PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Dear Family,

This week on Thursday we see a shift in our Advent Season, from the start of Advent until Thursday we have been focusing on Christ coming at the end of time and in the many small ways He comes in grace or in mystery. Thursday the gospel at Mass will be the genealogy of our Lord from St. Matthew's gospel, day by day we will read through events leading up to Christ's birth until we come to Christmas Day. But there is a change that is much more exciting than that, or at least I think so. The 17th of December begins the ancient "O Antiphons" at Vespers, the evening prayer of the Church. These antiphons are used to start and end the Canticle of Mary or the Magnificat from when our Lady visited St. Elizabeth in St. Luke's Gospel (1:46-55). The beautiful Hymn "O Come O Come Emmanuel" is taken from these same antiphons. They are repeated the next day in the morning Mass before the Gospel is read.

December 17

O Wisdom of our God Most High, guiding creation with power and love: come to teach us the path of knowledge!

December 18

O Leader of the House of Israel,
giver of the Law to Moses on Sinai:
come to rescue us with your mighty power!

December 19

O Root of Jesse's stem,
sign of God's love for all his people:
come to save us without delay!

December 20

O Key of David,

opening the gates of God's eternal Kingdom: come and free the prisoners of darkness!

December 21

O Radiant Dawn,
splendor of eternal light, sun of justice:
come and shine on those who dwell in darkness and

in the shadow of death.

December 22

O King of all nations and keystone of the Church: come and save the man, whom you formed from the dust!

December 23

O Emmanuel,

our King and Giver of Law: come to save us, Lord our God!

Each title by which the Lord is invoked comes from a reference to the Messiah in the Old Testament. What makes this fun is that the Latin letters, beginning with the last and ending with the first form the acrostic ERO CRAS, which is translated as "Tomorrow I will be (there)." For these 7 days leading up to the feast of Christ we cry out night and day for the Lord to come. Then on Christmas Eve we pray in the morning "Today you will know the Lord is coming and, in the morning, you will see His glory." And First Vespers of Christmas will tell us: When the Sun rises in the morning sky, you will see the King of Kings come forth from the Father." As Christmas draws near, let our preparation increase so that when He comes forth from the Father, we are made ready to welcome Him not only in the cribs of our manger scenes, but in our homes and our hearts.

A Joyful Sunday. The Third Sunday of Advent is also known as *Gaudete* Sunday. The word "gaudete" is derived from the Latin words "gaudium," joy, and "gaudeo," to rejoice or be glad.

STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

The Christian steward is characterized by a spirit of Joy.

In our First Reading, Isaiah writes, "I rejoice heartily in the Lord, in my God is the joy of my soul." It is God who is the source of our joy and contentment — not things or achievements or comfort, but our relationship with God. This is why stewards can share so freely of their time, talents and material possessions — because ultimately, we are not attached to these things. Rather, we are attached to the Giver of the gifts, not the gifts themselves. With this spiritual understanding in mind, we begin to cultivate Joy and Peace in our lives.

As the season of Advent quickly comes to the end and Christmas is almost here, remember, when God Himself is the source of our Joy, it cannot be taken away from us. Remain detached of the things that distract you from your Spiritual Joy.

The Third Week of Advent:

JOY

"Do not be afraid. I bring you good tidings of great joy which shall be for all the people."

Luke 2: 10-11

How wonderful to hear those words year after year. But do we take them to heart when we face challenges, when we experience failure, hardship, illness, unexpected life-changing events? Women and couples who learn of an unexpected pregnancy may focus on the fear that they may be robbed of their

joy, that their life and plans will be disrupted yet they miss the message that joy is to be found in the wonder and awe of the unique child they have conceived.

Do not be afraid. I bring you good tidings of great joy...

There are those who may experience illness, old age, or misfortune. When it comes into their lives fear can take center stage. Fear of the unknown, fear of misery, pain, loss of control or even fear of death can silence the message of joy. But there is joy in the news that a helpless, poor, vulnerable child born in a humble stable might wipe away every tear from their eyes. That through him "there will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things have passed away." (Rev. 21:4) They may miss the message that the baby Jesus wrapped in swaddling clothes is more than the child who advanced in wisdom, age and favor before God and man, more than a prophet mighty in word and deed, but that JESUS IS LORD!

Do not be afraid. I bring you good tidings of great joy ...

Let us remember those who due to the unexpected, fear rather than find joy in the good tidings of Christmas. Let us lift up in prayer those with difficulties and burdens, illness and loneliness. Let us share where we can the tidings of great joy which shall be for all people.

