

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Dear Holy People of God,

RE: Introducing the Ste. Anne's Book of Prayers: Ste. Anne's, A Praying Community

Warm Greetings in Christ Jesus. I wish to write to you this weekend on a subject most dear to my heart, and that is, prayer. I will spend the next two weeks reflecting on Christian Prayer.



I am very happy and grateful to God for the warm reception that this initiative has received. I have received many thank you cards from members of our parish family, even from those unable to attend our weekend liturgies, expressing gratitude for this Christmas gift of our Book of Prayers. Permit me to share with you some of the notes I received:

"Thank you Father for your beautiful prayer book - it has prayers for every day or any personal prayer. I am 91 years old and cannot attend mass any longer, so this book is perfect. Thank you again Father, you are in my everyday prayers (...)."

Another member of the parish family wrote: "Many thanks for the Ste. Anne's Book of Prayers. It is a very loving and thoughtful gift of grace which we all can benefit from and appreciate. May the Parish Council and all the parishioners be blessed with a healthy, holy 2021 (...)."

And another wrote: "(...) I left one of the Book of Prayers sitting around at home and my brother (N), who is at best a twice a year Catholic and who skipped Christmas this year, picked it up and asked if he could have it. A day later he told me that it's the best prayer book he has seen yet and felt he could really connect with it! I was really about to write him off as a lifelong heathen. God works in mysterious ways (...) So grateful that you put that together!"

Dear Holy People of God, the life of Jesus Christ, is the model of prayer for us all. At the very start of his public ministry, Jesus prayed in the desert, fasting forty days and nights. Before Jesus called his 12 apostles, he spent the night in prayer. Before he brought Lazarus back to life, Jesus prayed. Before he taught the Our Father prayer, Jesus prayed. Before the Passion, Jesus spent time in the Garden of Gethsemane in prayer. On the Cross, Jesus prayed to his Father. In fact, the great change that Jesus brought to the crucifixion was that he transformed an otherwise bitter experience into an act of prayer, praying for the Father's forgiveness for those crucifying him. Jesus' whole life was a life of prayer. Jesus never did anything without praying. Prayer kept Jesus in touch with his heavenly Father.

So why do we pray? To respond to this question, I cannot speak in an objective, general sense. I must speak in the subjective sense, as a particular individual. Why do I pray? I pray because prayer is like oxygen to me. I cannot do without prayer. As a Christian, it has been impossible for me to live without prayer. That is not to say that the feeling for prayer has always been constant. Truth be told, there have been days, moments, when I haven't felt like praying. Sometimes my personal prayer moments have been dry. Sometimes I just want to rush through the time of prayer.

But one thing I have noticed: Whenever I have gone against my instincts and feelings to pray when I do not feel like praying, those moments of prayer have been special and rewarding. I have felt blessed. St. Ignatius of Loyola recommends that if one usually prayed for say 10 minutes in the evening and then on a particular evening, one felt like not praying at all, one should rather strive to pray for 15 or 20 minutes. What this means is that prayer is not of the emotions or feelings, but of the will. Prayer is an exercise of the human will. Prayer is a decision of the will. Thus, in order to overcome the temptation not to pray, add a few more minutes to your time of prayer.

I am not sure I could be a priest for an hour, without daily prayer. And I would imagine it would be the same for you: How could you be a Christian without prayer?

Our Ste. Anne's Book of Prayers is a little tool to help us pray better. Prayer is like a school, and our Ste. Anne's Book of Prayers is a text book that Jesus is using to help us further develop our prayer life. So what is Christian prayer? And how can we develop our prayer life? What is the relationship between prayer and being a Christian? (To be continued, Fr. Maurice)



Jesus is recognized as the long-expected Messiah, the "light of the nations" and the "glory of Israel," but also "a sign that is spoken against." The sword of sorrow predicted for Mary announces Christ's perfect and unique oblation on the cross that will impart the salvation of God has "prepared in the presence of all peoples" (CCC, no. 529).

Saint Blaise

S aint Blaise is a bishop and martyr who lived in the fourth century in Turkey and Armenia. For a time, Blaise lived in a cave to escape persecution. On his feast the church recalls a miracle cure associated with him and celebrates the blessing of the throats. Blaise apparently saved the life of a boy who was choking on a fish bone. The saint said that anyone who lit a candle in his memory would be free of infection, thus candles are used in the traditional throat blessing. He is listed among the Fourteen Holy Helpers, saints revered as healers.

He is the patron saint of throat illnesses, animals, wool combers, and wool trading.

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
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
