





REFLECTION FOR FEBRUARY 5

The darkness and cold of winter still surround us making very relevant to our spiritual lives the theme of light and darkness in today's readings. In the first reading, Isaiah gives us the reminder that performing any work of mercy brings light into the darkness of our hearts and the world. Jesus, in speaking to the disciples and to us says, "You are the light of the world...your light must shine before others..." As baptized children of God, we carry the light of Christ within us. In what ways do your words and actions shine before others, and make Christ visible? If they are not, what will you do this week to make the Christ light in you shine for others to see and thus bring light into the darkness that exists around you?

February 5 ~ Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Greetings on this 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time!

The question of identity is one that is rich, widely lived and yet challenging. The philosopher Epictetus said: "Know, first, who you are and then adorn yourself accordingly." You definitely act the way you are, hence, the necessity of knowing who you are, that is, your identity is. It can be quite a challenge to not know and appreciate one's identity. In my earliest years on studies in Chicago, I was interested in knowing the last name of an African American classmate of mine. After asking for her last name, she paused a while and said: "Smith; unfortunately." I also paused for a while to ponder on why she added "unfortunately" after telling me her last name. It is then that it dawned onto me that Smith was a name inherited from colonial history and that she would have loved to bear an African name with which she would happily identify with.

But we, Christians, have an identity, a wonderful one and the challenge would be that of living up to our identity. In today's gospel, Christ of us: "you are the salt of the earth... You are the light of the world." Since identity and responsibility go hand in hand, this new identity of ours automatically determines our mission: bringing flavor to the world and lighting up our society darkened by the structures of sin. Thus, joining the works of darkness is tantamount to living in contradiction to our Christian identity.

Our Christian identity of "salt of the earth" and "light of the world" is to be lived out not only at a personal level but also at community level. Our parish community which we purposely call "parish family" is to shine its light by portraying the virtues of love, hope, solidarity, unity, dynamism, spiritual, and material commitment. In concrete terms, we live out our Christian identity by being faithful to personal and community prayer, especially Holy Mass, the rosary, adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, the sacrament of confession, offering masses for every occasion, outreach, etc., and by charitable works such as any material support through the various collections in our parish. Perhaps the following 7 secrets of successful parishioners according to a Catholic diocese can help our parish community be more and more aware of its identity and mission:

- 1) Believe in the Adventure of Being Catholic
- 2) Believe in Other Parishioners
- 3) See the Parish as the Spiritual Epicenter of Their Life
- 4) Do Not Always Have to Win or Be Right
- 5) Are Proud Enough of the Parish to Represent It Well
- 6) Are Not Members, But Disciples
- 7) Believe in the Power of Prayer and the Eucharist

Beloved parishioners, let us be proud of who we are: "salt of the earth" and "light of the world" and live accordingly.

Fasting consists of eating only one meal, with the possibility of two smaller snacks that do not add up to a single full meal. Catholics age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on all Fridays in Lent.






Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament



First Saturday Devotion