Reflecting on the Gospel



The prophet Isaiah announces a year of the Lord's favor in today's first reading and it could not have come at a better time for the Israelites. Still reeling from their experience of exile, the Israelites longed for signs of the steadfast love promised by God. Isaiah declares that God's

vindication will shine forth in a time of jubilee. The poor will receive glad tidings. The brokenhearted will be healed. Liberty will go to the captives and release them to the prisoners. God's generosity blooms in the face of sorrow. God's justice grows before all the nations. Such is cause for great rejoicing for the Israelites then and for us now.

Imagine a jubilee happening today. How might God's blessings transform lives? What might God do to relieve the sorrow and suffering of creation? We need not wait passively for a jubilee to happen. The prophet Isaiah paves a way for dreaming of a year of favor from the Lord. We too can imagine the freedom of jubilee time and work to make it happen. In ways big and small, we can be people of jubilee. We can tend to the needs of people who are vulnerable and hurting. Through our words and actions, we can bring about rejoicing in the name of God.

Much of the northern hemisphere is in a time of extended darkness due to movements of the sun. Communities all over are also facing the darkness of injustice and sin. John comes to testify to the light. We too are called to reflect the light of Christ to the world. Where will you shine in these days leading up to Christmas?

DEACON'S CORNER

Brothers and sisters: Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing. In all circumstances give thanks, for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus.

I rejoice heartily in the Lord, in my God is the joy of my soul;

For he has clothed me with a robe of salvation, and wrapped me in a mantle of justice, Like a bridegroom adorned with a diadem, like a bride bedecked with her jewels.

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked upon his lowly servant. From this day all generations will call me blessed. The Almighty has done great things for me, and holy is his Name.



I had to go down to Los Angeles last week for a family emergency. As we drove by a Christian church in Redondo Beach, I saw this on their billboard: "Merry Christmas to our Christian friends. Happy Hanukkah to our Jewish friends. And to our atheist friends,.... good luck." Joy born of a Hope that flows from a Faith in a future that will transcend this moment is a uniquely human quality. It ultimately was the reason we crawled out of caves & built communities. It is the quality that allows us to see the possibility of tomorrow & of what could be. It is the quality that allows us to share with others rather than just take. But this

quality without Jesus would be meaningless because ultimately everything would end up in the darkness of the earth. But with Christ the darkness gives way to the light & the "belovedness" we yearn for can be experienced in this moment. We cannot help but share that hope, that joy that comes from our faith in Christ. Not only does He lift our hearts but we in turn can lift the hearts of others by our lives as Kent Nerburn shares in this story.

In his book, Make Me an Instrument of Your Peace: Living in the Spirit of the Prayer of St. Francis, Kent writes about his "Santa ministry": Every holiday season he dons the red suit & flowing white beard and goes out into the streets to bring the presence of Old St. Nick to whomever he meets. [He says] "I never know what is going to happen. I have found myself in nursing homes where men & women lifted themselves from their wheelchairs to sit on my lap. Fights in bars have stopped simply because I walked through the door. I have had mentally challenged people burst into song when they saw me pass. I have had a mother stop me on the street & lead me to her home so I could sit & hear the Christmas wishes of her sick child. ... When I am Santa there are no barriers of race or age or wealth or faith. One Christmas, "Santa" Kent was going to a community center in a violent part of town, near a housing project notorious for gangs & drugs. Getting out of his car, he began walking to his destination when he was followed by a group of teenage boys who started to taunt him. This was not mere joking – it was blood sport. Something bad was going to happen. Then a car pulled up, 6 young men, in their 20's, got out & headed toward him. Santa thought he had seen his last Christmas. But the 6 older men walked straight past Santa to the teenagers. The biggest man grabbed 1 of the teenagers by the scruff of the neck: "You don't mess with Santa." The he turned to the trembling St. Nick; "Sorry, Santa. These kids are ignorant. Come on. You got work to do." The older guys – & the teenagers – led Santa through the neighborhood, calling children out to meet the jolly old elf. The young toughs who minutes earlier were harassing poor Santa were now organizing the children into lines, telling them to behave & to wait nicely for their chance to meet Santa. It turned out to be an incredible afternoon. There is not a person living on that street who would not tell you that it is a dangerous place, filled with drugs, crime & hate," Kent writes of the experience. "But on that day, doors were opened, & we all had a glimpse into the unprotected human heart. And what we saw was not hate, but the deep & unquenchable desire to give and receive love."

In this reflection by Jesuit Fr. Pedro Arrupe may the meaning of Christ's coming touch you. "Nothing is more practical than finding God, than falling in Love in a quite absolute, final way. What you are in love with, what seizes your imagination, will affect everything. It will decide what will get you out of bed in the morning, what you do with your evenings, how you spend your weekends, what you read, whom you know, what breaks your heart, and what amazes you with joy and gratitude. Fall in Love, stay in love, and it will decide everything."

Rejoice & may we prepare our hearts to receive the Christ child & share His gift of love joyfully with others.




