

Dear parishioners,

In our first reading today, we hear: "Peter stood up with the Eleven, raised his voice, and proclaimed...." What Peter proclaims is the pascal mystery, the good news of Christ's resurrection, the apostolic faith. In the gospel, Jesus meets the 2 Emmaus disciples and explains to them the scriptures. In both cases, proclaiming and listening to the word go hand in hand. That is what we do at every mass. For this weekend, I want to reflect on one of the two main parts of the Holy Mass: the liturgy of the word.

After the collect, all sit, keep quiet and two important actions follow simultaneously: the proclamation of the Word and the listening of the Word. The proclamation of the Word in the midst of the assembly is recognized as a current event in which Christ speaks to his people gathered as his body. It is thus intended to be a spiritual event, an opportunity to encounter the Lord as he speaks to us. Saint Pope John Paul II wrote: "It should also be borne in mind that the liturgical proclamation of the word of God, especially in the Eucharistic assembly, is not so much a time for meditation and catechesis as a dialogue between God and his People, a dialogue in which the wonders of salvation are proclaimed, and the demands of the Covenant are continually restated. On their part, the People of God are drawn to respond to this dialogue of love by giving thanks and praise, also by demonstrating their fidelity to the task of continual 'conversion'." (DIES DOMININI /"The Day of The Lord", 41) Let me come back in details to the two important aforementioned actions:

- 1. Proclaiming the Word. In most parishes, if not all, this is a ministry. This is done from the ambo (a Greek word meaning "to ascend" notice that the ambo is placed at a prominent place by the altar. To be a lector is to be part of one of the ministries of the Church, hence the availability of a handbook for lectors and a training for liturgical readers. This is because it is the Word of God that is proclaimed and not one's word. It is therefore not a reading comprehension competition whereby the reader reads fast or in a low voice for him/herself. Thus, it is so important that the reader be slow, articulate, and loud enough for everyone to hear. As a lector, I wouldn't want to be the reason why one of those in the congregation would miss some words or part of the Word of God because I did not read clearly or slow enough.
- 1. Hearing the Word. The liturgy of the Word is interactive; the whole congregation should be involved. One way of being involved is to respond and aloud where we are expected to. For instance, at the end of the first and second reading the reader says: "the Word of the Lord"; the response "Thanks be to God" and after the gospel "Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ" should not come from only a few voices but from all present. Also, the involvement must not be doing something; prayerful listening itself is involvement. The verb to hear/listen is so important in the Old Testament as it is today with the Word of God. The central statement of Jewish belief is the sentence: "Hear, O Israel: the Lord is your God; the Lord is One." (Deuteronomy 6:4) From this sentence came the *shema* prayer (a Hebrew word that means "hear"); *Shema Yisrael* is a Jewish prayer and is also the first two words of a section of the Torah and is the title of a prayer that serves as a centerpiece of the morning and evening Jewish prayer services. When the Lord speaks, we his creature ought to hear. As we know, there is a difference between hearing and truly listening. The structure of the Word lends itself not just to hearing the Word of God, but to listening. To listen, we need an active, engaged mind that is focused on the Word of God, and we need time to process what we have heard. For this reason, it's important to make good use of the brief silences in between the readings. Let's strive to move from a "scared" silence to a "sacred" silence, a silence that truly takes time to break down what we've heard and apply it to our lives as individuals.

Because it is a solemn moment when we listen to God speak to us, silence, reverence, attention and full participation are required during the readings and homily. We need the Word of God, as the psalmist says: "your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" (Ps. 119:105). May we let ourselves be instructed by God's Word. Let us ask for the wisdom to **not** listen to God's Word "à la carte," that is, picking and choosing what we want to hear or what we are comfortable with, but to let the double-edged sword (God's Word) cut through our weaknesses, shed light on the dark spots of our lives and transform us into the true versions of ourselves.



Every Thursday ~ 9:30 AM to 6:45 PM Rosary & Benediction begins at 6PM


