choice. A "still, small voice" speaks the truth about me, my work, or the world. I hear it & yet act as if I did not. I withhold a personal gift that might serve a good end or commit myself to a project that I do not really believe in. I keep silent on an issue I should address or actively break faith with one of my own convictions. I deny my inner darkness giving it more power over me, or I project it onto other people, creating "enemies" where none exist....

In the wilderness, I sense the wholeness hidden "in all things." It is in the taste of wild berries, the scent of sunbaked pine, the sight of the Northern Lights, the sound of water lapping on the shore, signs of a bedrock integrity that is eternal & beyond all doubt. When I return to a human world that is transient & riddled with disbelief, I have new eyes for the wholeness hidden in me & my kind & a new heart for loving even our imperfections. The wilderness always reminds me that wholeness is not about perfection. On July 4, 1999, a 20-minute maelstrom of hurricane-force winds took down 20M trees across the Boundary Waters. A month later when I made my annual pilgrimage up north, I was heartbroken by the ruin & wondered whether I wanted to return. Yet on each visit since, I have been astonished to see how nature uses devastation to stimulate new growth, slowly but persistently healing her own wounds. Wholeness does not mean perfection: it means embracing brokenness as an integral part of life. Knowing this gives me hope that human wholeness, mine, yours, ours, need not be a utopian dream, if we can use devastation as a seedbed for new life." **And more than anything else, TRUST ourselves to the Mercy & Goodness of Our Lord.**

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
