FIRST SUNDAY

The first candle on the Advent wreath represents Hope – the first Sunday of Advent not only leads us to anticipate the birth of Christ but celebrate the beginning of a new liturgical season as well. It is purple, the primary color of Advent and a color symbolizing royalty. Sometimes called the "Prophecy Candle," the first candle harkens us back to Isaiah's foretelling of the birth of Christ and all of the promises God gave us in the Old Testament that would be fulfilled by the birth of Jesus.

THIRD SUNDAY

The third candle of Advent symbolizes Joy. As we continue to approach Christmas Day, our joy grows more and more. It takes us back to the joyful anticipation of the shepherds who journeyed to see Jesus in Bethlehem, even before the wise men. On this third Sunday of Advent, which the Church calls "Gaudete Sunday," meaning rejoice or praise, we light the third candle and rejoice like the shepherds. For this reason, it is called the "Shepherd's Candle," and its color is pink, the liturgical color for joy.

SECOND SUNDAY

The second candle on the Advent wreath represents Peace and is also purple. Often called the "Bethlehem Candle," this candle reminds us of Mary and Joseph's journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem before Mary gave birth to Jesus. It also builds on the meaning of the Prophecy Candle, recalling that after the division, destruction, and dispersion of the kingdom in the Old Testament, there might finally be peace on Earth.

FOURTH SUNDAY

The fourth candle of Advent represents Love, the ultimate love of God that He might send His only Son for us. Called the "Angel's Candle," the fourth candle of Advent is lit the Sunday before Christmas, and it is the color purple, leading us to eagerly await the new Kingdom of God on earth.

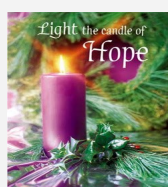

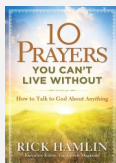

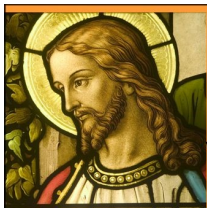

Reflecting on the Gospel



"Be watchful!
Be alert!"
Jesus tells his disciples.
"You do not know
when the time will come."
Mark 13: 33-37

Advent is a time for big, bold hope he kind showcased in today's first reading. The Babylonians return from exile to a city in ruins. Conquerors destroyed their temple.

Current residents shooed them

away. They compare themselves to "poluted rags" and withering leaves. Such hardships left the returned exiles at their wits' end and they let God know it. The people recognize God's anger and disappointment. But they never lose hope in the promise of God's redemption. With audacity, the people demand of God: "Oh, that you would rend the heavens and come down, with the mountains quaking before you." They long to see God's awesome deeds. In the face of such destruction, the people never stop hoping that God will make something new. We too are called to keep big, bold hope alive. Like our ancestors in faith, God calls us to trust in God's saving power even especially in our lowest moments.

What does the image of God as a potter have to teach us about the divine? Like a potter, God continually shapes and molds God's people. Like a potter, God is ready to get messy for the sake of our formation. God carefully crafts God's people in the divine image. How might we recognize our callings to be vessels of the divine more fully this Advent season?

Jesus offers the summons to "Be watch- full! Be alert!" in the thirteenth chapter of Mark's Gospel, in the days before he is crucified. Birth, life, death, resurrection these are all parts of one narrative. As we prepare for Christmas these next few weeks, let

DEACON'S CORNER

You, LORD, are Our Father, our redeemer you are named forever. Why do you let us wander, O LORD, from your ways, and harden our hearts so that we fear you not?

Yet, O LORD, you are Our Father; we are the clay and you the potter: we are all the work of your hands.



"Be watchful! Be alert!
You do not know when the time will come."
—Mark 13:33

This gospel comes at the end of a discussion with his apostles who were very concerned about the future destruction of the temple & what would happen to them. But like a laser beam Jesus points out to them & to us what is important. These 3 stories may help us understand a little bit better what Jesus wants us to understand.

While on a South Pole expedition, British explorer Sir Ernest Shackleton left a few men on Elephant Island, promising that he would return. Later, when he tried to go back, huge icebergs blocked the way. But suddenly, as if by a miracle, a path opened in the ice & Shackleton was able to get through. His men, ready & waiting, quickly scrambled aboard. No sooner had the ship cleared the island

than the ice crashed together behind them. Contemplating their narrow escape, the explorer said to his men, "It was fortunate you were all packed & ready to go!" They replied, "We never gave up hope. Whenever the sea was clear of ice, we rolled up our sleeping bags & reminded each other, 'He may come today.'" The one certainty about our life is that we will see Jesus face to face. In that moment, will we be prepared to be embraced by Our Lord or blinded by His Glory.

The Catholic Apologist Arnold Lunn shares about the time he was on a boat trip & a lady was plaguing him with theological questions. He answered her with quotes from the Bible & from the teachings of the Church, but the woman would not accept what he said. Then he interrupted her to say, "you must be a very inexperienced boat traveler. As you got on the boat, I noticed that you put your left foot on board first. Everyone knows that you will have bad luck if you step on a boat with your left foot first!" The next time she came on board he saw that she nearly tripped into the water in her effort to step aboard right foot first. Lunn thought it remarkable that she would believe the infallible Lunn in something that he had just made up, & that she would not accept the authority of the Church or the words of Scripture. So, too, we tend to complicate our lives & our prayer by looking for the extraordinary, when the Lord is to be found most often in the simple & in the ordinary.

In Frankfort, Ky. the city was in a big debate many years ago about placing a water fountain in a public square. The argument became heated in the legislature. Finally, a decision was made to ask three contractors to bid on the project. The first contractor was from Western Kentucky. When asked what his bid was he replied, "\$3,000". He said the breakdown was: "\$1,000 for labor, \$1,000 for materials, & \$1,000 for me." The next contractor was from Eastern Kentucky. When asked to give his bid and to break it down he said, "\$6,000. \$2,000 for labor, \$2,000 for materials, & \$2,000 for me." The last contractor was an established contractor from Frankfort who usually got all of the bids for the capital. When asked to give his bid, he replied, "\$9,000." Then they asked him to break it down. He closed the doors, looked around cautiously, & said, "\$3,000 for YOU, \$3,000 for me, & we give the bid to the guy from Western Kentucky!" So often we can get sidetracked by things that seem important. Much like the disciples being more concerned with the temple being destroyed & the world coming to an end than they were with the things that matter most in life: character, integrity, compassion, & preparedness for Christ's return. This is what Jesus means when he tells his Disciples to watch!

Our brain in many ways is a miny highway system. Whenever we choose a new action, it is like driving over an unpaved unmarked road & it is difficult for us. But the more we choose that act or thought, the smoother, wider & paved that pathway in our brain becomes. Soon it becomes a carpool lane that we just fly down. We are driving on automatic pilot without needing to see where the road is taking us. In a manner of speaking we begin to "sleepwalk" through our life because we are allowing our subconscious to make our choices. That is why Jesus is saying to us: "Be watchful! Be alert! You do not know when the time will come."

This Advent season we are called to stop & take the time to reflect on the roads we choose to travel in our Journey of Life.
